BGEN Wilma Vaught awarded Presidential Medal of Freedom

Brigadier General Wilma L. Vaught, 92, was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom at a White House ceremony on July 7th. Presented by President Biden, the medal is the nation's highest civilian award, and recognizes individuals who have made "an especially meritorious contribution to the security or national interests of the United States, world peace, cultural or other significant public or private endeavors."

The recognition captures Wilma's devotion to her country perfectly. Following her trailblazing, 29-year career in the US Air Force, she continued to serve by leading the construction and operation of the Women in Military Service to America Memorial. Now known as the Women's Military Memorial, this penultimate memorial combines current technology and a brick-&-mortar structure at the entrance to Arlington National Cemetery, to honor all American military women, while sharing their personal stories as well as their common history.

Wilma calls the memorial "the most important thing she has ever done," but her life-long journey began just like many of her sister servicewomen: with a patriotic desire to serve her country.

When Wilma joined the military in the 1950s, the number of women serving, job opportunities, duty station options, and career perspectives were all severely limited. When the US began ramping up for the Vietnam War, some policies were changed due to the increased need for human resources.

She was commissioned as a second Lieutenant after Officer Training School at Lackland Air Force Base, and had several assignments between then and April 1963, including chief of the Management Analysis Division, 3974th Combat Support Group at Zaragoza Air Base in Spain.

Returning to the US, she served at McCoy Air Force Base,



Florida, where she became the first woman to deploy with a Strategic Air Command operational unit when she served at Andersen Air Force Base, Guam, during Operation Arc Light.

Between 1968 and 1969, Wilma became one of the few non-medical, women to serve in-country Vietnam as part of the Military Assistance Command, Vietnam, in Saigon, Republic of Vietnam. (She is pictured at left during her tour in Vietnam.)



Her storied military career continued as she broke more glass ceilings and assumed increasingly challenging positions. In September 1980, while serving in Air Force Systems Command as deputy chief of staff, comptroller, Wilma was promoted to brigadier general, the first woman selected for promotion to that rank in the comptroller field.

While Wilma had personally witnessed the evolution of women serving in the military, she was concerned that the role of service women was going unnoticed. Upon her retirement from the Air Force, she doubled-down her effort to push for a memorial to military women. The rest, as they say, is history.



Recruiting For MWAN? How much have you done lately?

At first glance, recruiting can seem like a daunting task. The reality is, it can be as simple as saying "Hello" to another woman veteran in a checkout line at the store, and completing the mission by simply handing her a card with your unit or MWAN's contact information.

It amazes me that I still run into military women who have never heard of MWAN and were unaware there are many sisterhood organizations available where they can meet and join in with other military women.

Of deep concern, is that over the past five years, our membership numbers have drastically dropped. Not too long ago, we had 34 units nationwide. Now we have fewer than 18, and some of them are barely hanging on.


