What Each of Us Can Do to Reduce Non-Source Point Pollution

- · Clean up after you pets to avoid pathogens from being washed into the sewers.
- Limit your use of water when raining to reduce the amount of water discharges into the lake.
- Direct water runoff from your roof into lawns, flowerbeds or other vegetation areas rather than paved areas. Direct Gutters at least 5 feet from your home to prevent infiltration into the weeping tiles.
- · Use phosphate-free laundry and dishwasher detergent. Phosphates encourage algae growth, which can reduce other aquatic life.
- · Try non-toxic products such as baking soda or vinegar for household cleaning.
- Wash your car only when absolutely necessary and use a biologically friendly soap sparingly.
- · Keep fertilizers off paved areas to prevent rainwater washing the chemicals into the sewers.
- · If you use a professional lawn care service, select a company that uses fertilizers sparingly and properly.
- Reduce oil pollution and fix car leaks! A single gallon of used motor or transmission oil has the potential of contaminating thousands of gallons of water. Recycle used oil and antifreeze by taking them to service stations and other recycling centers. - · Boat owners must use caution when applying cleansers, anti-fouling compounds, or paints and when fueling.
- Never pour toxic household chemicals down the drain or on the ground. Take them to a hazardous waste collection center. Macomb County Health Department, 43525 Elizabeth Rd., Mt. Clemens phone (586) 459-5236 for more information.
- Conserve water. Install a water saving showerhead. Place two half gallon plastic bottles filled with water in the toilet tank. Check for leaky faucets and repair them. Put a trigger nozzle on your outdoor hose; it uses water more efficiently and will save money on your water bill.

- If you live on the water, contour your lawn with a simple swale and berm system to reduce direct runoff into the water.
- Participate in river, lake and beach cleanups. To volunteer for the next Nautical Coast Cleanup, call (586) 779-8777.
- · Encourage awareness of non-point source pollution among your family members, neighbors, friends and co-workers.
- Do something every day to help ensure that our children and grandchildren will have clean water.
