This appears to be the year of no summer. In the Big Horn Basin they are just starting 1<sup>st</sup> cutting hay and the dry beans are starting to stick their heads up. I am blaming it on the volcano in Iceland, global warming, British Petroleum and the Obuma Administration. At this point all I can say is keep your powder dry. I hope see everyone at the shoots.





I have done some arm twisting by talking Cindy "Cookie" Gullion into providing some of her winning Dutch oven recipes as a new feature for our Wyoming State Muzzleloaders newsletter. Cindy and her side kick Ray "Fire Tender" Gullion have been participating in camp cooking competitions since 2004. Cindy and Ray have won the Rocky Mountain Regional Camp Cook off 3 times in their short career of camp cook-offs. Cindy grew up on a ranch at Meetetse, WY where she learned camp cooking at a very young age cooking for

hunters at her grandfathers hunting camp. Ray and Cindy have been married, for 29 years; they have 3 children and 4 grandkids.

#### Cindy's Dutch oven Biscuits

Cindy created this recipe to compete in Dutch Oven Cook Offs. This recipe was first used during Frontier Days 2009

2 cups all purpose flour I like Montana Wheat

2-4 tablespoons white sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/8 -1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

1/4 cup butter flavor Crisco cold from refrigerator

1 plus cup buttermilk

Mix flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and cream of tartar well and cut in Crisco until you have Crisco crumbs the size of a pea Crisco should be cold. When you have the crumb mixture slowly add the buttermilk and this is not exact. Add buttermilk stirring with a fork until the dough follows the fork around the bowl. I like mine a little bit of a wet dough. You may pat it out at this stage or knead it for no more than 13 times (as taught to me by Aunt Fanny). I like to have the dough about an inch high and then I cut it out with a small 1 and 1/2 inch biscuit cutter. Aunt Fanny says they rise better if the biscuit is cut smaller. I have a hot cast iron Dutch oven with bacon grease in the bottom. I also have the lid of the Dutch oven covered with coals so that it is already hot before putting in the biscuits. After cutting the biscuits I place them in the hot bacon grease and then turn them over so the tops have been greased. I fill my oven with the biscuits just touching each other. Then place the hot lid on the top of the oven and place hot coals all around the bottom of the oven keeping the coals about two inches away from the Dutch oven. I don't put any coals under the oven. If you do this you most likely will have burned bottoms on your biscuits. The heat will reach under the oven just fine, be sure to keep turning the oven a quarter of a turn and the lid another quarter of a turn about every 5 or 7 minutes. Check you biscuits after the first ten minutes and then every three minutes and bake until the tops are a golden

We like to enjoy our biscuits with honey and butter. COORIL

Greetings from Encampment. The Marion Baker match went off without a hitch. The weather was cloudy, a bit windy but overall very nice for a shoot, the powder stayed dry and we had a good time. The limitations of the range allowed for just 25 and 50 yard shooting. We shot 2 targets at 25 yards and when everyone was finished we moved back to the 50 yard line for 6 bull, putting 3 balls into all 5 bulls except for the practice bull. It was over in plenty of time for burgers and hot dogs and the associated sides. After lunch we broke in the new ball splitter, shot pistols and threw the hawk and knife.

15 shots at each range. Two targets at 25 yards: a double bull, 3 shots at each bull, 6 total. The other 25 yard was the fer'd lac target, 3 shots each at the 2 upper bulls and 3 shots at the bottom half bull, 9 total. The 50 yard target was just a 6 bull where we shot 3 at all the bulls except the practice bull, total 15 shots.

#### **Kies - Patenting Pioneer**



On May 15 1809, **Mary Dixon Kies** received the first U. S. patent issued to a woman. Kies, a Connecticut native, invented a process for weaving straw with silk or thread. First Lady, Dolley Madison praised her for boosting the nation's hat industry. Unfortunately, the patent file was destroyed in the great Patent Office fire in 1836. Until about 1840, only 20 other patents were issued to women. The inventions related to apparel, tools, cook stoves, and fire places.

The Patent Act of 1790 opened the door for anyone, male or female, to protect his or her invention with a patent. However, because in many states women could not legally own property independent of their husbands, many women inventors didn't bother to patent their new inventions. Mary Kies broke that pattern on May 5, 1809.

Mary Kies was not the first American woman to improve hat making. In 1798, New Englander Betsy Metcalf invented a method of braiding straw. Her method became very popular, and she employed many women to make her hats, but she didn't patent her process. When asked why, Metcalf said she didn't want her name being sent to Congress. Kies had a different perspective, and she couldn't have picked a better time to secure her new product, because the U.S. government had stopped importing European goods. (Napolean was at war with many nations of Europe at the time, and one way he tried to win the war was to block trade and hurt his enemies economically. The U.S. did not want to be drawn into this conflict.) President Madison was looking for American industries to replace the lost European goods. First lady Dolley Madison said hats off to Mary Kies for providing just such an opportunity. By Carrie Gavin



#### The Indian Woman

History has little noted the Indian woman of log ago. Few women's names can be recalled to mind besides those of Pocahonas and Sacagawea. Yet, there were many that are but faint remembrances today; this article is of one such daughter of the country, a woman that stands with bravery that can be sorely matched then as now. Her name was Marie Dorion, a daughter of the Iowa nation. The expedition of The American Fur Company, in 1811-1812, to Astoria, is well noted in history. Pierre Dorion, Maria's husband, was offered a job as interpreter for The American Fur Company. Pierre refused to join the expedition unless his wife and two small children were allowed to accompany him. Thus Marie was the only woman in the party and this was the beginning of her adventures. The party left St. Louis in March of 1811, traveling up the Missouri river. Near Pierre, South Dakota, they traveled westward by land. Marie was to walk most of the way, usually carrying her youngest son, who was two years old. She showed great patience and fortitude in enduring the hardships along the way. Though pregnant she never complained and was able to keep pace with her fellow travelers. This won her the respect of the men she traveled with. In December, near North Powder, Oregon, the Dorion family was to stop for a few days, while the main body moved on. They had to stop so that Marie could give birth to a third son. A son that was to live only eight days.

February of 1812 brings the trek of 3,500 miles to an end. Miles of hardships, endurance and suffering, yet Marie's biggest ordeal lay still ahead of her. What she had experienced so far was nothing in comparison to what was in store for her. A small party of American Fur Company men leaves Astoria to trap beaver; the Dorian's being part of the group. Near the junction of the Snake and Boise rivers, some 330 miles east of Astoria, they build a cabin. For quite a while Marie spent her time being a wife and mother, doing the tasks that all women do. It all ended on that fatal day in January 1814. The day started out as usual. All the men left to trap beaver, but only one was to return. He staggered into the cabin wounded and bleeding. Before LeClere fell to the floor, unconscious, he was able to tell Marie that the rest of the party had been massacred by Indians. Marie realized that the only chance for survival was to flee into the bitter winter weather. She managed to capture two of the trapper's horses. One of which she packed with beaver meat, dried salmon, and some clothing. Upon this she helped the wounded man, LaClere \*. On the other horse she mounted with her two small children. Westward they traveled, for the Columbia River. Three days out they saw a band of Indians moving easterly. They dismounted and hid in the brush, keeping camp that night without benefit of water or fire. Marie was able to keep her children alive by the warmth of her body, but the wounded man, LaCere, died during the night. Nine days later she had traveled only 120 miles, less than half way to Astoria. As she reached the Rocky Mountains a bad snow storm hit and she knew it was time to settle in for the rest of the winter. In a ravine, by a small stream she built a wigwam of pine and cedar branches, with the aid of a buffalo robe and three deer hides that she had brought along. Being low on food the horses were killed and the meat jerked. The horse hides she used as more protection on the wigwam. Here she stayed for 53 days, fighting the bitter cold, with only her two small children and the winter wind as her companions. The food supply ran out in March, so once again she set out. Marie followed the Walla Walla River until it emptied into the Columbia. Weak with hunger, she half walked, half crawled and somehow stumbled upon a village of friendly Indians, the Walla Wallas. Her new found fiends took her in and rescued her sons that were hidden nearby. Later she was taken to Fort Okanogon, a fort in western Washington. Marie was to marry two more times and give birth to two more children by her last husband, Jean Baptiste Toupin. She died at sixty and is buried near Salem, Oregon. This woman of long ago shows the kind of courage and endurance that few people have. She is an inspiration to women everywhere. A woman to be admired. \*LeClere: some authorities believe that he died in the cabin, after he had told Marie about the massacre.

"Yet I won't give all of my last retreat: I'll help him to fight his long trail through, but I'll keep some land from his field and street the way that it was when the world was new. He'll cry for it all, for that's his way, and yet he may understand some day."

And so, from the painted Bad Lands, 'way to the sun-beat home of the 'Pache kin, God stripped some places to sand and clay and dried up the beds where the streams had been. He marked his reserves with these plain signs and stationed his rangers to guard the lines.

Then the white man came, as the east growed old, and blazed his trail with the wreck of war. He riled the rivers to hunt for gold and found the stuff he was lookin' for; then he trampled the Injun trails to ruts and gashed through the hills with railroad cuts.

He flung out his barb-wire fences wide and plowed up the ground where the grass was high, he stripped off the trees from the mountain side and ground out his ore where the streams run by, till last, came the cites, with smoke and roar, and the White Man was feelin' at home once more.

But Barrenness, Loneliness, suchlike things that gall and grate on the White Man's nerves, was the rangers that camped by the bitter springs and guarded the lines of God's reserves. So the folks all shy from the desert land, 'Cept mebbe a few that kin understand.

There the world's the same as the day 'twas new, with the land as clean as the smokeless sky and never a noise as the years have flew, but the sound of the warm wind driftin' by; and there, along, with the man's world far, there's a chance to think who you really are.

And over the reach of the desert bare, when the sun drops low and the day wind stills, sometimes you kin almost see him there, as he sits alone on the blue-grey hills, a-thinkin' of things that's beyond our ken and restin' Himself from the noise of men.


