The Epic Adventures of JF Zuber · Civil War Soldier Oct. 21 – 22 at the Amana Performing Arts Center

A 21-year-old, South Amana soldier fighting in the Civil War wrote his mother, "We are now approximately 1,000 miles apart and yet, we will not forget one another. God will bring me back to you. Then you will thank Him and say, 'This, my son, was lost and has again been found." Signed Johann Friedrich Zuber.

Only later did the soldier reveal to his mother his harrowing experiences in some of the biggest battles of the western campaign.

When Tom Johnson, playwright and director, read Zuber's letters they struck a chord. Zuber was born in Germany in 1840 and had lived in the house just down the street from Johnson's first home in Amana located in South Amana. Johnson, whose

three older brothers saw combat in World War II, was drawn to Zuber's experiences as a fighting soldier. That Zuber had grown up in the Community of True Inspiration and had been a professed pacifist before volunteering to join the army made the story all the more intriguing. That he was and is father, grand father and great grandfather to a tree full of Zuber kin adds to the story.

Zuber wrote letters to his mother and family while serving in the Ohio 58th Infantry. The letters, all written in German, were given to the Iowa Historical Society archives many years ago by his family. Elaine Zuber, Zuber's great granddaughter, had copies made, and had them transcribed from German script into legible German, so that another family member, Janet Zuber, could translate them into English. They became the basis for a Willkommen, Summer 2022 feature story.

Now Johnson has created a concert theater presentation for three voices with period music and images based upon the Zuber letters.

It will debut October 21-22 at the Amana Performing Arts Center (former OCTC). Tickets are on sale now at the Amana Heritage Museum, 319-622-3567 or via their online amanaheritage.org store. There are three performances. Friday at 7:30 p.m. Saturday at 2:30 and 7:30 p.m.

Zuber served in General Sherman's Army fighting in several major battles and many skirmishes as the 58th fought its way to Vicksburg. What happened to Zuber at Chickasaw bluff, Mississippi, has been the stuff of family legend. His letters, insightful, descriptive and illuminating, are fascinating.

"Zuber's relationship with his family and how he expresses that in his letters coupled with what happened to him in the war and his choices after the war, make for such a universal story - something we can all relate to yet it's an amazing story. It's dramatic. It's compelling. The challenge is building the story arc and getting it across," Johnson explained.

This is a another important creative project for Johnson whose long career began as a high school drama coach in Cherokee, Iowa, before achieving a Masters in Theatre Arts from the University of Northern Iowa. He went on to direct and teach theatre at Iowa State University, and then co-founded the Old Creamery Theatre in 1971. Retiring from

the Creamery in 2007. Johnson and his wife and artistic collaborator, actor Meg Merckens, formed the Iowa Theatre Artists Company in 2008 establishing a working theatre in the heart of Amana that brought new, innovative drama to Iowa. It was a success, earning the respect of both theatre professionals and audiences. But the physical demands of running a theatre, kept the Amana couple from truly enjoying the creative work they loved, so they sold the building, but they continue to do original ITAC shows and events at various venues.

When Johnson and Merckens took this project on just a couple of months ago, they were exhilarated to rekindle theatre magic after the long Covid hiatus. They enlisted the help of Tom Milligan actor director of TKM Theatrical Productions. Milligan is a longtime Civil War buff with a historian's detailed knowledge of the conflict. He has been helping nail down the historical detail and context. So has longtime Amana historian Peter Hoehnle, Homestead, a US Park Service Ranger at the Herbert Hoover Library in West Branch, who has written multiple books and articles on Amana's history. Hoehnle has assisted with or acted in multiple Old Creamery and ITAC theatre productions. He started acting at the age 12 in the Amana Community Theatre production, "A Story Retold."

Joining Meg Merckens, Peter Hoehnle and Tom Milligan on stage will be musicians Joy Ward, a classically trained violinist and bluegrass fiddler of renown, and Mark Clark, a guitarist whose long career has led him to work with some of the best regional blues, bluegrass and folk bands. They have found just the right music to capture the mood and help bring this story to life.

Working together these artists will be telling the true story of one young man who fought in America's deadly civil conflict and whose adventures in that war were epic.

As Zuber wrote to a friend, "Were I to tell you every single thing that has happened to me since I first left Amana, I could not find enough room or time. Still, I will share some things..."
