

# WallaceKids



Humility is a response of the character of God.

God has no beginning and no end. God is the creator and sustainer of the universe. He deserves all of our worship and praise for what He has done and continues to do in our life.

On the other hand, we are humans, created by God. And while we are the crowns of God's creation, we are nothing without our Creator God.

Yet so often, we act like we are God. We allow our pride to take over and forget that any of our strengths or accomplishments would not exist without God. The only proper response in light of God's greatness is to respond with humility in our interactions with the people around us.

#### Jesus is the ultimate example of humility.

Jesus is the Son of God. And in the beginning, Jesus was part of creating the heavens and the earth. And as the Son of God, there is nothing in Heaven or on earth that isn't under Jesus' command. Yet Jesus chose to become one of us. He was born as a baby and walked among us. He developed calloused hands as He worked in a carpenter's shop. The dirt of the road caked His feet as He traveled to show love to others. Jesus willingly left the majesty and glory of Heaven to laugh and cry as He fully became a human.

Jesus' ultimate act of humility on Earth was His sacrificial death. He could have called down an angel army to protect Him, but instead, allowed Himself to be wrongly accused and arrested. He could have been worshipped with a gold crown and royal robes, but instead wore a crown of thorns. Jesus deserved praise and adoration, but sacrificed Himself for us.

We live in a world that's all about putting ourselves first. Jesus lived in a world like that too. He could have looked out for Himself, called 10,000 angels to come and rescue Him. But He didn't. Out of His love for us He chose the humble route and put us first. It cost Him everything.

Putting others first will cost you something: your time or money. Maybe it will cost you some pride. But when we choose to follow Jesus with our lives, believing that His death and resurrection made it possible for us to be right with God, the least we can do is put others first even if it's a bit uncomfortable and cost us something.

We think it's important, especially at Easter, for us to help our kids and families discover more about humility—putting others first by giving up what you think you deserve.



Our Memory Verse for April comes from Philippians 2:3.

In Philippians 2:3, we read, Don't do anything only to get ahead. Don't do it because you are proud. Instead, be humble. Value others more than yourselves. (NIrV)

This verse is part of a passage that describes Jesus' humility. Jesus left everything He deserved to humble Himself to save us. As we respond to Jesus' love, we can show humility as we love on those around us.

As we celebrate Jesus' life, death, and resurrection this Easter season, we'll be taking a closer look at the way humility shows up throughout the end of Jesus' time on earth.

# Wallace Students



One of the strengths of youth ministry through the years has been its ability to adapt to whatever is needed by the culture at the time. In fact, over the years I've often referred to student ministry as the research and development department of the church. Sacred cows are few and far between as most churches are willing to take an "at all costs" approach to reaching the teens in their community where they aren't so ready to make those moves in the church ministries at large.

Well, we're at it again! I know, just what you wanted to hear, right? MORE CHANGES! Only this time, these changes are in line with other moves already being made by our adult ministries. That's right! Our adults have beaten the youth to the punch.

Starting at <u>6:00 p.m.</u> on <u>Sunday, April 2</u>, we will begin having our youth worship service once a month. This service will be called AMPLIFY. All of the things that make our youth service so great will continue at this once a month AMPLIFY service. So what will we be doing the rest of the month? I'm glad you asked. This is where we take a page from the adult ministries ongoing in our church.

Our student leadership team feels very strongly that we need a small group structure that will allow them to study the Bible together while having the ability to influence friends that would be more likely to join them at their house than at the church. Then, after a while, our students could get them to come to our monthly youth service with the hope that we would then be able to connect them to our church as a whole. Sidenote: There have been weeks recently where we had more teens at the 9:00 a.m. service than at our youth service on Sunday night. That's both exciting and challenging to us as a church body. It could indicate that if we offer something teens connect with in weekly worship that they would prefer to be with the full body of believers as opposed to by themselves.

Middle school and high school small groups will meet at host homes (to be determined) each Sunday afternoon/evening and work through a quick Bible reading plan and prayer time. Many churches are using this format now with much success when it comes to reaching lost teens.

This new format will run for a short trial period until our summer TRIBES program starts on June 4. At that time, we'll evaluate everything and see what changes need to be made, if any, to ensure that we are giving our students the best possible avenue to connect with God, encourage other believers, and carry the message of Christ to a lost world. Then AMPLIFY would continue the first Sunday in August as we sign up for a new semester of student small groups.

Please be in prayer for our students, the hosts of our small groups, and for the students that will hear the Gospel, perhaps for the first time, through this new approach.





## **The 1%**

I could fill this entire newsletter with Scripture references and commentary showing that church planting is an activity worthy of our response and support. The book of Acts is basically a journal on the activities of the first Christians planting churches in cities and towns all over their region. The rest of the New Testament is largely made up of Paul's letters back to churches that he was responsible for planting on his missionary journeys. In fact, we are here today, worshipping as First Baptist Church in Wallace, North Carolina because of the planting efforts that not only happened by those great heroes of our faith, but because those efforts have continued for over two thousand years in cities and towns all across the world.

# Church Plant

So, instead of sharing every piece of Scripture with you to support the cause of planting churches, let me share with you this one passage from Luke 15:

Tax collectors and other notorious sinners often came to listen to Jesus teach. This made the Pharisees and teachers of religious law complain that he was associating with such sinful people—even eating with them! So Jesus told them this story: "If a man has a hundred sheep and one of them gets lost, what will he do? Won't he leave the ninety-nine others in the wilderness and go to search for the one that is lost until he finds it? And when he has found it, he will joyfully carry it home on his shoulders. When he arrives, he will call together his friends and neighbors, saying, Rejoice with me because I have found my lost sheep.' In the same way, there is more joy in heaven over one lost sinner who repents and returns to God than over ninety-nine others who are righteous and haven't strayed away! "Or suppose a woman has ten silver coins and loses one. Won't she light a lamp and sweep the entire house and search carefully until she finds it? And when she finds it, she will call in her friends and neighbors and say, Rejoice with me because I have found my lost coin.' In the same way, there is joy in the presence of God's angels when even one sinner repents."

Most of us are familiar with the parables of the lost sheep and lost coin. However, after 16 years in ministry, I'm amazed at how many times we don't take the mind of our Father into account when we plan our church calendars and budgets (but that's another topic for another article).

A few things that we should notice:

- 1. Jesus left the religious to gather with sinful people Yes, we are all sinful people, even after experiencing God's grace. And yes, God still desires to be directly involved in our lives as believers. That's not the point here. The point of this passage is that God desires the pursuit of the entirety of his flock. We get comfortable when the church begins to get full or our friends have all joined up, gotten saved, and are hanging out with us in Bible study now. But that wasn't the heart of Jesus. Even with 99% of the sheep safe and sound, Jesus told us that the heart of heaven is to go and find the 1% that is lost.
- 2. The intensity of the search Notice that in neither story did the person who had lost something quit searching until it was found. They didn't reach a point where they said, "Well, we've looked everywhere we know to look...we've done everything we know to do" and then give up trying to find that which was lost. No, they searched until they found what they were looking for.

"But James, we'll never be able to reach every single lost person on the planet." Ah! Now you're getting it! As long as there is breath in our lungs, our job is to be searching. We are called to be the hands and feet of Jesus on this earth. What were the hands and feet of Jesus doing while he was here? He came to "seek and save" those who are lost.

3. Our source of joy If we are believers on our way to spend eternity with our Heavenly Father, then doesn't it make sense that we should be happy about the things that make heaven happy? I think it does. Notice the source of pure joy that is shown not for the sheep or the coin, but for the sinner who repents. Where is that joy in our churches today?

We get happy about all the believers coming back to see us at homecoming. We are fired up about a laser tag or bowling trip. The excitement builds for a year for the next bus trip. That's not to say that any of those things are bad. They aren't. Those are great fellowship opportunities that we have as brothers and sisters in Christ.

My point is that our excitement pales in comparison when a lost person accepts Christ and comes to know him. That is a fact that has been publicly on display in the last year in our church (again, another topic for another article).

Could it be that our excitement isn't where it should be for the lost coming to know Jesus because we haven't expended very much energy in looking for them?

If we were honest with ourselves as believers and as a church, we haven't done a whole lot to "sweep the entire house and look carefully" when it comes to finding and reaching the lost. And because we haven't, we simply can't be overjoyed when they come to know Jesus.

That's why church planting is so important to what we are doing as a church. Churches don't just magically pop up here and there. They are birthed out of the heart and desire of people in churches who have decided to do whatever it takes to reach the lost.

Next month, I'll share with you some alarming statistics regarding the church in America, however, I've also got some very promising statistics for churches that decide to plant churches. And I'll tell you specifically what we can do as a church to carry our weight in this church planting journey. Until then, as we approach Easter, make it your personal prayer that God would break your heart for the lost in such a way that you could be truly overjoyed when we finally find them and bring them home.
