# Judgement Handed Down in Noel Case

City Council has received a judgement dated October 20 and handed down by district Judge Bour-quet, regarding the case of Chief A. R. Noel vs the City of Dorval. The case has been pending since August 1960, when Council dismissed Chief Noel and placed the dismissal before the courts for verification. According to law, a dismissal of this kind requires court verification be-fore becoming effective. Shortly after the City Council had taken the case to Court, Chief Noel made pet-itions to the Court stating that the dismissal was, in effect, illegal. 

I would like to continue on a sub-ject which I introduced last week, shelkes for nuclear survival. As I said last week, the problem of nuc-lear survival is a vast and complex one, not only to the general public but to the leaders of all the world's governments. Most governments are faced with the dilemma of attempt-ing to halt the spread of nuclear weapons, on the one hand, in order to prevent the possibility of an ac-idental war, and attempting, on the other hand, to obtain a suffic-ient supply of these very same nu-clear weapons in time to use them in self defence on any aggressor that might launch a nuclear war against them. It must be remembered that, should these weapons have to be used as a last resort, it takes time, not only to obtain them but to train the armed forces in their efficient use. The very nature of nuclear weapons makes it almost certain thet

armed forces in their efficient use. The very nature of nuclear weap-ons makes it almost certain that there will be no formal declaration of any future way. Such a war is likely to be launched i suddenly, and with as much surprise as possible, at the end of a short and sudden deterioration of intermational relations. The more or less secret planning might take months, but the sudden deteriora-tion might be a mere matter of days. of international relations. The more or less secret planning might take months, but the sudden deteriora-tion might be a mere matter of days. In the missile age, the accualt aware-ing and retailation may be only a matterof hours or even minutes. At the present time we are coming to the end of the aircraft era and enter-ing the missile era, We have not yet completely dispensed with air-craft nor have we yet completely achieved a satisfactory dependence upon missiles that would justify the complete abandonment of manned aircraft. Consequently we are, at the moment, in a period of impond-erables and unknown quantities. Technical progress is accelerat-ing sor rapidly that neither side is at all sure of the precise effectiveness of the weapons it possesses, and even how or when it is going to act. No soe knows who is going to do what, with what, and there seems to be soing to do it first. All these, and many other com-plex issues, are just part of the back-ground of problems that have to be understood and properly assessed be-icous the equally complex question of nuclear shelters, Whether or not we should build such thelters, is of course, in the first instance, merely a question of whether or not we are going to have a nuclear war, It is both as simple and as compler a stat. It would be folly to build them if we are not going to have a war, and iolly not to build them if such a war is inevitable. Who knows?

ments. The only possible procedure of assessing this protound problem is by a continuing duly assessment of the international by -play that ebbs and flows between the great powers as they talk peace on one day and jockey for positions to destuoy each other on the next.



This then is the situation that faces a peaceful government such as ours in Canada when it has to decide on a policy for nuclear shelters. The cold ward trags on, now hotter now colder, and unless there is definite evidence of an increasing and per-manent improvement, we can only presume, insofar as a policy of an-tional safety is concerned, that the world situation is slowly but surely deteriorating. This income world situation is slowly but surely deteriorating. This is not pessimism. This is the position that has to be taken by those responsible for our safety and our national defence. It is very similar to our police forces that have to presume that crime will continue, and our fire forces that have to operate on the presumption that buildings will continue to catch fire. This is their job, just as it is the job of those in charge of our ex-ternal affairs to do everything in






