

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

AS A SINNER, WHAT WRONG WOULD WE MAKE RIGHT IN JESUS' PRESENCE?

In God's eyes, the author of Wisdom says, the entire creat-



ed universe is as a single grain, or a tiny drop of morning dew. A single speck of light in the night sky would seem to be a similar analogy. In the Gospel, Jesus refers to Zacchaeus as a descendant of Abraham, bringing to mind God's promise to Abraham that his descendants would be as numerous as the stars in the sky. Zacchaeus, a corrupt tax collector, a collaborator with the Roman government, a known sinner, is one of those

stars. Overlooked, if not scorned, he too is part of the innumerable points of light in the night sky, shining forth with the light of God's mercy. As God loves all creation, what we may overlook as insignificant is never unimportant to God.

Luke tells us that Jesus 'intended to pass through the town" of Jericho, implying that Jericho itself was an insignificant town on the way to Jerusalem, his ultimate destination

(19:1). But when He sees Zacchaeus in the sycamore tree, He doesn't just stop, He stays. Here is a lost sheep like the one the Good Shepherd pursued in the desert. Here is a penitent thief - not long before Jesus would meet another on the cross - promising to repay all that he had



taken from anyone. Here is one of God's children, a sinner, anxious to see Jesus, responding to Jesus with joy, and immediately expressing his contrition. Jesus encountered exactly the kind of person He came to save and so he found Himself right at home.

Sometimes our ability to see the Lord is locked and we struggle through life, losing our way, unaware that mercy and forgiveness are within reach. We are called to approach Jesus with humility and repentance, like Zacchaeus, or the tax collector in the temple in Jesus' parable last Sunday. We have this opportunity today. Jesus is here today, here in this house of sinners, here to bring the good news of salvation, for "today salvation has come to this house...for the Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:9-10).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

If I were in Zacchaeus's shoes and Jesus was coming to my home while others called me a sinner, what wrongs would I pledge to make right? What bold promises would I make?



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS Do We Watch Jesus from a Distance?

It seems to me that Zacchaeus may have gotten more than he bargained for when he scaled that sycamore tree.

We can only speculate as to what the original intentions of the wealthy tax collector were. We know he wanted to see Jesus, of course — but what does that mean? Was he simply curious about this famous and controversial man? Was he moved by what he heard of Jesus' teachings? Was he trying to catch a glimpse, or to get close?

Whatever his initial motivations, we can safely assume he did not expect Jesus to look up and say: "Get down. I am coming to your house today."

I often find myself taking the same posture as Zacchaeus in the tree. Perhaps I have a problem I'm wrestling with or a personal fault I need to overcome. At times I know I need to give of myself in ways that scare me. Whatever it is, I am watching Jesus from a distance. I am removed. Because I worry that when He gets close, He will get in my space. He will see whatever it is I don't want to deal with or tackle.

I need to remember that Jesus does not come to condemn, but to assist. It is God's desire to make us "worthy of His calling." To do that, He knows we need help. He knows we need Him in our space.

I'll say this for Zacchaeus — he was ready. He jumped right down, acknowledged what he had to be ashamed of, and vowed to do better. He brought Jesus home.
