# CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY WORKFORCE INITIATIVE IMPACT REPORT 2012-17

**ACCESS • EXPOSURE • OPPORTUNITIES** 

CIWI Sponsors, Key Stakeholders, and Supporters.

With six years under of our belt, CIWI continues to hold closely to our mission...to provide access, exposure, and opportunities for lower-income college students (majority first generation) with an interest in Construction, Real Estate Development, A&E and Civic Engagement.

A quick snapshot includes the following key Accomplishments and Milestones (2012-2017):

- CIWI has delivered 61 internships, including 50% to young women and 50% to young men;
  - 100 percent of the internships have gone to students of color, including:
    - African American: 26 interns (43%)
    - Latino: 24 interns (39%)
    - Asian/Pacific Islander: 11 interns (18%)
- In total, CIWI has achieved equity in its internship placements, with 30 secured by young women and 31 secure by young men.
- Targeted outreach to core program market areas including San Francisco's District 10 (Bayview/Hunters Point) and Oakland's District 3 (Downtown Oakland/West Oakland), as well as Central and East Oakland.
- Expanded partnerships with four key community-based educational organizations including: College Track, East Bay College Fund, and Juma Ventures and Lighthouse Community Charter High School (East Oakland).
- Internships by participating sponsors includes:
  - General Construction: 33 Internships (54%)
  - Real Estate Development: 23 internships (38%)
  - Architecture & Engineering: 5 Internships (8%)





### Internships: By Discipline/Scope, 2012-2017




### CIWI INTERNS: BY THE NUMBERS


#### **Number of Interns**

CIWI has developed its program goals to achieve realistic and sustainable growth. Over our first six years, CIWI has delivered a total of 61 internships.




#### **Community Based Partners**

CIWI has established strong partnerships with grass-roots partners including College Track, East Bay College Fund, Juma Ventures. In 2016, we included Lighthouse Community Charter HS, based in East Oakland.




#### **Ethnicity**

CIWI has achieved strong diversity over our first six years. We have created specific outreach strategies to maximize our efforts in San Francisco's D10 and in Oakland's Central and East Oakland communities. 100 percent of our 61 internship positions have been secured by students of color.




### Technical Skill and Civic Engagement Impact/Total Hours.

Since 2012, CIWI interns have secured approximately 12,300 hours of technical training and civic engagement exposure through their internship positions.



#### Gender

Working closely with our key CBO partners, CIWI has achieved gender equity in our placements, with 30 internships secured by young women and 31 internships secured by young men.

### NEW PARTNERS + FUNDERS + INITIATIVES





In 2016, CIWI secured its first public sector grant with the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SF PUC). This two-year grant (\$10,00 per year) allowed CIWI to design and implement its innovative LEED+Sustainable Infrastructure Program (L+SIP).

Our 2017 L+SIP program included partnerships with several key stakeholders and guest speakers (including representatives from Thorton Tomassetti, STOK, Tishman Speyer, Center for Creative Land Recycling, and USGBC. L+SIP provided our interns with a solid understanding of the following:

- Project Specific LEED training + Sustainability Analysis + Due Diligence;
- Participated in five workshops targeted to Sustainability and Systems (eg., Aquacell Recycling System at Transbay Block 1 and Net Zero Energy Presentation and Building Tour/STOK); and
- Attended USGBC's Greenerbuilder conference at the Zero Net Energy Center (San Leandro, CA).

For the second year in a row, Lendlease sponsored CIWI at their annual golf tournament. This year, Lendlease (and its extended subcontractor and key partner family) raised over \$45,000-- allowing for the development of an innovative and multi-year partnership with CIWI. Funding has allowed CIWI to reach out to new community-based and educational partners to increase and expand our outreach efforts, including including CCSF's Architecture/CM/Interior Design program.

In total, Lendlease has invested over \$100,000 in CIWI over the last two years, resulting in additional internship placements, funding for our Civic Engagement Program, and related and innovative programs planned for the 2018 program.

In 2017, funding was earmarked for interns as well as underwriting CIWI's very successful LEED+Sustainable Infrastructure Program (L+SIP) as well as our participation in the USGBC's Greenerbuilder Conference, convened at the Zero Net Energy Center.


# CIVIC ENGAGEMENT EVENTS: SFHAC / SPUR OAKLAND
