#### Smoke Rise Resident to Run the Boston Marathon in Special Celebration of Women Alongside Iconic Athlete **Kathrine Switzer**

Elizabeth Mann, 34, from Smoke Rise, will be lacing up her sneakers on April 17, 2017 for the run of her life. Mann, along with 100 other runners, will be participating in the 121st Boston Marathon to represent 261 Fearless, Inc, the new non-profit benefitting women's running initiatives from legendary marathoner, Kathrine Switzer.

In 1967, Switzer became the first registered women to compete in

the Boston Marathon. At that time, the race was considered a male-

managed to obtain an official bib, number 261. Mid-stride in the competition, an angry race director leapt from the press truck and attempted to pull Switzer from the race. In one of sport's most dramatic moments, Switzer's burly boyfriend bounced the official off the course, allowing Switzer to go on to finish. The photo of the

incident became one of Time-Life's "100 Photos That Changed the World."

"Switzer not only broke the glass starting line," says Mann, "But she continued to champion the cause of women's running for the next 50 years. 261 Fearless – a global women's running network - is the result." "I know I have some hard work ahead of me," confesses Mann, who is running 40 miles a week." Mann is trying to raise over \$7,000 for 261 Fearless. "With the money we raise, this non profit organization is able to help establish social running Clubs and create coaches' education and communication programs, even right here in our own community!" enthused Mann. "We aim bring women together and connect them with other 261 runners globally. This is a wonderful way to continue to give back and support other women long past the time of the Boston Marathon. Every woman out there deserves to have the chance to reach their own starting line and feel fearless.'

Despite an inauspicious beginning, the Boston Athletic Association (BAA) early on realized the seriousness of women's desire to participate and the potential of their endurance. In 1972, five years after the 'Switzer Incident', the BAA welcomed women as official competitors, ... Continued on page 10

#### "A Drop in the Bucket" Campaign Painting the Browing Courthouse

3)))))S Is designed to teach beginners skills needed to play Jr USTA league matches

The Browning Courthouse on La Vista Road in Tucker is a familiar sight to many. The building was built circa1860 and is now maintained by the Tucker Historical Society. At that time DeKalb County was



divided into eleven militia districts. Browning was one of the districts and had it's own courthouse. This courthouse is now one of the oldest public buildings in DeKalb County and is the oldest in Tucker. It is one of just two district courthouses left in Georgia. The building was in use through the 1970's with "Court held at 10:00 a.m., the third Saturday of each month".

In 1985 the building was moved to its current location from the corner of La Vista and Fellowship Rd. Development of the Browning Village shopping center and plans for future road widening made the move necessary.


The Browning Courthouse is constructed of Georgia Heart Pine, an old growth pine that is very strong, very dense and very hard. It is water resistant, termite resistant and well adapted to the southern environment. This has greatly contributed to the longevity of the building.

But like all structures, the building needs upkeep. The exterior is now in need of painting. Unfortunately, the current paint contains lead and will have to be removed or encapsulated before new paint is applied. The Historical Society has consulted a historic preservation architect and other

experts in the field of historic preservation to ensure that the building is cared for properly.

The "Drop in the Bucket" campaign has a goal of \$16,000 to be used to remediate the lead paint problem and repaint the exterior. The Tucker Historical Society currently has \$4000 in the fund. Box 1391, Tucker, GA 30085. Buckets for donations are available at the Garden Enthusiast and Main Street Barber Shopboth in Tucker. The Tucker Historical Society is a 501C3 not for profit, all volunteer organization.



## HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION FILING DEADLINE APRIL 3 nancy@nancyjester.com

If you are a new homeowner in DeKalb County or have not previously filed for homestead exemption, you may qualify for a fairly significant tax break on your annual property tax. The homestead exemption must be applied for in person, by mail, or online if you owned and resided in your home on January 1st of this year. Remember that this exemption is not automatically granted. As a homeowner, you must file for it. Once you have filed for homestead exemption renewal is automatic and you do not need to reapply. If you reside in a city, you should check to see if your city requires a separate homestead exemption filing.

Also, in addition to the basic homestead exemption, there are also special exemptions for citizens ages 62 and older and for residents that are totally and permanently disabled. For more information, call the County Tax Commissioner's office at 404-298-4000.

# Of Note to the Community: Safety Alerts & Watches by Cedric Ross

A community is made up of family, friends and in some cases really good neighbors. We are fortunate to have all of the above, please take a moment and read the stories below about several groups of Pine Straw salesmen you should use caution in dealing with. I can't speak to the accuracy of the stories but better warned than not. In all industries there are good and not so good. Sometimes it is best to request a service than have someone show up on your door step. When contracting someone it may be best to get references from others who have used their services before making a decision. The choice of course is yours. (The stories have been edited).

"Three guys in a very nice pickup truck pulling a trailer loaded with pine straw stopped to ask if we wanted pine straw put down and we asked the price of the straw and putting it down. They said usually it was \$5.00 per bale, but would do it for \$3.50 per bale. We only had it put in the front yard. Ended up in a bad situation with them as they grossly overcharged us by several hundred dollars! They did have long needle, very clean straw, but definitely overcharged us and we wanted to warn all of the neighbors in this area to be cautious if you see these guys! The head guy was (name removed) and they were nice clean cut guys, but they are NOT to be trusted!!"

"On February 7th, a pickup with fancy wheels, stopped at my neighbors and got their approval to distribute straw. They got a price per bale, but at the end of a very poor distribution performance, told the people they had put out over 400 bales of straw coming to over \$1,400. Normally, this family only needs about 60 bales at most and usually pays just over \$300. The salesperson was militant. They talked ugly, flailed their hands about the price when the man of the house would not pay them what they wanted and would not let them near the truck to observe the bails or get the tag number. The neighbors called the police... This was a scary, bad situation that we are warning all members about. There were extra people that would not allow my neighbor to look at the pine straw on the truck. He believes their bales were very small rather than being normal size. In the end, my neighbor finally got a tag number, but he paid them way too much for the poor job of spreading. They threw pine straw all over the yard when leaving and did not clean up after the job."





#### **Stone Mountain Rotary Club**

#### New technology brings meetings to broader audience

The Rotary Club of Stone Mountain can now bring its weekly meetings literally to the entire world, making it the first "hybrid" Rotary club, a combination of a traditional brick-and-mortar club and an e-club, where members interact virtually through an Internet connection.

February's first weekly member meeting was broadcast live on the Internet via the GoToMeeting app. Four members logged in remotely to hear and see the entire meet-

ing, including a presentation on his work with Amnesty International by Liberian native (and now Norcross resident) Waylee George, who detailed the state of human rights in his home country.

Like many civic organizations, Rotary has seen declining membership numbers over the past few years. Busy working professionals and retired travelers often had difficulty meeting the stringent attendance requirements of a Rotary membership. E-clubs began to arise to meet the needs of members who wanted to commit to a club but couldn't always make a regular weekly meeting in a physical location. These online clubs took advantage of technology to connect with one another via online meetings and networking sites, or could listen to a pre-recorded meeting at their convenience. The e-clubs would also schedule in-person socials and community projects which provided members a change to meet and work together face-to-face. But e-clubs were still considered distinctly different from those clubs

with a physical presence, primarily in the designation as "e-club."

The Rotary Council on Legislation in 2016 enacted legislation that removed the distinction between traditional clubs and e-clubs. It recognized that clubs have been meeting in a number of ways: regular clubs were having digital meetings and e-clubs were holding in-person meetings. The distinction between the two types of clubs was no longer meaningful- clubs formally known as "e-clubs' now no longer had to use that nomenclature.

The Stone Mountain club quickly realized that this enactment offered an opportunity to address the challenges of an aging membership while appealing to the needs of a younger, more connected population. By becoming a hybrid club, Stone Mountain could offer the best of both worlds to members and potential candidates. The club's physical presence still offers plenty of opportunities for social interaction and community projects; the online presence allows live interaction with weekly meetings as well as the chance to watch the event on-demand.

The club has plans to launch its YouTube channel in February, which will archive its meeting videos for others to view, particularly useful for Rotarians looking for a more convenient way to fulfill meeting make-up requirements.

The Stone Mountain club meets every Tuesday for noon lunch at Smoke Rise Country Club; visitors and those interested in learning more about Rotary are welcome to attend as a guest of the club. #### **HEALTH NOTES:**

Why colonoscopy is a procedure people love to hate?

Last month I wrote an article on how important it is to be screened for colon cancer.

I can't emphasize enough how important this is! Colon cancer is often silent until it is too late. Current screening recommendations for all average risk individuals is to begin screening at age 50 and continue until somewhere around 75. Those with a higher than average risk should start screening at an earlier age.

Although there are several screening options, colonoscopy remains the 'gold standard' for colon cancer screening. Why is this? Colonoscopy is a screening test that not only detects cancer, but can sometimes treat it. Colonoscopy gives the physician a direct look at the wall of the entire colon. If any abnormalities are seen, the doctor can biopsy the area.

What happens during a colonoscopy? The patient comes to the procedure room (either in the doctor's office or in an outpatient room of the hospital) after doing a bowel prep at home to clean out the colon. He is then sedated (sleepy, but not asleep), and the doctor inserts a flexible tube equipped with a fiber optic light and magnification into the rectum. This flexible "microscope" makes it possible to see the walls of the colon up very close. The physician guides this scope from the rectum upwards into the colon, all the way to the junction of the small intestine, carefully looking for polyps and growths. If your colon has been thoroughly cleaned out, the doctor using the scope should be able to see the inside of the walls of your colon or large intestine clearly. These growths can look like tiny pink cauliflower florets, worm-like structures, flat growths or mushroom-like structures that hang from the colon wall.

How can a colonoscopy 'treat' cancer? When the doctor sees a polyp, he or she will biopsy or completely remove the growth, noting the appearance of the growth and where it is located in the procedure record. This does not hurt. The polyp is then sent to the lab for analysis. Some polyps (usually adenomas) will have abnormal cells or frank cancer. Most polyps will not be cancer. If one of the polyps does have cancer cells, more testing may be required to determine if the cancer has broken through the lining into deeper layers of the colon wall. Sometimes complete removal of the polyp is all the treatment necessary.

Why is it that many people avoid having a colonoscopy? Many people object to the amount of liquid necessary to drink to 'prep' the colon. The prep also makes you have diarrhea and pass a lot of stool. This is what the prep is supposed to do! The most common cause of an "inadequate" colonoscopy is an inadequate prep for the procedure. Following the instructions carefully can help you avoid having to repeat the exam.

After the colonoscopy is complete, you will be wheeled back to the holding area until you are more awake. When this happens, the doctor will come and give a preliminary report, followed by instructions for follow up. The person you brought to drive you home (because you had sedative drugs, remember?) should be able to help you remember what the doctor said. Like Nike says, "Just do it!!" It could save your life!





#### A Christmas Garden

It started out as a Christmas present from my husband: a table-top herb-garden-starter appliance. Basically, a plant nursery. Having wasted so many store-bought fresh herbs that spoiled in the refrigerator before we could use them, I was looking for a way of eliminating that waste by growing herbs at our house so we could pick and use just what we needed when we needed it. This has turned out to be the perfect solution. You plug it in, insert some seeds in the pre-formed potting cones, add water with some nutrient, and click "start" on the control screen.



It is pre-programmed to provide 17 hours of light each day and continuously pumps water to keep the seedlings moist. An automatic reminder lets you know when more nutrient solution is needed or if the power has been out requiring resetting of the clock. In fewer than 30 minutes, I had it assembled and loaded with

six different types of herbs.



In two weeks we had small green shoots showing, and in two months, we had full plants ready to be reported into something larger and hearty enough to handle some harvesting. Our favorites are the dill and cilantro, which we use regularly now from our own kitchen garden.

This small success has led us to venture a bit deeper into the wonders of gardening. Believing in sustainability, we wanted to try some tomatoes, squash and other vegetables that could go from our own garden to our table. But the image of deer chomping their way through our yard caused concern; we'd really be disap-

pointed if they are the product of our labors. So we did some research and have found an amazing solution that has captivated our interest while expanding our commitment to growing our own produce. That solution will be the subject of the next TechTalk column in the April paper.

#### **Senior Connections Builds a Wall of Hearts!**





#### Love Me, Love My Dog!

The old proverb says a lot. However, in order to keep the peace in Smoke Rise, there are some county codes that pet owners – and nonpet owners – should know.



DeKalb County's Code of Ordinances regarding animals cover a lot of basics, from transportation of animals to responsibilities of owners of guard dogs. Two sections of the code that seem to interest people most can be found under "Chapter 5 – Animals" and "Chapter 16 - Miscellaneous provisions and offenses."

DeKalb animal owners must ensure their animal does not harm people, property or other animals. Also, owners are responsible for immediately removing excrement deposited by their animal. Additionally, your precious pet is not allowed to make any vocalizations in violation of the county noise ordinance. This basically means your dog can't bark for more than 15 minutes without interruption or more than 30 minutes, if intermittent. The code does make an exception for "...animal vocalizations that are given as a warning to the presence of an intruder." (Full details regarding vocalization limitations can be found in Section 16-304.)

Section 5-5 of the county code covers "animals at large." The main point of this section is: use common sense. Don't let your animal roam the streets! (with the exception of county parks that are specifically designated as off leash areas).

# Mountain Mums Fall in Love with Orchids

I have often heard it said, "Diamonds are a girl's best friend." During their March 8 meeting, the Mountain Mums garden club found that for some girls, their best friend might be an orchid (or two).

Janice Gummersall is a woman who is truly in love with her hobby! In fact, she began with a few orchids in pots in her windows, then moved to pots in the basement under "grow lights," then to a greenhouse, and now a bigger greenhouse-stuffed with benches and shelves full of hundreds of varieties of orchid. In the process, she has become a self-taught expert in the field.

Did you know vanilla beans are the fruit of the vanilla vine, an orchid? And did you know the protected yellow 'lady slipper' is a native orchid that grows in the

wild? Orchids come in all sizes and shapes and depending on their rarity can cost from a few dollars up to \$10,000. In Georgia, the majority of orchids are grown outdoors during warm weather and taken in when the temperature dips below 50 degrees.

The most common, the phallenopsis or 'moth orchid', is available in most floral departments and comes in all colors except blue (the 'blue' orchids you see in the stores have taken up dye).

Grow this orchid in the original pot, which should come planted in either moss or bark 'soil'. Kept in low light (bright, but not direct sun), and when benevolently ignored, most can bloom for up to six months. Water the plant, reaching the roots, once a week. Do not use 'three ice cubes' to water the plants. This will not reach the roots. Leave the spike after the bloom fades until it turns gray. As the plant grows, repot it in a slightly larger pot filled with specialized orchid 'soil' (bark). This should not be needed more than every year or two.

The Mountain Mums hosted the Walk to Remember in January. They had a workday at the Hugh Howell triangle in February and plan to go to Brookstone Senior Living to work with residents on a Easter garden themed project. #### Mountain Shadow Garden Club

The Mountain Shadow Garden Club program on March 13 will be a special presentation by well-known Smoke Rise resident Jim Tucker. Mr. Tucker, now 94 years old, will present a discussion on his approach to growing plants and knowledge gained in developing his large garden of flowering shrubs and his orchid collection.

Mr. Tucker, a World War II veteran, was a Georgia Tech Chemical Engineering Co-Op Student with work terms at pulp and paper mills when he was called up in 1943. He was deployed to the Pacific Theatre where, as a Bomb Disposal officer and explosives expert, he deactivated bombs, mines, and booby traps on Leyte and Cebu Islands in the Philippines and

disposed of explosives on the peninsular on the ocean side of Tokyo Bay in Japan. When he returned home, he continued his studies at Georgia Tech, and graduated in December, 1947.

Respected by the pulp and paper industry for his 40 years of work in design, engineering, and management, Mr. Tucker provided technical expertise on mill appraisals, feasibility studies for major mill projects, and strategic planning. He was an internationally recognized authority on pulp and paper processes, advanced engineering techniques, and management. He entered the engineering consulting field in 1963 and in 1976, he joined Simons-Eastern Consultants in Decatur, GA, as vice president and chief engineer.



While Mr. Tucker always had an interest in plants and his home landscape, gardening became the primary focus of his attention after he moved to his current home in 1997, which is situated on a large shady lot. He nurtures more than 50 orchids of various species in his home, plus various other unique tropical houseplants. The large wooded property where his home is located includes a wide range of camellias, azaleas, rhododendrons, viburnums, hydrangeas, and other shade-loving shrubs, plus iris, daffodils, peonies, and other sun-loving plants where sufficient sun is available. With concerns about adequate water for maintaining valued landscape plants, Mr. Tucker had a deep well drilled a few years ago and installed a special irrigation system to provide overhead watering of all plants.

Always willing to try new ideas and techniques in gardening, Mr. Tucker became proficient in various types of plant propagation, including layering. Over 80% of the hundreds of azaleas in his garden are the result of ground layering and 30% of the numerous camellias were air layered. Other woody plants layered include rhododendrons and viburnums.

Mr. Tucker first became a member of Mountain Shadow Garden Club in 1997 and has seen many changes through the years. Originally a club for men only, the membership became "co-ed" in 2000 and now has a balance of men and women members. Low attendance was a concern as members aged and meetings sometimes boring. Mr. Tucker led the effort to schedule speakers and programs that would attract larger audiences. Field trips to popular Atlanta area gardens and other efforts to involve new members helped revitalize the club.

MSGC is open to men and women of all ages who enjoy learning about a diverse range of topics related to home landscapes, plants, and gardens. #### **Morning Glories Explore the Concrete Jungle**

The February meeting of the Smoke Rise Morning Glories was held at the home of Janet McGinnis with the emphasis on the celebration of Valentine's Day. The featured speak was Kathrine Kennedy, from Concrete Jungle, a local organization that helps feed Atlanta's poor by donating fresh produce to area food banks.

Concrete Jungle started in 2009 by Craig Durken and Aubrey Daniels after discovering the massive amounts of ignored fruit and nuts that grow each year on untended lots and public areas. Their focus began as they harvested apples and turned them into homemade apple cider. As they searched the area for apples, they became aware of other trees and sources for fresh fruit that could be either distributed fresh or preserved. Dogwood Farm in Southwest Atlanta is their small farm where they also grow vegetables to donate. Today, Concrete Jungle is a year



# HODGE PODGE

Well, here it is again! Spring-ter in Stone Mountain. We all know that March cannot make up its mind - is it winter? Is it spring? What is going on here? One day it is 70° and balmy and the next we are plunging down into the depths of Arctic Revenge and it's 19°. We struggle with migraines and sniffles, hot flashes and shivers and use the AC during the day and heat at night. We waffle between shorts and snowsuits and, if you are like me, you just finally give up and stay in your pajamas all day. I think pajamas have become quite stylish anyway, so this fits into my lifestyle just fine. It might not fit into anyone else's visual preference, but I'm not here to please anyone who can't appreciate my baggy teal pajama bottoms, fluffy teal sleeping hoodie and red wool overcoat topped off with a muffler, grey mittens and whichever pair of shoes is handy and will accommodate two pairs of socks. This is my preferred dog walking attire. I usually find myself alone on the street. I don't know why.

So since it's still supposed to be cold, I still want warming comfort food but know I should have a kale salad instead. Because I can't make up my mind, the recipes this month are in totally indefinite categories. The first is stoup. Stoup is a cross between soup and stew. Perfect March food.

#### Hamburger Macaroni Stoup

1 pound ground beef
2 Tablespoons olive oil
2 medium carrots, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 bay leaves
4 cups beef broth
1 (15 oz) can tomato sauce
2 stalks celery, chopped
1 teaspoon dried marjoram
1/2-3/4 teaspoon dried thyme
1 1/4 cups dry elbow pasta

Parsley and grated Parmesan cheese

2 (15 oz) cans undrained petite-diced tomatoes

1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

In large Dutch oven, heat 1 tablespoon olive oil and cook the carrots, celery and onion about 3 minutes - add garlic and cook 1 more minute. Dump mixture in a bowl. In the same pot, add olive oil and ground beef. Season with salt and pepper and cook until brown. Drain excess fat. Return the sautéed veggies to beef and add everything except the dry pasta. Bring to a boil. Add pasta and cook, stirring occasionally, about 15 minutes. Remove bay leaves and serve warm with parsley and Parmesan. You can make this thinner by adding more broth and it's a thick stew/soup. The pasta cooks fine in the tomato liquid. And it's like hamburger helper the next day, so kids will love this too. Vegetable broth and veggie meat works just fine, too.

This next recipe is adapted from "Taste of Home" and is like a cornbread/corn pudding/souffle/quiche. It's called "Creole Cornbread" but is very rich and dense; it will serve 10-12. Pull out that iron skillet for this! (And it's gluten free.)

#### Cornbread/Souffle/Quiche?

2 cups cold, cooked white rice 2 large eggs
1 cup plain cornmeal 1 cup whole milk
1/2 cup chopped onion scant 1/4 cup oil
1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1 teaspoon salt
1-2 medium jalapenos, seeded and chopped

1 (15 ounce) can creamed corn

3 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Oil skillet and preheat oven to 350° while you're chopping peppers and onions. Mix the rice, cornmeal, onion, peppers, salt, baking powder and baking soda in a big ol' bowl. Mix the eggs, milk and oil in another bowl to combine. Add the creamed corn. Add the egg mixture to the rice mixture and stir well to blend. Fold in the grated cheese.

Sprinkle some cornmeal on the bottom of the oiled skillet. Pour batter in, spread and bake at 350° for 50 minutes or until it tests done and rises a bit. It won't rise much. If it browns too quickly, you can cover it or rotate the skillet in the oven. The recipe says to serve warm, and it would be great with soup, chili or even a fruit salad. The egg/milk/cheese ratio really is quiche-like, but the rice and corn pull it into a pudding/souffle texture. It stays hot as blue blazes for at least 20 minutes, and in that skillet it stays warm for what seemed like an eternity. I nibbled on it all day and I don't think it ever cooled down until I refrigerated the leftovers. It does reheat super easy, too.

Because I'm running out of room I can't put in a full recipe for us sweet lovers, but in keeping with the indefinite category theme, and for when you can't decide on chocolate or peanut butter, just mix equal parts of peanut butter and Hershey's® syrup. Instant fake Nutella® that's great spread on a plain cookie or finger.
