Clarence Ventline, elevator manager, said the corn would not pour from the chute at the bottom of the bin and Herriman apparently climbed into the top to dislodge the grain.

view as the corn poured from the bin. Ventline said it was not known whether Herriman fell from a ladder inside the bin or whether ladder inside the bin or whether he stepped onto the packed corn. It was estimated he had been in the bin only seven to 10 min-

utes. Caseville firemen applied artificial respiration but to no avail.
Coroner James F. Colgan, who
investigated with Huron County sheriff's officers, said death
was due to suffocation.

A WORKER AT the elevator the past two years, Mr. Herri-man was born Nov. 7, 1921, near Elkton. He would have observed his 43rd birthday today. A veteran of World War II, he was married in May of 1946 to Marguerite Yax at St. Felix Church.
