WHO DO YOU IMITATE?



I continue to be amazed at how relevant and even unambiguously familiar scriptural passages and stories can be in our modern life. This reality clearly confirms their authenticity as divinely inspired, and the fact that they truly fulfill

their purpose, according to 2 Timothy 3:16, which tells us that "all scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness."

Our first reading this weekend tells the story of the Prophet Elijah on the run. Space and time from his austere desert environment to our comparatively comfortable daily lives may seem unbridgeable. But a closer look at his world shows that we face the same basic realities that sent him running for his life.

First, Israel was surrounded by nations with cultures that contradict their Jewish culture. For example, all of them had multiple gods as opposed to Israel's One True God. Just like in our world today, their neighbors decided that their gods, values and cultures were the best things that happened to the human race and wanted to 'export' same to Israel. Well, they succeeded exceedingly well. Check out 1 Kings chapter 18 and the opening verses of 19.

Recently Nigeria's new president was in Washington for a meeting. He met with President Obama. One of the issues Obama brought up for discussion was Nigeria's stance on gay marriage. In his recent visit to Kenya, the topic came up also. Recently, countries whose values and cultures 'abhor' gay relationships have been under pressure from those who see it as a value to be upheld. So, Israel too was under pressure from their neighbors to imbibe their (neighbors') foreign cultures, religion, and values. Some caved in. Elijah would not be silent or inactive. So, now he's on the run for his life.

In Elijah's Israel, public policies and personal lifestyles not only contradicted the covenant commands but pressured believers to conform. From Nigeria to the US, we all know how true this reality is. Elijah definitely didn't find this funny. He spoke up. And now he's on the run.

In Elijah's Israel, corrupt politics and politicians bred social injustice. If one thinks that our politicians here in US are corrupt, that person ought to visit Nigeria and some other countries.

These are samples of what Elijah fought until he couldn't take it any longer. "Enough, O Lord!" he cried out (1 Kings 19:4). Next, he sought escape. But the Lord ultimately sent him back to work.

Examining these stark realities of our human society is not meant to discourage or get us angry. Rather they are to teach us, correct us, train us, etc. And Paul offers us a way out of the problem or at least an alternative. He challenges us to be "imitators of God" and to remove "bitterness, fury, anger, shouting, and reviling ... malice" (Ephesians 5:1, 4:31).

In effect, even when our values differ from others and we're under pressure to conform, we must hold firm but do so without the negativity that is counterproductive. This way, we'll be imitators of God our Father (Ephesians 5:1).

Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary(SOLEMNITY - AUGUST 15th)

On November 1, 1950, Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope declared this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians, and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries the Eastern churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However, by the thirteenth century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names (Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption) from at least the fifth or sixth century.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's Assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, chapter 12 of Revelation speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testament, her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory. Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20 Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first-fruits of those who have fallen asleep. Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to belief in Mary's share in His glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with Him body and soul in heaven.

COMMENT: In the light of the Assumption of Mary, it is easy to pray her Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55) with new meaning. In her glory she proclaims the greatness of the Lord and finds joy in God her savior. God has done marvels to her and she leads others to recognize God's holiness. She is the lowly handmaid who deeply reverenced her God and has been raised to the heights. From her position of strength she will help the lowly and the poor find justice on earth and she will challenge the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.

QUOTE: "In the bodily and spiritual glory which she possesses in heaven, the Mother of Jesus continues in this present world as the image and first flowering of the Church as she is to be perfected in the world to come. Likewise, Mary shines forth on earth, until the day the Lord shall come (cf. 2 Peter 3:10), as a sign of certain hope and comfort for the pilgrim People of God" (*Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, 68*).
