## **Irish Poet from Galway!**

For our last program before our summer break, we are delighted to host Galway poet Kevin Higgins, as part of his poetry reading tour of New Mexico. (Prior to our meeting on the 8<sup>th</sup>, he will be appearing in Angel Fire and Taos.) Kevin is co-organizer of Over the Edge literary events in Galway, Ireland. He teaches poetry workshops at Galway Arts Centre, Creative Writing at Galway Technical Institute, and is Creative Writing Director for the NUI Galway Summer School. He has published four collections of poetry with Salmon Poetry, Co. Clare: *The Ghost in the Lobby* (2014), *Frightening New* 



Furniture (2010), Time Gentlemen, Please (2008), and his best-selling first collection, The Boy with No Face (2005), which was shortlisted for the 2006 Strong Award for Best First Collection by an Irish poet. A collection of Kevin's essays and book reviews, Mentioning the War, was published in 2012.

Kevin's poetry has been translated into Greek, Spanish, Italian, Japanese, Russian, and Portuguese. In 2016, *The Selected Satires of Kevin Higgins* was published by NuaScéalta. A pamphlet of Kevin's political poems, *The Minister for Poetry Has Decreed* was published in December by the Culture Matters imprint of the UK-based Manifesto Press. His poems have been praised by, among others, Tony Blair's biographer John Rentoul, Observer columnist Nick Cohen, and Sunday Independent columnist Gene Kerrigan; they have also been quoted in The Daily Telegraph, The Times (UK), The Independent, and The Daily Mirror. The Stinging Fly magazine recently described Kevin as "likely the most read living poet in Ireland." We also hear that he is **HILARIOUSLY FUNNY**, so for sure you don't want to miss this!

Kevin Higgins's New Mexico performance/reading tour is made possible by Culture Ireland.

We hope to see you there, and we hope you will bring a sweet or salty snack to share!



### The Irish Book Club

The Irish Book Club is now online! If you are on Facebook, just type The Irish Book Club into the search bar (or click on <a href="https://www.facebook.com/groups/2022642747761043/">https://www.facebook.com/groups/2022642747761043/</a>), and you'll find us. Right now we're reading May's book, *The Irish at Gettysburg*, by Philip Thomas Tucker. The discussion will start on June 1.



Our book for May was Stuart Neville's debut novel, *The Twelve* (published in the USA as *The Ghosts of Belfast*), which won the Mystery/Thriller category of the Los Angeles Times Book Prize, and was picked as one of the top crime novels of 2009 by both the New York Times and the LA Times. This novel is the first in a series of six.

Here's Amazon's description: "Northern Ireland's Troubles may be over, but peace has not erased the crimes of the past. Gerry Fegan, a former paramilitary contract killer, is haunted by the ghosts of the twelve people he slaughtered. Every night, at the point of losing his mind, he drowns their screams in drink. But it's not enough. In order to appease the ghosts, Fegan is going to have to kill the men who gave him orders. From the greedy politicians to the corrupt security forces, the street thugs to the complacent bystanders who let it happen, all are called to account. But when Fegan's vendetta threatens to derail a hard-won truce and destabilize the government, old comrades and enemies alike want him dead."

Here's IAS member Staci Downey's take: "I read this book several years ago. Wanting to refresh my memory, I went to my Goodreads review. I gave it three stars out of five and described it as 'A heart-pounding journey into the haunted psyche of a former bagman for the IRA. Great pulpy crime fiction."

And from Amazon reviewer M. Thornburg: "The Ghosts of Belfast is thriller fiction, bordering on horror. It is the most violent novel I've ever read. It's set in Belfast, Northern Ireland, in the first years of this century, several decades after the Troubles of the 1970s and 80s, and while that era of violence isn't even a memory to most of Belfast's younger residents, its repercussions are still being actively felt. The central character is Gerry Fegan, a Catholic/nationalist man in his 40s who was trained by the IRA from his early teens as a soldier and, because of his strength, courage, and intelligence, was used as a killer until in his 20s he was caught and held as a political prisoner. Furloughed from prison to attend his mother's funeral, he was given one more assignment – to plant a bomb in a butcher shop whose upper rooms were being used as a meeting place by the opposition. By accident, the bomb exploded too soon and killed three unintended victims—the butcher, a young woman, and her baby. Fegan, apparently hardened by all his experience, served out his remaining time. But now, years later, words spoken to him by the mother of a young man whose death he was involved in, and whose body was never found, have unlocked his guilt, and he is haunted by the ghosts of his victims.


The ghosts that haunt Fegan have a specific agenda. They want him to kill the individuals who "forced" him to cause their deaths. The novel's plot follows Gerry's efforts to do what his ghosts demand and the turmoil among his old associates and others that results from his efforts. But the ghosts are also real. I won't say how that's revealed, but when it is, we're forced to see Gerry Fegan for who he really is, a man who's been manipulated by history and politics and power and the ghosts themselves to commit acts that he himself, as a basically good person, cannot condone."

## The Albuquerque Traditional Irish Music Session is moving!

Join us on Thursdays, from 7pm to 10pm at our new location: Notz, (6132 4th St NW, Albuquerque).

The venue is in the plaza just to the east of the Lucky 66 Bowling Alley. Enter directly up the ramp, or go into the bowling alley, take a left and head up the stairs to Notz. We are about half a mile south of the old La Jolliesse venue on 4th Street. We will play in an intimate room with excellent acoustics and no obstructions, family-friendly, and with lighted parking and security. ### A message from IAS Member Dain Forsythe regarding the re-release of Randall Bays' album, The Salmon's Leap (first released in 1999):

Hello Irish Music lovers -

A quick note regarding Randal's recording here. As most of you know, I've had the honor and pleasure of accompanying Randal numerous times during his performances here in Albuquerque. His recordings have been highly influential for me as an accompanist—many may recall that in addition to his world-class Irish fiddle playing, Randal is also a world-class finger pick and rhythm guitarist. This particular album he is re-releasing has been at the top of my sack of CDs for years. If you haven't a copy, I encourage you to take advantage of this re-release of *The Salmon's Leap*. It's filled with treasures and delicate turns that exhibit the highest standard of contemporary Irish fiddle playing. If ever you find yourself with the opportunity to hear and see Randal perform live—don't hesitate. He's remarkable as a story teller as well. This is bucket list material.



## Music Review: This Day Too, Music from Irish America By Terence Winch, Michael Winch, and Jesse Winch

Imagine what might result if a wry poetic Irish wit were to comment upon the shameless (and confusing) goings on that do transpire during every episode of the hit HBO show, "Game of Thrones"! Laughter and mighty craic would ensue, surely! Toss in some top-shelf satirical musical deviltry and you have just one of the highlights—aptly titled "Lannister's Ball (Game of Thrones Song)"— of this fine recorded outing by some of Irish America's most treasured talents.

Terence Winch, the widely published Washington DC-based poet and fiction author, has been featured via his verse on Garrison Keillor's public radio poetry celebrations. Yet Terence, a master of the button accordion, and his brother, bodhran demon Jesse Winch are perhaps best known in Irish-American circles as founding members of the ORIGINAL Celtic

Thunder band (now renamed Narrowbacks), which has delighted East Coast audiences for decades, and producers of stunning albums that include Terence's famous, beloved, and oft-covered song, "When New York Was Iri sh."

This fine album, on which the Winch brothers are joined by Terence's son fiddler Michael Winch, picks up where the Original Celtic Thunder left us a few years ago, wandering about in hard New York days with a bunch of Irish-American reprobates, musicians, and bards conjuring times long past and waltzing us into this new century.

This is music that celebrates immigrants and their essential contributions to America, and does so in fine dancing style. Also along with the Winches for this wild joy-ride are an all-star cast of musicians including Patrick Armstrong, Tina Eck, Eileen Estes, Brian Gaffney, Conor Hearn, Seamus Kennedy, Nita Conley Korn, Zan McLeod, Brendan Mulvihill, Conor Murray, Dominick Murray, Madeline Warner, and (posthumously via recordings) the late Paddy Winch and PJ Conway. Professor Mick Moloney contributes lovely introductory notes to the cd package.

From the wistfully sad reminiscence of a lost Bronx neighborhood ("Childhood Ground"), to quietly joyful songs ("Welcome Home" and "This Day Too"), to rousing instrumental workouts ("The Wonder Hornpipe" and "The Thunder Reel"), this is a collection of music to enjoy many times over again and again. Highly recommended.


