### **Tucker Summit CID News**

Last month, the official groundbreaking for the new Smoke Rise Elementary

School kicked off the much-anticipated intersection improvements at Flintstone Drive and Hugh Howell Road. The focus is safe passage for school buses, parents and teachers, as they travel to and from the new Smoke Rise Elementary School in Tucker. The intersection improvements, along with a new traffic signal at Flintstone Drive at Hugh Howell Road, will create well-marked turn

lanes and clear pedestrian crossings that will serve the community for years to come.

Tucker Mayor Frank Auman and the Tucker Summit Community Improvement District (TSCID) have been diligently working with the DeKalb County School District, DeKalb County and the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) on the permitting, planning and designing of a safe and efficient intersection for residential, business and school commuters alike. The almost \$1 million intersection improvement project will



have a return of more than \$50 million in increased property value and will spur new development along the gateway corridor connecting DeKalb and Gwinnett counties.

The Flintstone Drive and Hugh Howell Road intersection construction is slated for completion by the beginning of the 2021 fall school year.

In some ways, nothing really changes over time. Any good and noble idea suggested in a political setting can be criticized for the strangest reasons. According to Wikipedia, in 1908, Congress ejected Anna Jarvis' proposal to make Mother's Day an official holiday, joking that they would also have to proclaim a "Mother-in-law's Day." However, owing to her efforts, by 1911, all U.S. states observed the holiday. In 1914, Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation designating Mother's Day a national holiday, held on the second Sunday in May.

Jarvis became resentful of the commercialization of the

holiday. By the early 1920s, Hallmark Cards and other companies had started selling Mother's Day cards. Jarvis believed that the companies had misinterpreted and exploited the



idea of Mother's Day and that the emphasis of the holiday should be on sentiment, not profit.

As a result, she organized boycotts of Mother's Day, and threatened to issue lawsuits against the companies involved. Jarvis argued that people should appreciate and honor their mothers through handwritten letters expressing their love and gratitude, instead of buying gifts and pre-made cards.

So, while flowers and chocolates are still a good idea, perhaps this is the right time to write a nice letter to the person who is a mother in your life. OK, so some can no longer write in cursive, so how about printing it. But, please...just refrain from just texting her.

And, how about calling and truly listening to what your mother figure has going on in her life. You do remember that device you carry around with you that can be used for that purpose? I grew up when long distance calling was so expensive you had to wait till late in the evening to get the better rates to call your parents. Today, you have no excuse, no matter where Mom lives.

It is interesting how important mothers are in society to raise children, and the amazing balancing act they perform when they choose to be both a mother and a breadwinner. 





class sizes and enthusiastic teachers make meaningful learning experiences possible.





There's something related to the pandemic that's not an actual virus – but it's spreading nonetheless. Fake COVID-19 vaccination cards are now an actual thing - especially online!



As of mid-April, about

two million Georgians (out of 70+ million Americans) have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine. With that shot, they also got a small paper card to document the date and manufacturer of the vaccination dose. Currently, those cards are the only proof that exists for the COVID-19 vaccine. However, many companies and non-profits are working on apps that document vaccine proof.

These apps are being called "vaccine passports." Governor, Brian Kemp has said he will not support "vaccine passports" in Georgia. But, in the future, you may have to verify your vaccination status before boarding a plane, entering another country, or attending a special event, etc. During our everchanging new "normal," it's not clear exactly how regulations of "vaccine passports" would work and what kind of legal, ethical, and logistical challenges would follow. For now, the federal government's public focus is mainly on boosting vaccine supplies and vaccinations.

Still, scammers out there smell an opportunity. An underground market in fake vaccination record cards is growing. Fraudsters have been hawking counterfeit cards online at sites including eBay, Etsy and Shopify. They're also popping up on social media sites. And, there are several online "Do it Yourself" guides for printing fake vaccination cards at home. Just note that it is a federal crime to falsifying a vaccine document and to fraudulently reproduce the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention logo which is printed on every card's upper right-hand corner.

Bottom line: do not buy fake vaccine cards, do not make your own vaccine cards, and do not fill-in vaccination cards with any false information. Also, The FBI advises people against posting images of their vaccination cards online, to prevent counterfeiters from stealing personal information. Stay safe and healthy!

### Alien Invaders are Coming!

Perhaps you have heard this is the year for the cicadas to return. Don't worry, these are not the locusts of the bible...Our annual cicadas that serenade us on summer nights are loud and prolific, but



they are essentially harmless except to our ears. These two-inch green, black and brown insects make loud buzzing calls that are one of the most familiar sounds of summer.

But this year is different! Prepare for "periodical cicadas," known as Brood X, or Great Eastern Brood cicadas that emerge from the ground in large numbers every 17 years, making a big impression when they do. They look much different from their annual counterparts being smaller with bright red eyes, black head and bodies, and transparent wings fringed with orange.

Experts tell us you can expect them in May give or take a few weeks. They emerge from the ground at night, once the soil temperature reaches roughly 64° F. Once they emerge, they seek out a tree, building, shrub, or even a garden tool propped against a fence. Once they find just the right place, they stop climbing and begin shedding their outer skin, or exoskeleton, for the last time.

They appear in mind-boggling numbers, typically 10,000 to 100,000 cicadas per acre! You'll know when they emerge. The sound of them trying to find a mate is deafening. It is made only by males using tiny drum-like structures on the sides of their bodies.

After mating, the females lay their rice-shaped eggs in slits cut in the very tips of branches. In some cases, this causes the leaves nearby to die. However, this is rarely detrimental to the tree. Once the eggs hatch, the cicada nymphs topple to the ground where they burrow into the soil for the next decade or more.

Cicadas have also been eaten by people of many cultures around the world. Some like them fried while others burn off the insects wings and legs and then sprinkled them with salt before frying. They are said to taste like crackerjacks, popcorn or peanuts. Yummy ... but no thanks.

Fortunately, cicadas neither bite nor harm plants. The next batch won't appear until 2028. Many of the details of this article were extracted from the excellent online article by Terry Johnson with the Wildlife Resources Division.

### Clever Dispensers

I bought several dispensers for different purposes around the house. First of course, for toothpaste. Then one for hand cream and another for hand soap. Who needs a bar of soap in a soap dish that has to be cleaned and looks messy when you can have one of these little soldiers standing by your sink?

If you shop for them, you will see they range in price from \$12 to \$56. The good news is that with all devices like this, prices tend to drop over time. I tried one from Bed, Bath, & Beyond by Simple Human that is wonderful. It comes in white, chrome, brass, and brushed nickel exterior with a charger that attaches magnetically near the on-off switch at the back. It looks sleek and elegant beside the sink or on a counter. I encourage you to check them out and see what a convenience it is not having to search, twist, or pump when the dispenser will do all of that for you.

Burgers were on the brain this month, and we knew that Brockett Pub has one of the best around. A quick pre-amble before we head into the food. We didn't need anyone to tell us that Brockett Pub is one of the most underrated restaurants in Atlanta.

In full disclosure, this was not our first time visiting his local hidden gem. Tucked back in an unassuming corner of East Ponce and Brockett Rd. (easy to remember) Brockett Pub opened in 2009 in what used to be George K's Tavern. For those of you that remember George K's, that's a story for another day.

Thinking back to the first visit to Brockett Pub, it was clear that they are here to stay, with a genuine approach and local vibe. Nothing super fancy, but it's a perfect place to watch your game of choice, TVs at just about every angle. The Bleu Cheese Bacon Burger is a juicy combo of some of the most awesome flavors on the planet on top of mid-rare goodness. While they'll ask you in many restaurants how you'd like your burger cooked, the result is seldom on the spot. Not so at Brocket Pub. It's always done to perfection, with no exception. As always, the fries are fresh and hot. While we skipped them this go around, the Onion Rings are fantastic. The perfect O's of hand battered crispy delight.

Next up, the Ruben. The signature house braised corn beef comes fully assembled with sauerkraut, swiss and thousand island, all tucked in a nicely toasted traditional marble rye. This would make your favorite deli jealous. A great sandwich done right.

If you are ready for some premium shrimp tacos, these are it. Served with jalapenos, feta, spicy peanut ginger slaw and tarter, they are an amazing mix of flavors and texture. At first glance somewhat small, the two tacos are plenty.





### **Gardening: What NOT to Plant!**

Chinese Privet or Ligustrum sinense or European Privet Ligustrum vulgare are examples of semi-evergreen and evergreen shrubs that were frequently used by landscapers for many years. A third variety known as Japanese Privet or Ligustrum japonicum is also called Glossy Privet. You

will see these plants all over Smoke Rise in gardens and in the woods. In the winter, it is usually the only green item in the hardwood forest.

Privet is commonly used as a screen planting in landscapes and the glossy variety can be pruned into tree form or a standard with a single trunk. The Chinese and European varieties are often multi-trunked with arching stems. The plants are drought-tolerant and deer do browse on the Chinese privet sprouts.



So what is the big deal? "The Non-Native

Invasive Plants of Southern Forests Field Guide" by James H. Miller noted that these shrubs were widely planted and considered traditional southern ornamentals. Introduced from China and Europe in the early to mid-1800's to our area, they were valued for their screening properties. All was well, but then they "escaped." And that is the problem.

Every one of these privet types blooms profusely here in our area from April to June. The flowers are clusters of white with four petals and have a very strong fragrance. After flowering, green fruit is set in July and in summer, ripening to blue black in winter. They are considered aggressive and troublesome invasive plants, as they often form dense thickets particularly in bottom-land forests and along fencerows. They colonize by root sprouts and spread widely by birds and other animals who consume the fruit. With this dense growth, they crowd out native species in the woods and are difficult to remove. They sprout easily, grow and spread quickly if unchecked. The best method to control the plant involves several possible options. You can remove the fruit and dispose of it in the trash. Do not compost. That will cut down on unwanted sprouting of new plants.

Smaller shrubs can be dug out or pulled out by the roots. Larger plants can be cut at the base, and then the fresh cut can be coated with Roundup or glyphosate to kill the plant to the roots. It is possible to spray the leaves with several different types of herbicides but be careful with overspray that might damage other plants in the area. Once removed, consider selecting native or less aggressive screening plants to provide the privacy and color of the evergreens such as the native anise or the beautiful non-invasive Sasanquas Camellia or Camellia Japonica to add color in the landscape. Next month, we will tackle another common invasive plant: nadina.

# Morning Glories Welcome Jan Streater Mayheu! by Quill Duncan

April's Zoom meeting featured our charter member's daughter as speaker. Jan Mayheu is the daughter of Joy Streater, and we were honored to welcome her as the Director of Major Giving for the Helping Mamas organization. Helping Mamas was founded in 2014 to fill a service gap for mothers in need. In that first year, the organization served 200 people with diapers, baby wipes, period products, clothing and other essential items. In 2020, it served 65,000 people with those same services through a network of other support agencies.

Helping Mamas has a warehouse in Norcross where it receives donated materials and distributes them to the Salvation Army, YMCA, NetWorks, Children's Health Care of Atlanta, various co-ops. The organization has partnered with United Way and the Atlanta Community Food Bank. Like many organizations, it can purchase necessary items at, or below cost, to distribute to families in need. Your monetary donations go a long way towards filling those needs. As Jan noted, Helping Mamas has four paid staff members and relies on VISTA volunteers and volunteers from the community to sort donations and load trucks and make deliveries. Though based in Norcross, it serves the entire state of Georgia

and partners with more than 150 other service agencies. Funding comes from grants. The organization received \$75K from the United Way last year, as part of the COVID relief effort. With a recent purchase of a van, Helping Mamas began a mobile program with a drive-thru distribution. Earlier this year, the van went to Marietta and served 580 families in 90 minutes. With that success, Helping Mamas is now offering that service three times a week in various area communities. If you would like more information or



Mom's Special Day



This month we honor our mothers with some favorites that we have collected that, incidentally, are easy to make and would be great served to her for breakfast or brunch (in bed, if that is how she likes it!).

The first recipe is being republished in honor of Lou Tankersley who cooked for Smoke Rise Baptist Church for many years and served this favorite that she credits to the Hippensteal Inn in Gatlinburg, TN.

### Cheesy Egg Casserole

6 eggs 1/2 cup flour 1/8 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 cup milk 8 ounces cottage cheese 3 oz cream cheese 1 Tablespoon butter

1 lb Monterey Jack Cheese, Cubed

Beat eggs in large bowl and add flour, baking powder, salt, and milk. Beat in cottage cheese and add cubed cream cheese and Monterey Jack Cheese. Pour into a well-greased and floured 2-quart baking dish and dot with butter. Bake at 340° for 45 minutes.

### Pecan Pie Muffins

(Barbara Luten shared this treat.) These are too good to be so quick and easy, but they will be a hit! Do not expect leftovers!

Dry Ingredients: Mix together 1 cup brown sugar, ½ cup plain flour, 1 cup chopped pecans

Wet Ingredients: 2 beaten eggs, 2/3 cup softened butter, 1 tsp. vanilla

Mix wet ingredients into dry and blend with a spoon, not a mixer. Drop into greased muffin (or mini muffin) tins and bake at 350° for 20 minutes or until centers are set.

### Fresh Strawberry Short Cake Pie

This has been a staple at my spring table for many years. It can be made in a regular pie pastry, but you would miss the magic of the strawberry sauce seeping into the delicious thick shortbread crust. It is best if made in a deep-dish pie pan.

Crust:

1 cup Bisquick

3 tablespoons confectioners' sugar

3 Tablespoons water

3 Tablespoons softened butter

Mix to make a soft dough and press into greased pie pan. Bake at 340° for 8-10 minutes.

Filling:

1 cup sugar

3 Tablespoons strawberry Jello powder

3 Tablespoons corn starch

1 cup water

Mix sugar with cornstarch and Jello. Add water and cook on medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Arrange 1 quart slice strawberries in baked pie shell. Pour strawberry mixture over top. Refrigerate several hours or overnight until set. Serve with whipped cream.

### Chicken Crunch Casserole

This was an economical favorite that I served for mission teams and large groups, and there are many variations of this dish. Add your own spices or include grated cheese in topping. Serve alone or on white rice.

3 chicken breasts - cooked and diced ½ cup sour cream

1 can cream of chicken soup

1 teaspoon crushed tarragon

Mix above ingredients and spread in 8x12 buttered baking dish.

½ cup slivered almonds Topping:

1/2 sleeve of crushed ritz crackers 2 Tablespoons melted butter

Mix and add to top of chicken mixture. Bake for 20 minutes until sauce is bubbly and topping is brown. Serves six
