According to the "US Department of Justice", a burglary is considered a home invasion when a resident is at home, which is the case 30% of the time.

Although burglaries can and do happen at any time, they are most common during daylight hours, and burglary numbers spike during the summer months. By learning how to properly secure and protect your home against invasions or burglaries at any time of the day or night, you can reduce your chances of being victimized.

Windows offer you a view to the outside, but unfortunately, it goes both ways. Criminals may look through windows to scout potential burglary targets, or to evaluate whether residents are home. Try not to leave valuables in plain sight near windows.

Install Smart Locks

Even with the best of intentions and good habits, anyone can forget to lock entry doors to their home on occasion. Many "Smart Lock Systems" will allow you to check the status of your doors remotely when away and lock anything that wasn't secured. With smart locks available at a variety of price points, this is a good option for homes in which residents frequently come and go.

Invest in a Home Security System

Keep your Doors Locked and Garage Shut

If doors are left unlocked, or the garage is open, burglars can enter when you go out for a walk, or even just in the yard. According to home security company, ADT, 34% of burglars enter through the front door, 22% coming through the back door and 9% walk through the garage.

• Avoid Confrontation with Anyone You Suspect is an Evil Doer

Always remember "Things" are far less important than your safety and the safety of your loved ones. Therefore, if you suspect that someone is on or near your property or the property of a neighbor is potentially an evil doer avoid any contact with the individual, and immediately without hesitation, call 911 for assistance and provide the operator with as much information as possible, to include your name, your address a description of the individual causing you concern and follow the directions provided you by the 911 operator.
