

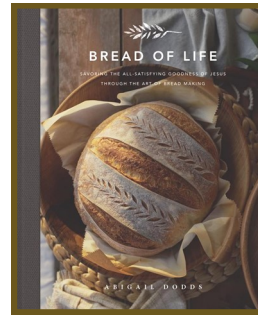

Bread of Life Series: Full Yet Famished

This month we take a look into the simplest of ways that we are pulled away from God. It is what we are never prepared for that trips us up all the time. Very few times are we faced with a colossal change, an apparent and decisive "No that is evil!", moment in our lives. When we do have these moments it is because there was monumental build up to it. There were little steps all along the way that inched us closer and closer to that moment. The little whisperings of "You will not surely die" as we reach for the low hanging fruits of life. We question what God is saying to us through the Word and manipulating it to fit the world that we are in to justify our perceptions.

When life becomes different, difficult, and dangerous, we tend to change what God's meaning is. We take verses out of context to justify our actions of feelings. This helps us keep our world view stagnant, never changing, and removed from the Gospel. We do this by asking a question out of the norm of God. "Surely God doesn't mean (Insert a group of people/view point/football team/rival town) when we are told to love the neighbor?" This question exists outside of God's intention. God intends for us to remember the key tenets of "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And the second is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." We are given specific instructions by God with God's intention and perspective and yet we become filled with doubt and uncertainty of the Truth that is before us.

However, this does not mean that we shouldn't have questions. What we are faced with is how to ask questions without losing our faithfulness and recognizing what questions are antithetical to our christology. In the book of James we are told, "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. But when you ask, you must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind." The whisperings of the serpent are the doubts, the waves and wind of the sea that threaten to capsize the boat of faith we find ourselves on. God encourages us to return to the Trinity with our questions, concerns, pain, and joys to seek out the faithful answers God puts into our hearts for the betterment of all people.

As we navigate this troubled and wounded world we all, myself included, must remember the personhood of Christ. The divine love of the Trinity and how we are called into this world to love our neighbors. *(Continues with Discussion Questions on Page 2)*

A Duty and a Delight

I have been asked to describe how Christian stewardship is both a duty and a delight. This has been a challenge for me because while I see stewardship as a grateful and loving response to God for his goodness to me, I usually don't think of it as a duty, as something I am obligated or forced to do. However, in a parable that Jesus gave his followers in Luke, chapter 10, our Lord tells his followers to perform their duty to God like slaves who perform their master's command. Slaves are obedient not because they seek or expect a reward, but only because their obedience is expected. In other words, Jesus teaches that God expects his followers to be obedient to him – to do his will.

God calls us to love, serve, and obey him with the whole of our lives. This includes our time and abilities, money and possessions, and the whole of our hearts, or love. Why would we want to serve a god like this? Not because God is demanding or powerful or unreasonable, but only because God's saving goodness, mercy, and love is offered to us as a gift! Even more, we sinful people do not deserve such goodness! This precious God-given gift from the Lord of life is God's grace, and God offers it to all sinful people. God's grace has been made possible by the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ, the perfect Son of God, on a shameful cross.

So, looking at the basis of our stewardship from the perspective of the Cross and the Empty Tomb, our duty to God as faithful stewards of God's mercies and riches is so much more than just some kind of obligation. Instead, the overwhelming, saving love of God in the person of Jesus makes the stewardship of our lives a true joy and delight. We want to be faithful stewards for God because of our gratitude for his love, because it pleases our heavenly Father, and because it is good for us and for all God's people. -Pastor Charles Horn

CHALLAH—Egg Bread

- 1/4 cup warm water
- 1 pkg. Active dry yeast
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. Salt
- 1 egg
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 2 3/4 to 3 cup flour



CHALLAH



In a bowl, dissolve yeast in water. Melt butter in milk in the microwave. Add butter/milk mixture, egg, sugar, and all to yeast; mix well. Add half the flour. Mix until smooth. Add enough remaining flour to handle easily. Knead, let rise (about 1 hour), shape into a loaf (can be braided) and let rise again. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Bake for 20-25 minutes.

What is challah? "Challah" is "loaf" in Hebrew. It is a rich egg bread that is used in Sabbath meals in Jewish homes. It is similar to French brioche which also contains butter. [Our recipe is more a brioche than challah]. But true challah is braided. According to Jewish tradition, the three Sabbath meals (Friday night, Saturday lunch, and Saturday late afternoon) and two holiday meals (one at night and lunch the following day) each begin with two complete loaves of bread. This "double loaf" (in Hebrew: *lechem mishneh*) commemorates the manna that fell from the heavens when the Israelites wandered in the desert after the Exodus. The manna did not fall on Sabbath or holidays; instead, a double portion would fall the day before the holiday or sabbath to last for both days. In some Jewish customs, each loaf is woven with six strands of dough. Together, the loaves have twelve strands, alluding to the twelve loaves of the showbread offering in the Temple (Exodus 25:30).
