PROJECT IDEA: MAKE BLESSINGS BAGS FOR THE HOMELESS


Use a gallon size resealable plastic bag and include:




2024 AFFILIATE OF THE YEAR AWARD

The 2024 Legislative Session ended on March 1 after starting on January 16, 2024. It was an interesting and somewhat different session with some impact of more polarization this year as compared to previous years. There was also some behind closed doors politics happening without much public input or knowledge about the issues, which were rushed through quickly.

Overall Utah had a successful year with managing the state budget as Utah has historically been known for managing a well balanced and controlled budget. There are times when Utah's budget includes 30% of Utah's budget and we also have a Rainy Day Fund, which can be used when needed. Utah had a rainy day fund of \$1.9 billion at the end of fiscal year 2023, which includes the General Fund Budget Reserve and the Education Fund Budget Reserve.

As President of the Women's State Legislative Council of Utah, we had many legislators from both parties come speak to us about current bills, which have the potential of becoming law. There was a repeated bill regarding clergy reporting child abuse during confessional settings. This bill has been a topic on Capitol Hill for many years. This year, the Catholic Diocese decided not to oppose this legislation and it did pass. This House Bill (HB) was H.B. 432 sponsored by Representative Anthony Loubet, Republican and Senator Michael McKell. This bill says "When a member of the clergy reasonably believes that a child is the subject of ongoing abuse or neglect, the member of the clergy may report the information even if the perpetrator made a confession to the member of the clergy regarding the abuse or neglect." It was signed into law by Governor Cox on March 13, 2024 and will go into effect on May 1, 2024. This new Utah law supersedes "The Code of Canon Law a collection of laws and decrees that regulates the life and activities of the Catholic Church and its members" as per the Vatican website.

As we all know from the 2022 repeal of Roe vs Wade, states have individually been managing the abortion issues which have caused much chaos in various states with women needing to travel to other states to seek abortion. There are some states which are not considering rape or incest, or the life of the mother as Utah does have that consideration in their current statute. HB 560 Licensing Modifications passed this year, this is a modification of the 2023 passed bill which included closure of abortion clinics. This bill was sponsored by Representative Karen Lisonbee and Senator Dan McCay, both Republicans. It has been sponsored by previous Democrat legislators.



Let us please remember the seven themes of Catholic social teachings from the www.usccb.org website: 1.Life and Dignity of the Human Person, "The Catholic Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. This belief is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching. In our society, human life is under direct attack from abortion and euthanasia. The value of human life is being threatened by cloning, embryonic stem cell research, and the use of the death penalty." 2. Call to Family, Community, and Participation, "The person is not only sacred but also social. How we organize our society -- in

economics and politics, in law and policy -- directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. Marriage and the family are the central social institutions that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined. We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and wellbeing of all, especially the poor and vulnerable." 3. Rights and Responsibilities as "The Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Therefore, every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities--to one another, to our families, and to the larger society. **4.Option for the Poor and Vulnerable**, "In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first." 5. The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers, "If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected-the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative." 6. Solidarity as "At the core of the virtue of solidarity is the pursuit of justice and peace. Pope Paul VI taught that if you want peace, work for justice, "The Gospel calls us to be peacemakers. Our love for all our sisters and brothers demands that we promote peace in a world surrounded by violence and conflict," and 7. Care for God's Creation, as "We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions that cannot be ignored."
