PSSC BOARD MEETING MINUTES 09/23/20

The Prairieland Standard Schnauzer Board meeting was held virtually via a ZOOM meeting on Wednesday, September 23, 2020, 6:30 p.m. President Connie presided on our first experiment with a non-face-to-face meeting. Thank you to Don Kachur for arranging and set up of the Zoom meeting.

In attendance were Kathy Koehler, Penny Duffee, Connie Reidner, Gwen Kirman, Marsha Landers, Don and Diane Kachur, and Lynne Conder.

Secretary's Report: Minutes of the last club meeting (3/18/20) were accepted as published. (Kathy/Marsha)

Treasurer's Report: No financial report was given.

NEW BUSINESS

- Lynne mentioned reading in an AKC enewsletter that clubs meeting virtually should review their club bylaws to be certain meeting virtually is "legal".
- Penny said the local Corn Belt KC (Penny and Kathy are members) had already done such research. Penny will check with the person who worked on this issue for CBKC.
 ADDENDUM: Penny returned this information to the Board members on 10/1 - our club is able to hold "legal" virtual meetings - our by-laws do not prohibit such meetings. So we can continue to hold official Zoom meetings (and of course a few "fun" get-togethers too) until such time that we all feel safe to meet together in person.

The AKC letter to clubs states that bylaws are only required to be amended if they "<u>require in-person meetings</u>". Our bylaws do not require in person meetings. The AKC letter expressly states that "<u>If Bylaws permit or are silent on the holding of meetings via</u> <u>"virtual", "electronic", or teleconference/videoconference meetings, the club may hold</u> <u>such meetings subject to State Law.</u>"

Illinois law allows boards of directors and committees of not for profit corporations to hold virtual meetings unless the articles of incorporation or bylaws of the corporation specifically prohibit them.

The same is true for member meetings under Illinois law.

OLD BUSINESS

Festival of Trees 2020 (FOT)

- FOT will be a hybrid event this year 11/16-21 with donated auction items available online for viewing and bidding, plus a safe in-person marketplace for wreaths, table decorations and trees.
- Interested PSSC members will participate individually instead of as a club. No group work day will be held either.

May 2021 Specialty

- Our May 2020 show plans are being recycled for 2021; basically everything was already in place so little extra planning is needed for 2021.
- One change for 2021 is the addition of 2 new Sweeps classes at our specialty: 18-24 months and 24-30 months. Since there is no National show this year some dogs could age out of being in a sweeps. Vote carried: 2 additional classes and 2 trophies (Penny/Lynne).
- Penny will notify the Sweeps judge Carol Hathaway about the changes.

Grooming Seminar at 2021 show

- A previously planned grooming seminar will be held. Hopefully it will help draw show attendees.
- Connie already has the stripping stones that were previously ordered.
- Penny will get the information added to the premium list.

Next Newsletter

- Penny suggested requesting member input again for the next newsletter. Previously members sent several articles and pictures that made the newsletter interesting during a time with no club activity.
- Lynne will send an email to members. Deadline will be 10/7.

Bonus info and Brags

- Penny and Kathy described attending an outdoor show in Iowa with Covid restrictions.
- Several members told about their recent dog activities and successes; see newsletter for individual updates.

Meeting was adjourned at 7:35 p.m. No future meeting was discussed.

2021 Specialty

Plans are still under way for our annual specialty next May. So much depends on the virus situation in the country at that time but we are all hoping to be able to hold the shows.

One addition to the 2021 Specialty will be a

Senior Sweepstakes. Because our 2020 specialty was cancelled, there will be puppies who will age out of eligibility to participate in the usual Puppy Sweepstakes. So – this year only we are going to offer a Senior Sweeps. There will be 2 age classes – 18– 24 months and 24-30 months. That age spread will cover the dogs that would have been eligible last year. There will be classes for dogs and bitches (same as any other classes at the shows). Potentially there will be 4 class winners and they will compete for Best in Senior Sweepstakes and Best Opposite Sex to Best in Senior Sweepstakes.

To recap. . . there will be 3 sweepstake competitions -

- Puppy Sweepstakes for puppies (dogs and bitches) 6 mos-18 mos,
- Senior Sweepstakes for dogs and bitches 18 mos- 30 mos, and
- Veterans Sweepstakes for dogs and bitches 7 yr and older.

DOG SHOWS – THE COVID EFFECT By: Penny Duffee

We all enjoy our dog shows. . . fun to see everyone, have dinner or cookouts, play with dogs, etc. However this COVID-19 virus has really changed everything. For several months all dog shows were cancelled – we exhibitors suffered withdrawal pangs but agreed it was very important for everyone to stay safe and healthy. Various activities are now beginning to return – but with a distinctly different look !

After MUCH debate and vacillating back and forth, we finally ventured forth to the great unknown world of dog shows in the world of COVID. We chose an outdoor show – and selected a club who used a superintendent that had already put on several shows with no known ill effects. (Onofrio Dog Shows – they do our May shows in Bloomington). Even as we left home, we agreed that if there was any reason to feel unsafe any time during the weekend, we would leave immediately. There was a long list of restrictions and requirements to which each exhibitor had to agree to follow as a part of the entry process. Failure to do so could result in being asked to leave with no recourse or refunds.

The shows were held at a large RV park and exhibition center in Amana lowa area so everything was fairly well spread out. No outside spectators were allowed – people arriving during the day had to show an entry to be allowed onto the grounds. There was no indoor grooming – exhibitors groomed at their cars, vans or motorhomes. Masks were required whenever people were in the show area. You went to the ring at the breed's show time – and were expected to leave as soon as you were done. . . no hanging around the ring area to visit. That was hard because SS people are social – and we do not see each other very

often. The rings were large and outside. Each ring had 2 gates - one "in" gate and one "out" gate. The armbands were laid out on a table by the "in" gate (no steward to hand them out) – each exhibitor had to know their dog(s) number and pick up their own armbands. Dogs went into the ring keeping a 6' distance between each one. The judges did have a hands on exam of the dogs – but most were quick. After the judge had placed the class, we left the ring thru the "out" gate – and picked up the appropriate ribbon(s) on a table by the gate on our way out.

The judges arrived at the show site early. The photographer took pictures of each judge with a variety of ribbons/rosettes that they would be awarding during the day. Each winner was photographed alone and then the photographer photo shopped in the judge with the appropriate ribbons. It was really strange to not see the judge and thank them for the win.

We did have some social time. . . The weather was good so we had a cookout – with everyone spread out in a big circle. While there were no hugs, I think we all felt our hearts were warmed by seeing everyone and sharing stories, getting caught up on the news and happenings in everyone's lives during these strange times.

The dog show "grape vine" is pretty wide spread. No reports of any health issues have been reported following the shows or following other shows this fall.

Progress is being made with treatment and vaccines but it will be a while before we all have access to them. Hopefully if everyone wears their masks, keep distanced and is careful, we can continue to have some "new" types of activities.

Owning a dog is a great way to learn responsibility. Caring for a canine is a big commitment – one that may last a decade or longer – that forces you to be dependable, patient, structured


and sensible. After all, your dog depends on you for survival! Having responsibility lends your life a greater sense of purpose, ultimately improving your wellbeing.




I would encourage anyone with C-Wags available in their area to give it a try. Last week we had a new 13 year old female Standard Schnauzer show up from Decatur, IL!
