Words cannot express the feelings we all have at the sudden loss of our beloved president and friend, Wendy Bill, on Feb. 12, 2020.

Wendy was Shir Chadash – in more ways than one. It wasn't just in her service to the congregation and its members in various leadership roles, but in her heart – she embodied what we are all about – family, helping others and growth. Wendy knew everyone and touched everyone – not just at Shir Chadash, but wherever she went and with whatever she did.

We believe she'd be proud of how the congregation responded to word of her passing.

Congregants were called personally where possible before an email went out, because that was the right thing to do.

And they responded. Never have we seen such an outpouring of support not only for the Bill family but for each other. The Bill household always had members there throughout this difficult time and, people were calling each other, holding each other, crying with each other and consoling one another.

In a fitting tribute to Wendy, more than enough food was brought to the Bill household and to the three shiva minyans to feed our congregation several times over and then some. Thank you to all who contributed.

Thank you, too, to everyone who came early to set up and those who stayed late to clean up.

There weren't many dry eyes in our congregation this week. And yet, this tragedy seemed to bring an even stronger sense of togetherness and family than ever before – something Wendy strived for in her personal, professional and congregational life.

Yes, this is a sad time. And, there's a lot of work to be done. Wendy's shoes are impossible for one person to fill. We all marveled at her ability to get things done or get others to help get things done.

So, please, volunteer to do something and help us. If you're asked if you can lend a hand, consider responding as Wendy would, with a, "Sure" or "Of course" and chip in. If we all do just a little, it adds up to a lot.

As your board, we pledge to continue the hard work needed to keep Congregation Shir Chadash a vibrant place where people can pray, work for good and justice and help each other and our community.

As Sister Sledge sang in their hit song, "We Are Family," and that's the way we (and Wendy) want it to be.

Wendy

There is a meditation in the siddur just prior to the Kaddish which has always resonated with me. I read it silently, over and over, week after week. And I truly believe it. It turns out to be a quote by George Eliot from "Middlemarch":

"But the effect of her being on those around her was incalculably diffusive: for the growing good of the world is partly dependent on unhistoric acts; and that things are not so ill with you and me as they might have been, is half owing to the number who lived faithfully a hidden life, and rest in unvisited tombs."

I believe acts of kindness, however unnoticed, have an effect. They have ripples.

And so now Wendy.

She doesn't quite fit this description, for her acts were not only small but large. And she had not only ripples but huge concentric waves radiating out from her heart. She affected so many people. Not only those here, but through those she touched, a symphony of kindness, little wavelets, changing the world... in – her – own – quiet – Wendy – way.

Ever since she saw that welcoming yellow Shir Chadash flyer in the Hopewell post office, Wendy knew she had found her spiritual home. And then she transformed it. She Wendy-ized it. She baked and cooked and nurtured and taught little kids and edited the newsletter for a million years (with Sandy) and for some reason became treasurer and cooked some more, and made it feel like a home to many people. She made friends. And she argued and was hurt and reconciled. Those kinds of things are part of what being a family means. And then she became president of Shir Chadash, with all the extra hours and the headaches and some joy. She was responsible. She was our rock. She was always lending a hand. She gave me a ride on Saturday mornings for Sharing Shabbat and I'd carry her green bag... she was always bringing something, although I don't really know what she had in that bag... I'd carry the bag from the car to the temple. And sometimes I'd take her arm as she navigated the parking lot. That was really an act of kindness to me more than to her.

Whenever I speak at Shir Chadash, I like to bring in a note of science. We think of ourselves as a collection of particles, of electrons and protons and neutrons. But there is a duality of matter. We are also waves. I like to think that the Wendy wave is still with us.

Wendy changed the world in a profound way. She Wendy-ized it. And it's a better place for her being here. On behalf of Shir Chadash we mourn with the family.

May her name be for a blessing.

Remembering Wendy Bill

Dear Friends,

February has been a hard month for Shir Chadash. Speaking personally, I am still in shock at the death of our president, Wendy Bill, and profoundly sad. Some of us have known Wendy for twenty years, others, who are newer to

the congregation, a shorter period of time. But to all of us she was very much the embodiment of what is best about our congregation. Whenever we came to any congregational event, Wendy was literally the first person to greet us with a warm and heartfelt greeting.

Wendy was not among the founding families of the congregation. But she came in close to the beginning. No sooner had she walked into Shir Chadash than she rolled up her sleeves and got to work. I think it was here that Wendy really came into her own. She blossomed. She radiated. Wendy loved Jewish tradition.

She took Jewish practice seriously. She had an instinctive sense of what was the "Jewish way" of doing things. And she developed a love of Jewish learning. Every Sharing Shabbat for all these years she could be found at Torah study. And two years ago, she became an adult Bat Mitzvah. Wendy did not bring years of Jewish scholarship. But she embodied Jewish values in all her deeds and her loving concern for everyone around her.

Wendy was devoted to the congregation. She gave of herself ceaselessly to make it work. Whatever needed to be done, Wendy did it. The truth is there is literally no role at Shir Chadassh that Wendy has not filled. She began as a teacher in Sharing Shabbat. Soon she became the co-editor of the newsletter. She represented the congregation in community activities and mobilized her friends to become involved. She filled every official position: board member; secretary; treasurer. And last June the congregation chose Wendy to be its President. She was good at the job because she was beloved. When they I told my colleagues of Wendy's death one of them wrote me, "how lucky you were. She was a great president".

Wendy brought a rare quality to her work. Remarkably, despite everything that she did,-- and Wendy did everything - - she never sought recognition or credit. She was quiet and unassuming -- and effective. And through it all, in all these years I never heard Wendy raise her voice or lash out in anger. She brought calm reason to every situation. But all her official titles really only tell part of

the story. For as long as anyone can remember if anything at all needed to be done It was Wendy who did it, because doing it was the right thing to do. Over the several nights of Shiva we shared stories about Wendy: her warmth, her generosity, her sincere caring. For so many people Wendy was the congregation. They say nobody is indispensable. They are wrong. Wendy truly is an irreplaceable person

Wendy embodied everything that we as a congregation aspire to. May her example serve as an inspiration to us. May we carry on the work she devoted herself to. May her example inspire us to be more caring to one another and to take on the tasks of our community that enrich on another's life. May her memory live on in our deeds. And may her memory be a blessing

Member's Cooking Corner

Transylvanian Goulash

This is an authentic Hungarian recipe. I received it from a family friend back in the 60's. Her name was Emma Kende and she was from Budapest. This is a somewhat updated version.



As some of you asked for it at our January Shabbat dinner at Shir Chadash – here it is. This recipe fills a six-quart pot, so you may want to make less. It does keep well.

What You Need

- 3 medium onions (2 yellow 1 red)
- 3 cloves of garlic
- 1 32 ounce jar of good quality sauerkraut (I used Eden)
- 1 head of cabbage (look for one with the most green outer leaves)
- 1 28 oz. can of crushed tomatoes
- 2 Tablespoons good quality Hungarian Paprika (Szeged brand available in grocery stores, Penzeys is also good)
- 2 Tablespoons caraway seeds
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil
- 16 ounce package of Beyond Beef, plant based ground (available at Tops)

What To Do

Slice onions fairly thin – place in a large heated skillet, add a bit of water, it should sizzle, stir – do this a few times to brown the onions

(best to not do them all at once, add diced garlic towards the end.

Add the onions to the stock pot, then the sauerkraut, paprika, caraway seeds and oregano, stir to combine and let it simmer.

In the same skillet, add the olive oil and the beyond beef, break into bite sized pieces, brown and add to the stock pot, simmer until the cabbage is done. You may want to add some water, it should be saucy, not too thick or thin.

Taste, add a bit more paprika or caraway if you think it needs it. Probably salty enough from the sauerkraut, but add a bit of sea salt if you think it needs it.

Serve with noodles or rice.

Good for family dinners or for a potluck. This, as all my recipes are, is vegan. Even though I will not be looking over your shoulder, please keep it that way. Better for our health, for the animals and our planet.

Thanks to those of you who asked for the recipe. Enjoy preparing and serving it. And consuming it also!

Background: Many years ago, the congregation purchased property along Freedom Road in Lagrangeville with the intention of building a synagogue. After much money, time, and sweat equity it has been determined that for the foreseeable future we will be unable to utilize this land.
