

First and foremost, we know this is a very complicated and trying time for everyone due to COVID-19 and want you to know the health and safety of our community is our #1 priority in all decisions we have made below. We, as a theatre, must begin to make contingency plans for our future productions and summer camps that are so vital to our little theatre home. Since a lot of information from our state and

local authorities will be coming in closer to the end of May, we have decided to put out our current plan to allow for our summer camp program if we are given the green light from the state and local authorities to give us and you more time to prepare. We know this is a lot of new policies and changes to our regular camp experience but please know our goal is to maintain as much camp fun with great performances as possible while keeping each other healthy and safe. Please read through this entire email as there will be lots of new info and possible changes that will affect all campers. - 1. We will only have summer camp if and when the State of Texas and Harris County authorities give permission and we will follow all guidelines given by them. If we are not granted permission to have summer camps, all camp registrations will be refunded in full.
- 2. Camper Spots will be greatly limited to a smaller number in order to keep social distancing guidelines. We do have campers already signed up online and through mail and we will not be able to accommodate more spots once they are full.
- 3. We will require all campers and camp crew to have their temperature taken before leaving home and we will again take their temperature with a no touch + forehead thermometer upon arrival to theatre with their drop off representative present.

## 10 Secret Kitchen Ingredients That Can Help Your Garden Grow

## Who knew that these pantry ingredients were so good for the garden?



## Make flowers bloom like crazy with baking soda

If there were an award for most versatile of pantry ingredients, baking soda would certainly be a nominee. In addition to this baking soda hack, you can sprinkle it on the surface of your soil to make your gerani-

ums, coneflowers, daylilies and clematis bloom like crazy. That's because baking soda is alkaline, and those flowers thrive on alkaline soil.

#### Repel ants with cream of tartar

No one wants to share their outdoor dining table with ants, but if you're not inclined to use chemicals to keep them away, you can use cream of tartar instead. (Get a new jar here!) Simply sprinkle a bit of cream of tartar on the perimeter of the table or wherever you want to "dust their trail," recommends the Farmer's Almanac.

#### Repel squirrels with cayenne

Squirrels are adorable until they start digging up your daffodil and tulip bulbs. To deter them, sprinkle cayenne pepper around your bulb gardens. Reapply when you see the squirrels returned.

#### Erase algae with white vinegar

Forget renting a power washer! All you need to get rid of that unwanted icky green stuff on your patio is to spray it with full-strength distilled white vinegar.

#### Use baking soda for sweeter tomatoes

A more alkaline soil makes tomatoes sweeter. To grow sweeter tomatoes, simply sprinkle baking soda on the surface of your soil in your tomato garden.

#### Clean and condition garden tools with olive oil

Rub olive oil onto the cutting and digging surfaces of your garden tools, as well as on your lawn mower blades. This will repel dirt and rust and make it easier to clean them next time.

#### Fight fungus with baking soda

While baking soda doesn't kill fungus, you can use it to prevent fungus because its alkalinity creates an environment hostile to fungal growth. Simply stir a teaspoon of baking soda into a liter of water and spray the leaves of your fungus-prone plants (these include tomatoes and lilacs).

#### Turn pink hydrangeas blue with vinegar

Unlike baking soda, distilled white vinegar is acidic, and acidic soil is the secret to turning your pink hydrangeas blue. (Note: This doesn't work on white hydrangeas.) Vinegar also enhances the soil of acid-loving plants like azaleas, rhododendrons and gardenias. Use a cup of white distilled vinegar to a gallon of tap water.

#### Say goodbye to beetles with liquid dish soap

My biggest complaint with Japanese beetles is how they can quickly turn beautiful zinnia leaves into lacy remnants of their former selves. They also decimate over 300 other types of garden plants. Unfortunately, the best way to get rid of them is to hand-pick them off your plants...and drown



them in a mixture of water and dishwashing soap. Sorry...not sorry....we're talking zinnias here!

## Attract earthworms with coffee grounds

Adding coffee grounds to your soil benefits your soil by attracting earthworms and microorganisms (both of which make

your soil healthier and more fertile). But note: fresh coffee grounds are acidic, whereas used coffee grounds are neutral. If you are enhancing the soil of an alkaline-soil loving plant (such as geraniums or sweet tomatoes), then used coffee grounds are the way to go.



## Fireworks & Pets Don't Mix



Things to consider doing NOW to prepare for 4th July fireworks if you are a pet owner.

You know this happens two or three times a year! Fireworks scare cats and dogs. Consider making an investment by sound proofing a closet, a bathroom, a laundry room or an interior space with no windows. You can Google soundproofing. There are sound proof inserts and even soundproof wall paper. But the key is to do it now. You can't wait til July 1st.

Another thing to consider buying is a vest that calms cats and dogs by fitting snuggly around their bodies, just like if you were holding them. You have to order right away because they night take a week to ship.

Something else to consider is having a distraction like music (preferably soothing) near your pet before and during the fireworks. Have several treats handy so they can keep their minds off those loud booms.

If you have outdoor pets, please consider bringing them inside for the night. If you have a cage stored, now is a good time to set it up on your back porch. Have blankets and treats ready. Lock them down from sunset to sunup.

If your pet is likely to have a nervous breakdown, make a vet appointment this week. Talk to the vet and see if the vet recommends sedatives. You'll have to order them, and that takes time. Do this asap!

Some people recommend oils for pets. Those will have to be ordered on line unless you know a person who sells oils. Time is running out. Read more online or speak to a person who sells oils.

Google "ways to calm my pet" and read a few of the hundreds of articles. Prepare your fur baby as best as you can.




