Worship in the Park

If you live out of town, you are welcome to bring your bike and join us after the service as all are invited to Bike to Lunch (You are also welcome to drive to lunch—place is TBA).

Pastor's Word

Our mission team has been back home for over a month now. After some time for reflection, I'd like to share some thoughts about our mission trip to Puerto Rico.

Our group of 14 team members arrived in San Juan on June 8. We went on to Fajardo, in the northeast corner of the island, where we stayed at Primera Iglesia Bautista (First Baptist Church). We were received warmly. This church provided an air-conditioned place to sleep and fed us bountifully for breakfast and dinner each day.

We worked about 15 miles away at Iglesia Bautista Jerusaleń, in an outlying barrio of Luquillo. (Luquillo features several beautiful beaches, but we worked farther inland.) The church and residents in this area were without power for close to six months after Hurricane Maria. Some had generators, but fuel was hard to come by. Despite their difficulties, the church continued to worship through it all and sent a team to help out in a harder hit area of the island.

This church had about 400 members before the storm. There are now around 250 members. Many have left for jobs in Texas or Florida. About 500,000 people have left Puerto Rico since Maria, and those who leave tend to be younger, more skilled, and with more means.

While most of us heard some time ago that everyone on the island now has power, this is not the case. 98-99% of people may have electricity, but there are a number of people on dead end roads in more rural areas still without power. In fact, just last week an ABC mission team repaired the roof of a house that had just got power back on that day.

We were perhaps the last team to work at a church. From here on, ABC teams will be working almost exclusively on repairing homes.

Several things stood out to me. When I asked people how they felt about the U.S. response to the disaster, most just shrugged their shoulders and said, "It is what it is." They seemed used to being ignored by the mainland. On the other hand, they were so appreciative and so thankful that we had come all the way from Iowa to help. For these people, our presence was a tangible sign that they had not been forgotten. The hospitality and welcome we received could not have been any warmer.

We worked very hard. We power washed and resealed flat concrete roofs and we replaced a damaged metal roof on the church, as well as doing a lot of painting. We learned that we were capable of more than we may have given ourselves credit for. When we were told that our assignment involved roof repairs on three-story buildings and that safety harnesses would be involved, we had serious doubts. We learned both that the task was not as daunting as it sounded and that we were capable of perhaps more than we had imagined. I was impressed by the contributions of everyone on our team. Every single person, from the youngest to the oldest, contributed their unique gifts and abilities and we all worked together.

We particularly enjoyed working alongside the people from this church. They exuded a joy and deep faith and were so kind. They fed us very well (at times it seemed like the two churches were trying to outdo each other) and were concerned about us working in the heat. It was striking that they put less emphasis on the task than we did, and more on relationships. Our presence actually mattered more than the work we did, and this was an important lesson.

At the young adult-led service on Friday night, which functioned as a closing event for our time at the church in Luquillo, I was asked to say a few words. I shared how thankful we were for their gracious hospitality, and that as our group had reflected on the week, we all felt that we were taking away more from the experience than we had contributed. After the Spanish translation, the congregation broke out in spontaneous applause! (I noted that I never got applause like that when I preached back in Iowa.)

In recent days you have no doubt followed the protests in Puerto Rico - protests that were held in places our group visited. The American Baptist Churches of Puerto Rico encouraged those who felt led to participate in the protests, with instructions for places to meet up and signs indicating Baptist Churches of Puerto Rico. This was seen as a part of Christian discipleship – of advocating for justice, equality, and basic fairness as followers of Jesus. The revelations leading to the protests served as a reminder that the difficulties our brothers and sisters in Puerto Rico face have continued after the storm.

We had a marvelous week of work, fellowship, and worship and we were able to take in the beach and rain forest as well as kayak in a bioluminescent bay. Serving on a trip such as this in a different culture can be a transformative experience — which is part of the reason we go on such trips. Thank you to all who contributed so generously to make this trip possible and affordable for all who wanted to go. We truly felt that you all were a part of this experience and that we were your representatives. As we left the island, team members were already talking about wanting to go back. And the ABC Biennial will be held in San Juan in two years!
