Welcome to the School Year!

The African philosophy of Ubuntu, provides us, with an understanding of ourselves and how we are connected with others. Ubuntu offers the existence of a bond between us all, a bond, which through our interactions with our fellow human beings, we discover our own human qualities. The Zulu people of Africa say,

"Umuntu Ngumuntu Ngabantu", which means that a person is a person through other persons. They believe they affirm their humanness when they acknowledge the humanness of others.

South African Nobel Prize recipient, Archbishop Desmond Tutu describes Ubuntu: 'It is the essence of being human. It speaks of the fact that my humanity is caught up and is inextricably bound up in yours. I am human because I belong. It speaks about wholeness, it speaks about compassion. A person with Ubuntu is welcoming, hospitable, warm and generous, willing to share. Such people are open and available to others, willing to be vulnerable, affirming of others, do not feel threatened that others are able and good, for they have a proper self-assurance that comes from knowing that they belong in a greater whole. They know that they are diminished when others are humiliated, diminished when others are oppressed, diminished when others are treated as if they were less than who they are."

A well know story about an anthropologist studying the habits and customs of an African tribe, goes, that he found himself surrounded by children daily. He decided to play a game with them. He placed some sweets in a basket, and placed the basket under a tree. He called the children and explained how to play a particular game. When the anthropologist said "now", the children had to run to the tree and the first one there could have all the sweets themselves. The children all waited for the "now" signal. When he said "now", all of the children took each other's hand and walked towards the tree. They arrived at the same time and divided the sweets among themselves, sat down and began to eat. The anthropologist was astonished and went over to them and

asked why they had all run together when any one of them could have had the sweets to themselves. The children responded: "Ubuntu, how could any one of us be happy if all the others were sad?"

As we celebrate our "Opening of the 2019 School Year Mass", Sacred Heart School would like to share the theme of Ubuntu with our wider parish community. It is a theme that contains a powerful message for us all. We are all inextricably connected and our "goodness" can be evidenced in how we treat and accept those we come in contact with at school, work and in our social circles.

A Catholic Way of Receiving Holy Communion Guidelines for Communicants

- 1. As a sign of reverence for the Body of Christ, communicants and ministers should ensure that their hands appear clean.
- 2. When the minister says "The Body of Christ", reply "Amen". When receiving in the hand, step to one side after receiving the host and consume the whole of it immediately. When receiving on the tongue, communicants should open their mouths sufficiently and position their tongue to facilitate easy reception of the host.
- 3. If desired, move to the minister with the chalice. When the minister says "The blood of Christ", reply "Amen", receive the chalice, drink a little from it, and return the chalice to the minister.
- 4. In keeping with Christ's command to take and drink and consistent with the Church's tradition that the sacraments be ministered, it is not permitted for communicants to self-intinct (or dip) the host in the chalice. The practice of dipping fingers with the host in the chalice can also lead to other hygiene issues.
- 5. Return reverently to your place.


