## <u>PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...</u>

We've been keeping the mailperson very busy -by now you have received several mailings about Stewardship Season, asking you to prayerfully consider pledging a portion of your income to the church. We have had members of our congregation sharing the reasons why they give, telling stories about what this church has meant to them and why they value its ministries. Last Sunday, in my sermon, I attempted to emphasize that investing the Kingdom of God through our church is also investing in one another – through finances, leadership, acts of care and compassion, and ministries befitting the call of God in Christ Jesus. The point, of course, is not to create pressure on you, but to increase awareness of the coming call to pledge and prayerfully prepare all of us for commitment.

Churches take lots of different approaches to encourage giving. They send out letters, offer appeals, perform skits, and make calls. Some pastors preach blistering sermons, others appeal to visible needs like church upkeep — most all of us appeal to the teachings of Jesus, who actually had a LOT to say on the issue of money - I even know one church that requires all in-coming members to show their tax returns to the church council, in order to ascertain what 10% looks like for them.

But this church has chosen a values approach to stewardship. We believe that our people are people of depth, ideals, and aspiration. We want you to know that our giving here matters in eternal ways – that we change lives. It is the hope of our Stewardship Committee that we all understand that we are committing ourselves to more than paying the utilities (as important as that is) – we are investing in each other's well-being – in the care of our elderly, the nurturance of our families, the care of our children and the hope of our community. In short, we make a difference because we touch lives.

I am excited about this – because I believe that this Stewardship season has chosen emphasizes who we really are in Christ and who we are at our best. Our authentic values show when we talk about the difference we make in one another's lives and the world around us and our reasons for pledging are the best reasons possible. There is nothing hokey or artificial here – nothing contrived making promises that can't be kept. I was reading an article from Mayo Clinic about Migraines and thought I would share some of their information.

Migraines are a recurring type of headache. They cause moderate to severe pain that is throbbing or pulsing. The pain is often on one side of your head accompanied with other symptoms, such as nausea and weakness. You may be sensitive to light and sound. Migraine attacks can last for hours to days, and the pain can be severe that it interferes with your daily activities.

For some people, a warning symptom know as an aura occurs before or with the headache. An aura can include visual disturbances, such as flashes of light or blind spots, or other disturbances, such as tingling on one side of the face or in an arm or leg and difficulty speaking. Medications can help prevent some migraines and the pain. The right medicines, combined with self-help remedies and lifestyle changes, might help.

Migraines, which often begin in childhood, adolescence or early adulthood, can progress through four stages: prodrome, aura, attack and post-drome. Not everyone who has migraines goes through all stages.

The four stages of migraines:

- Prodrome: This stage you might notice changes that warn you of an upcoming onset 1-2 days prior such as constipation, mood changes from depression to euphoria, food cravings, neck stiffness, increased thirst and urination and frequent yawning.
- Aura: This stage occurs before or during a migraine. Auras are reversible symptoms of the nervous system. They're usually visual, but can also include other disturbances. Each symptom usually begins gradually, builds up over several minutes and lasts for 20 to 60 minutes. Some examples of this stage are include: visual phenomena, such as seeing various shapes, bright spots or flashes of light, vision loss, pins and needles sensations in an arm or leg, weakness or numbness in the face or one side of the body, difficulty speaking, hearing noises or music and uncontrollable jerking or other movements.
- Attack: A migraine usually lasts from 4 to 72 hours if untreated. Migraines vary from person to person. They might occur rarely or strike several times a month. During a migraine you might have pain usually on one side of your head, but often on both sides; the pain may throb or pulsate, you may have sensitivity to light, sound, and sometimes smell and touch and nausea and vomiting.
- Post-drome: After a migraine attack, you might feel drained, confused and washed out for up to a day. Some people report feeling elated. Sudden head movement might bring on the pain again briefly.

Migraines are often undiagnosed and untreated. If you regularly have signs and symptoms of migraine, keep a record of your attacks and how often you treated them. Then make an appointment with your doctor to discuss your headaches. Even if you have a history of headaches, see your doctor if the pattern changes or your headaches suddenly feel different. **See your doctor immediately or go to the emergency room** if you have any of the following signs and symptoms, which could indicate a more serious medical problem:

- \* An abrupt, severe headache like a thunderclap
- \* Headache with fever, stiff neck, mental confusion, seizures, double visions, weakness, numbness or trouble speaking
- \* Headache after a head injury, especially if the headache worsens
- \* A chronic headache that is worse after coughing, exertion, straining or a sudden movements
- \* New headache pain after age 50



## YOUR CARING MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Please try to imagine, if you were one of those children, how you would feel to receive food for the weekend when normally you worried about what you would eat.

## ADMINISTRATIVE & PERSONNEL

The Administrative and Personnel Committee has been asked by Session to present possible ways of reducing the number of Elders, terms of service and number of Standing Committees. The Nominating Committee is having a hard time finding individuals to fill Elder positions for 2020. Over the past few years finding Elders has been an ongoing challenge. Currently, there are 15 Elders serving 3 year terms and 9 committees. Each committee is chaired by an Elder. Five Elders are needed each year to fill the vacant positions of the Elders that are going off the Session. Some suggestions include reducing the number of Elders by four or five and combining committees. Also, reducing the terms of service from three to two years. The Session will take up the A&Ps suggestions and recommendations at the September meeting. There certainly are unintended consequences when you reduce the number of Elders and possibly change the structure and make up of the current committees. However, I feel confident that Session will, together as a whole, prayerfully decide what is best for FPC.

#### MODERATOR'S REPORT

Pastor Leanne thanked several committees for sponsoring successful events in September: Back to Church Sunday, Street Fair Fun and information, Messtival, Service of Wholeness, Papa's Pumpkin Patch, and Higher Power Lunch. Alternate date for Blessing of Pets is October 5th, 2:00 p.m. in case it rains on Sunday, Sept. 29th.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Administrative and Personnel—Session approved proposal to restructure committees, reduce number of Elders and Deacons, reduce terms of service to 2 years and develop responsibilities for combined committees. The congregation would need to approve changes to the bylaws, possibly at the annual congregational meeting. Session approved Dick Weber as Chair of Mission and Outreach after Gladys Cairns moves to NV, for the month of December.

**Business and Finance**—Budgeting process is underway. Session approved use of Lovering Fund to cover expenses of Christian Education Interns for the remainder of 2019. The Richter-Chapman Fund has been depleted.

**Christian Education**—Confirmation class will have a retreat in the Badlands October 25th-26th. Adult Bible Study continues on Tuesdays Noon; Adult Ed Class is Sunday Mornings at 9:00 a.m.

**Membership**—October 16 is the date for the Chili Cook-Off/Game/Movie Night.

Mission and Outreach—Thanksgiving Dinner for the community will again be held at FPC.

**Property and Equipment**—A water leak has developed along a north outside foundation wall; possible solution might include raising cement/re-sloping the area.

**Stewardship**—Consecration Sunday is October 13th followed by catered lunch. Reservation cards for the meal will be in the bulletin. Congregation will receive letters about the Stewardship Campaign.

**Worship and Music**—Twenty-five new choir robes will be purchased this fall. Congregation will have an opportunity to contribute to the committee's programs.

**Board of Deacons**—Committees continue to provide transportation, recordings and visits to elderly; monthly gatherings at Touchmark and communion preparation.

Child Care Center—Session approved the CCC parents having a lemonade stand and hotdog sale in the spring. Pancakes with Santa will be Dec. 14 with the Boy Scout Troop 6 helping. CCC Budget has a positive net income. More staff is needed to replace four who left, especially as more infants will be joining the center.

**Nominating**—a few more members are needed to complete the slate of officers for 2020.
