Come Away!

Throughout our lives we go away. The going can be for many and various reasons. Life changes is one of those reasons. Often, we are headed to a new place, a new school, a new job, a new home. These life changes can be both exciting and stressful, joyful and sad.

fall as I sat overlooking the Judean desert at Wadi Qelt follows:

"The movement of the land and the vegetation with clumps of 'green' and occasional trees seems to me as a metaphor of life - life with its ups and downs flowing through the years with adequate sustenance and occasional bonuses, all given through God's grace, as the desert receives from the water of life."

You don't need to go several thousand miles to find a deserted place, a place to be alone with God. A place where you can listen and feel the stillness of creation.



There have been many mornings in the past 18 years when I have walked alone on the beach on Topsail Island with

nothing in sight but sand and water. Those are the times when I hear that "still small voice."
