#### **Commander's Message**



We have been blessed this 89er Celebration and made more than expected due to the rain. We also was honored to have our Department Commander and the National 2016 candidate for Commander attend during the parade. Memorial day is just around the corner and we are getting our program together for this year. Memorial Day, an American holiday observed on the last Monday of May, honors men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, at least, it marks the beginning of summer.

The Civil War claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history, requiring the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries. By the late 1860s Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers. It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day. Waterloo



—which had first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags. Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War. But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars. Cities and towns across the United States host Memorial Day parades each year, often incorporating military personnel and members of veterans' organizations. Some of the largest parades take place in Chicago, New York and Washington, D.C. Americans also observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries and memorials. On a less somber note, many people throw parties and barbecues on the holiday, perhaps because it unofficially marks the beginning of summer.

#### Adjutant's Message



89ers is now officially over and it's back to business as usual at the Post. A big thank you to all who helped throughout the week. There was an enormous amount of work involved and it couldn't have been pulled off without you.

Coming out of 89ers week, a time of constantly "putting out fires", I am reminded of Sgt. Maynard H. Smith US Army Air Corps, who was issued The Medal of Honor for actions on May 1rst, 1943. His commendation reads:

"For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action above and beyond the call of duty. The aircraft of which Sgt. Smith was a gunner was subjected to intense enemy antiaircraft fire and determined fighter airplane attacks while returning from a mission over enemy-occupied continental Europe on 1 May 1943. The airplane was hit several times by antiaircraft fire and cannon shells of the fighter airplanes, 2 of the crew were seriously wounded, the aircraft's oxygen system shot out, and several vital control cables severed when intense fires were ignited simultaneously in the radio compartment and waist sections. The situation became

so acute that 3 of the crew bailed out into the comparative safety of the sea. Sgt. Smith, then on his first combat mission, elected to fight the fire by himself, administered first aid to the wounded tail gunner, manned the waist guns, and fought the intense flames alternately. The escaping oxygen fanned the fire to such intense heat that the ammunition in the radio compartment began to explode, the radio, gun mount, and camera were melted, and the compartment completely gutted. Sgt. Smith threw the exploding ammunition overboard, fought the fire until all the firefighting aids were exhausted, manned the workable guns until the enemy fighters were driven away, further administered first aid to his wounded comrade, and then by wrapping himself in protecting cloth, completely extinguished the fire by hand. This soldier's gallantry in action, undaunted bravery, and loyalty to his aircraft and fellow crewmembers, without regard for his own personal safety, is an inspiration to the U.S. Armed Forces. "

Sgt. Smith was a shining example of the values shared by the members of the Armed Forces, and Veterans around the world. He took care of his brother servicemen, combatted the enemy, and accomplished the mission through sheer will and bravery. While we as veterans are no longer actively engaged in combat, there is no reason that these values should fade in us. Take care of each other, and accomplish whatever mission may come our way.

As always, I hope to see more members at meetings and activities. We talk about this almost constantly, because it is vitally important to the success of our Post. We are fast becoming one of the premier Posts in Oklahoma, and you as members should see all the things we are involved in that are driving that progression. This is your Post. It doesn't belong to me, my fellow officers, or the Commander. Membership makes the Post live. We have the numbers, let's get active!




