The Reverend's Ruminations - August 2021



As we swelter under yet another heat wave, still with little moisture on the crops and lawns, it's no doubt that we're in the "dog days of summer." I'm not so sure that the dogs of the area even enjoy having their persona attached to such heat, but who am I to change an historic idiom? Maybe we should all follow the lead of our canine family members, Lando (left) and Obi-Wan (right), and enjoy a dip in a pool or local lake!



Despite the undeniable summer climate, some of our church boards and the council have already begun looking ahead to what for many has become another checkpoint in the return from COVID restrictions: **autumn**—and a new school year. As I mentioned in last month's "Ruminations," we are cautiously optimistic that improved (albeit slowing) vaccination rates in the area may allow us to resume some of our favorite church activities like the Free Community Meal or an adult Sunday School class by September. Christian Education opportunities for all ages are set to kick off on September 12, so I hope that you will take part whether you're 3, 83, or anywhere between (and beyond)!

Before we get the cart before the horse (wow, another old idiom in the same article?), maybe we should think about August. "Minnesota's Other Big Fair" (the Martin County Fair) and THE Minnesota State Fair are still on the horizon, but will be here before you know it. At church during the month of August, our sermons will continue to draw from the epistle lessons in the Revised Common Lectionary, and specifically Paul's Letter to the Ephesians. We've already spent the last three weeks of July looking at selections from the first three chapters of Ephesians, so if you're staying cool indoors and are looking for an easily accessible book of the Bible, check out the remaining three chapters—or read through Paul's letter in its entirety to prepare for the upcoming worship experience.

The city of Ephesus was a metropolitan port city important to the Persian, Egyptian, and Roman Empires, and located near the western shores of modern-day Turkey. As such it was a melting pot of many cults and religions of those eras. Fairmont may not be quite as strategic or metropolitan, but our modern world continually bombards us with influences, both evil and holy, each and every day. As Paul encouraged the young Christian congregation in Ephesus, so I encourage you as it may apply:

"Now this I affirm and insist on in the Lord: you must no longer live as the Gentiles live, in the futility of their minds. They are darkened in their understanding, alienated from the life of God because of their ignorance and hardness of heart. They have lost all sensitivity and have abandoned themselves to licentiousness, greedy to practice every kind of impurity. That is not the way you learned Christ! For surely you have heard about him and were taught in him, as truth is in Jesus. You were taught to put away your former way of life, your old self, corrupt and deluded by its lusts, and to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and to clothe yourselves with the new self, created according to the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness." (4:17-24, NRSV)

May the remainder of your summer be filled with warmth, family, and opportunities of rejuvenation for your soul.

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES - July 21, 2021

Members present: Dolores Gronewald, Wendy Ziemer, Larry Thompson, Abigail Roiger, Ace Adams, Jane Kotewa, Joanne Eisenbarger, Catherine Johnson, and Sue Kruse. Ex-officio members Rev. Cory Germain and Dara Bliesmer were also present. Robbin and Cathy Celander, Kay Campe, and Christina Hainy were unable to attend.

Vice Moderator Ms. Roiger opened the meeting, with devotions and prayer offered by Pastor Germain.

Minutes of the June Council meeting were approved as printed. Financial report was received as printed. A note from the Treasurer, Ms. Johnson, will be included in the August newsletter.

Pastor Germain reported that Communion services are again being enjoyed at Lakeview and Goldfinch, that worship in the park was a perfect day for enjoying God's world, and that he presided at two funerals for church members. He will be attending a Presbyterian chaplain training week in August in the Great Smokey Mountains, accompanied by Ellen.

BOARD REPORTS:

-C.E. is planning for Sunday School opening on September 12, and will have the Smart TV direct wired to the internet for more reliable use with the classes.

-Hospitality is discussing fall activities. Pies? Cookie walk? There is not yet a plan for Harvest Festival.

-Facilities reports that the north tower repair project is complete, and that the sidewalk on the southwest (main entrance) will be replaced yet this year. General maintenance work continues, with a workday scheduled this month.

-Diaconate reported that efforts continue to find rides for church for those who are unable to drive.

-Missions indicated that the Blessing Box for August will go to Habitat for Humanity. Total proceeds to date for the Relay for Life (including June Blessing Box) were \$1,988.

-Worship Committee did not meet this month.

OLD BUSINESS: Decision regarding the start of a Capital Campaign and Stewardship Drive will be made in August. The Multicultural event held June 24 on our campus and nearby was somewhat hampered by heavy rains, but late in the day was enjoyed by 200 folks. 10 vaccinations were given by Mayo staff in Heritage Hall.

NEW BUSINESS: New church email addresses will be set up for the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, and Financial Secretary for increased security. Plans will continue for a "Welcome Home" Sunday, perhaps to be combined with the opening of Sunday School and/or Stewardship efforts. Other ideas will also be considered.

Closing prayer was offered by Pastor Germain.

Meeting was adjourned by the Vice Moderator.

You can bike on a stationary bicycle or get outside

Notes from the Church Treasurer

Thanks to everyone who so generously supports the work of this church! Here are some of the financial highlights for the first 6 months of 2021. People have given 45% of this year's budget of \$145,000. We budgeted very cautiously for 2021 due to the uncertainties created by COVID 19. The current bills for the North Tower roof repair and masonry work have been paid without having to borrow money. We applied for and received a 2nd PPP loan/grant of \$11,000. Thanks to all who have organized and participated in fundraisers. So far this year fundraisers have raised \$3250. The congregation continues to generously support mission projects beyond the general budget. So far, people have given \$3075 to mission projects. We are grateful that our church has received generous bequests from the Trusts of Warren and Mildred Brodt for capital improvements and for general programming.

Follow the ice climbing, four-wheeling, sky diving, and skateboarding adventures of Bob Goff, Greg Boyd, Mo Isom, and Karen McKinney as they seek one thing - **Reckless Love.** This fun and inspiring 4-episode video series asks the big questions while encouraging you to recklessly live out your faith.

Mandarin Orange Cake



<u>Ingreatents:</u> 2c sugar 2c flour 2 eggs 2 small cans mandarin oranges, drained (keep juice) 2t baking soda 2t vanilla 1t salt 1c chopped nuts Combine all ingredients and mix well

Pour into a 13"x9" pan (I like to use a well-oiled bundt cake pan) Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. <u>Topping:</u> 3/4c brown sugar 3T mandarin juice 3T butter

Bring to a boil. Spoon or pour over entire cake after baked. Serve hot or cold.
