HAZZAN'S NOTES



In December, we celebrate the military victory of our people over the Syrian/Greeks through the Maccabees and others which we call Hanukkah. We begin to light the *Hanukkiyah* or Hanukkah Menorah with 9 candles versus the Shabbat candelabrum of two or the temple Menorah of seven candles.

This reminds us that Hanukkah is a special time in our calendar for good reason.

This festival is set at 8 days not because of the Talmudic myth of the small cruise of oil that lasted miraculously by legend for 8 days, but, because our ancestors wished to find the closest holiday which they could celebrate to rededicate the first temple anew. That festival was Sukkot/Sh'mini Atzeret which, as you know, is 8 days with Sh'mini Atzeret as the last day. That is why many of the liturgical traditions of Hanukkah follow what we would do for Sukkot rather than its own status as a minor festival, i.e. full Hallel, reading the Torah each day of Hanukkah etc.

Also, a word about our well-known musical version of *Maoz Tzur*. The version everyone knows and loves is actually based on a Lutheran hymn from the German states. It became synonymous with this text in the 16th century when the hymn came out and has stuck ever since. But, you should know, that there are other well known tunes for this text including one by the great Hazzan of the 20th century—Pierre Pinchik (whose family heritage came from the Sephardic communities of the Caucasus mountains) and also one notated down from another older German tradition by the non-Jewish Italian composer, Bendetto Marcello, sometimes erroneously credited to him. This shows our wide fabric of Jewish tradition around our holidays. May the light of the Hanukkah candles brighten your nights and give you the enjoyment they are to impart based on the Talmudic dictums on them.

Parasha Yayishlach Genesis 32:435:29

The Torah portion Vayishlach is read in synagogues on the 16th of Kislev (December 14, 2019). It contains the following major parts:

- 1. Jacob wrestles with an angel who wounds his thigh and changes his name to ISRAEL.
- 2. Jacob and his brother Esau meet and make peace with each other.
- 3. Dinah, the daughter of Leah and Jacob, is violated by Shechem.
- 4. Dinah's blood brothers, Simeon and Levi, take revenge by murdering all the males of Shechem and plundering the city.
- 5. Rachel dies giving birth to Benjamin and is buried on the road near Bethlehem.
- 6. Isaac dies and is buried in Hebron near his parents Abraham and Sarah.
- 7. Listing of the genealogy of Jacob and Esau.


<u>Significance of a Name</u>—For our Jewish people, a name not only bestows identity, it also reflects religious and spiritual meaning. The Torah portrays naming as the first independent human act. Jacob after conquering the angel sent from G-d is given the name Israel, meaning "champion of G-d". The struggle he fought paved the way for the ultimate salvation of Jacob and the entire Jewish people. For although he was wounded and limped the rest of his life, Jacob prevailed and went on to greater accomplishments. Our people have suffered greatly, but have emerged with even greater victories such as the state of Israel. We must all remember that as a result of that nights struggle Jacob ceased to be the "quiet man, dwelling in tents" (Genesis 25:27) and became G-ds champion.

<u>Reconciliation</u>—Making peace with one's former enemies has been a Jewish tradition. The Torah tells of the family unification of Jacob and his brother Esau whose birthright he had stolen. Jacob reasoned that reconciliation was the best course to follow. He sent a delegation with gifts and prayers to impress upon Esau his humility, and assuage their long hostility. This tactic worked and both brothers enjoyed a mutual peace and understanding with each other.

The Torah portion says that Jacob's wound sets an example for the Jewish people to never eat the sinew of the thigh vein. This has become one of the Jewish dietary laws. This precept is a constant reminder of Divine Providence to our people of Jacob's experience with G-d's angel.

By reflecting upon the significance of the Chanukah miracles, we can see, with ever-increasing clarity, the miraculous dimension of events in our own time.

Please join your Beth Shalom Family on December 27 at 7:30 p.m. for our Chanukah Service. We will celebrate after with a festive Oneg.
