President's Message

It's hard to believe that we're in the month of December already. Though getting through the first round of report cards usually means that winter break is within site. A chance to catch your breath and recharge your batteries.

As always there is a lot of things going on in the NWTU office and the BCTF that I want to remind teachers of, and this month I'll focus on three good news items.

At the most recent BCTF Representative Assembly in November it was announced that our pension plan is doing very well. In fact it's currently in surplus position, which means that starting January 1st, 2019 our contributions will be 1.75% less. This translates to a 1.75% pay increase.

A second piece of good news occurred in November when the latest BC government's Economic Stability Dividend was announced. This means that an additional 0.75% will be added to the already 1% (now 1.75%) pay increase scheduled for May 1st, 2019.

The last piece of good news is that we have now been informed by the District that all teachers, including Learning Support Teachers, who request a TTOC when absent shall have one dispatched. The bad news is that our District continues to face TTOC shortages on a daily basis. Never-the-less, non-enrolling teachers should be requesting a TTOC and preparing day plans.

Finally, if you are facing challenges with teaching assignment, or in your personal life, there are Union supports in place. Please speak to your school Staff Rep, call our office (604) 526-8990, or visit nwtu.ca or bctf.ca for more information.

On November 13, Pat Dyer, NWSS Social Studies teacher, passed away suddenly. Pat leaves behind his daughter Emily (Jeremy), son Liam, and his wife Sue, who is also a teacher for the New Westminster School District.

Pat was a long time member of the NWTU executive, serving as staff rep, bargaining chair, and rep to the New Westminster and District Labour Council. He attended countless BCTF AGMs and had been to the BCFED convention as well. Prior to becoming a teacher, Pat had been a member of PPWC (Pulp and Paper Workers of Canada) when he was employed at the Harmac Pulp Mill in Nanaimo. Pat had also worked as an adjuster at ICBC. This diverse background assisted Pat in his skillful execution of his NWTU roles.


After graduating from the University of Victoria, Pat taught in Cowichan and Nanaimo districts. In 1989, Pat started his career in New Westminster.
