Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

## Money Matters Personal Financial Stewardship

### Long-term Care Insurance

As we or our parents grow older, more and more people face the probability of some day needing nursing care assistance. Therefore, many people are asking the question, "Should I consider purchasing long-term care insurance?" The purpose of long-term care insurance is to pay for the nursing care facility or other institution or a variety of home health care situations. This insurance can be important because, in most circumstances, Medicare and Medicaid do not pay for prolonged stays or needs of the elderly and disabled.



Suze Orman, the New York Times number-one best-selling author, gives an example of the potential benefit with long-term care insurance:

Let's say you are 55 and will need to be in a nursing home at age 84: The projected yearly cost of a nursing home 30 years from now, if you live in middle America (assuming an annual rate of inflation of 5 percent), would be \$148,176. Given that the average stay is 2.75 years, that would mean a total cost to you of about \$407,484. The total cost of a long-term care policy if started at age 55 and paid each year until you were 84 would be \$36,395. Look at the numbers: you will pay over 11 times more for the total cost of a long-term care stay than you did for the entire time you paid your premiums.

When you buy insurance, you buy it in the hope that you will never need it. The truth is that you are actually more likely to use your long-term care insurance policy than you are to use your fire or car insurance. One in 1,200 people will use his fire insurance, one in 248 people will use his car insurance, but one in four people will use his long-term care insurance.

The premiums you pay for long-term care insurance will depend on your age, health, and the choices you make, but the annual premiums can be in the thousands. If you choose to buy long-term care insurance, your policies should contain the following:

- 1. A prior stay in the hospital should not be required.
- 2. The policy should be adjusted for inflation.
- 3. The policy should be guaranteed renewable for life.
- 4. Home care should be included.
- 5. The policy should allow for a waiver of premium if its owner is institutionalized.

Insurance premiums will be much cheaper if you begin paying the premium in your 40's or 50's. Remember, it's buyer beware. It is to your advantage to compare several policies before you make your final choice.

As a Christian, "Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed" (Proverbs 16:3). Insurance is a vehicle that helps us plan for the future. Through insurance we prevent the possibility of being a burden to others (2 Corinthians 11:9).

## **Bonded in Baptism**

In 1 Corinthians 12:13 and Titus 3:4-5, Paul explains that baptism brings us into God's family. Baptism is the sacrament by which new members, young and old, are welcomed into the family of God. By exploring this sacrament, each member in your family can begin to realize how valued they are as members of the body of Christ.

Gather together with your family calendar. Draw a shell, (a symbol of baptism), on the dates each family member was baptized. If you are unsure of these dates, or if some have not yet received baptism, draw the shell on the person's birthrate. (You may wish to check through your family records to find baptismal certificates, or check at your church office for baptismal date information.) Talk about how baptism is a special way of saying, "You are a child of God." Offer reassurance that God loves each of us.


Make candles to burn on each family member's baptism birthday. Make an extra one to use during your family prayer time. Melt paraffin and old crayons (for color) in a coffee can set inside a large saucepan partly filled with water. Wrap a string wick around the center of a pencil and place the pencil across the top of a juice can mold. Pour the paraffin into the mold. When the wax hardens, peel away the mold.

Make thumb prints to symbolize the God-given individuality of each person. Have each family member press his or her finger on an ink pad and make a fingerprint on a piece of heavy paper. Make picture frames for the prints by gluing four craft sticks together. Decorate them with texture paints or markers. Compare family members' fingerprints to see how they differ. Talk about how God makes each of us special and unique. Glue the print to the back of the frame. Have older family members help younger ones print "GOD'S CHILD" on top of the frame and the person's name on the bottom. These are fun to make year after year to see how the family members grow.

Celebrate everyone's baptism with a birthday cake. Using frosting, draw a shell on the top of the cake. Write the name of each family member inside the shell shape.

Light baptismal candles and dim the lights. (If you made candles, use those, or purchase candles for this purpose.) Join hands and invite each family member to pray silently, thanking God for welcoming them into God's family.

## Sharing God's Bounty

### Living for Jesus

erman Theologian Martin Luther said, "If someone would knock on my heart and ask, 'Who lives here?' I would say, 'Martin Luther once lived here, but he has moved out and Jesus has moved in.'" In Galatians 2:20 the apostle Paul wrote that he, too, lived for Jesus. "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God."

Who or what do you live for? If we live for ourselves and the things of the world, we will focus our attention and energy on amassing more and more things. It is easy for money and possessions to become overly important because our society tells us that more is better and that happiness and success can only be achieved by having the newest and best things. To find happiness and success, we work long and hard.



King Solomon, who was wealthy and wise, tried almost everything and found no satisfaction with things of the world. In Ecclesiastes, he tells us that he tried wine and women; he built houses, gardens, and parks; he bought slaves, herds and flocks, and amassed silver and gold. "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure . . . Yet when I surveyed all that my hands had done and what I had toiled to achieve, everything was meaningless, a chasing after the wind; nothing was gained under the sun." (Ecclesiastes 2:10-11). Regarding money, Solomon wrote, "Whoever loves money never has money enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with his income. This too is meaningless" (vs. 5:10).

In closing the book of Ecclesiastes, Solomon wrote, "Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this the whole duty of man. For God will bring every deed into judgment . . ." (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14). The only thing that finally gave Solomon's life purpose was living for God. Likewise, we as Christians understand that Jesus is the only person who can give us lasting peace, comfort, and security. He alone meets our needs. Jesus' tremendous sacrifice showed us his love for us and his love compels us to love him and live for him. Filled with Jesus' presence in our lives, we are empowered to overcome the pull of the world.
