Kerry's Corner

In 2016, Discipleship Ministries began launching materials around the theme "See All the People." This message of reaching people and expanding the church into the community then began to bear fruit as churches began launching campaigns to strengthen their own disciple-making systems.

As they began preparation for this series, they noticed that one element seemed apparent throughout all the scriptural narratives: people who were always present around Jesus because of his preaching, teaching, and healing. Jesus truly saw all the people; and as a result, the people were always with him. As the church makes connections in the community to bring people to know Christ, we would do well to make note of the way Jesus responded to the crowds.



In the first week of the series, the pressing crowd is mentioned alongside Jesus' encouragement for his first disciples to go fishing. The image of the fish breaking the nets becomes an image analogous with the people "pressing in" on Jesus.

The second week recalls "a great crowd of Jesus' disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon" (Lk. 6:17). They were expecting Jesus to heal them. This image is a powerful one as we imagine the crowd relentlessly reaching for Jesus, that they might touch him and receive his healing power.

Week three involves a departure for our planning team, as we put ourselves in the shoes of the crowd listening to Jesus' sermon. The message of loving enemies was (and is) so countercultural that it still causes us to question our very instincts as powers threaten to overtake and divide us.

Week four, Transfiguration Sunday, presents a dramatic scene as Jesus is transfigured as he stands with Moses and Elijah. Jesus, Peter, John, and James then descended the mountain, and Jesus healed a boy with a demon—to the astonishment of "a great crowd" (Lk. 9:37).

Upon reflection of the entire season after Epiphany this year, we find a comprehensive way to make connections with our communities: discover our spiritual gifts, understand our need for one another and the love of God, and know that wherever Jesus goes, a crowd is sure to follow. The question is: "Are our churches ready to go and meet the crowds as we 'see all the people'?"


UM Women's Annual Tea

Message from the Green Team – Where's the Beef?

So. Where's the beef? In my diet, it has been greatly reduced. In our household, I do the grocery shopping and cooking. My wife is a vegetarian, and does the dishes. Out of necessity (and because I love her), I only occasionally buy beef, pork, or poultry. When I do treat myself to a burger on the grill, I throw a veggie burger on there, too. In many ways, I am better off for doing so.



Beef, pork, and poultry production has an enormously negative impact on the environment. As forests are razed, to increase land for grazing and the production of grains to feed livestock, as billions of cattle emit climate-warming methane, and as billions of gallons of fecal waste are stored, polluting our air, rivers, streams, and aquifers, the need to decrease our consumption of red meat is essential to our health, and to the health of our planet.

Dieticians recommend a reduction of our intake of red meats (and sugar) by half, while doubling the vegetables, fruit, legumes, and nuts that we eat. A glass of milk a day, or some cheese or butter, is okay, and an egg or two a week. Half of each plate should be vegetables and fruit, and a third should be wholegrain cereals.

Can you handle having beef three times a week instead of six? I know you can. If we can eat in a way that works for our planet as well as our bodies, we'll all be better off for it.



CDC Students at the Sailing Club



Alison Crum and Roy Marks in Concert

Allison Crum and Roy Marks will be performing at Burton Memorial Church on Sunday, February 10, 2019, starting at 2:00 pm in the Sanctuary. There will be a reception afterwards in the Fellowship Center. A donation of \$12.00 is suggested.



Alison Crum is one of the best-known British exponents of the viol. As teacher, performer, and moving spirit behind several well-known early music groups, she has travelled all over the world giving recitals and lectures and teaching at summer schools and workshops. After considering a career in meteorology, she decided to read music at university as a French horn player. While there she started playing the viol, and later went on to study it with Wieland Kuijken in Brussels and Jordi Savall in Basle. Since then she has made over one hundred recordings with some of Britain's finest ensembles; and, as a soloist, on discs of Marais, Bach, and virtuoso Italian divisions.

Alison is President of the Viola da Gamba Society of Great Britain, Professor of Viol at Trinity Laban Conservatoire in London, and a visiting teacher at several colleges and universities in both Europe and the USA. She is also the author of two highly acclaimed books on playing the viol, and has been called the doyenne of British viol teachers. Over the years her continuing interest in weather has led her to experience first-hand several exotic parts of the world – from dogsledging in Greenland to driving a Toyota Land Cruiser in Eritrea; and from climbing the more modest summits of the Himalayas to descending the depths of Death Valley.

Roy Marks is Alison's husband. In early childhood he began musical life playing the piano and, later, as a teenager, playing lead guitar in a rhythm and blues band. Rather than to conservatoires of music, however, he went to colleges of art to study – studies that culminated at the Royal Academy in London where he was awarded the prestigious David Murray scholarship for landscape painting.

Roy went on to teach painting and drawing in adult education; but, in his late thirties, he turned his attention almost exclusively to early music – to the recorder, the viol, and the lute.

Roy also edits, arranges, and composes music for his friends to play.

Together, Alison and Roy are very much occupied with playing music from the 16th to the 18th century, and they have collected a large number of copies of early instruments – all of which they play. As members of The Rose Consort of Viols they have recorded many CDs of English consort music; and, as teachers, they are popular on courses and workshops both over here in the USA as well as in Europe. In more recent years they have grown increasingly fond of the earlier repertoire represented in this concert.

Katie Lineberger, Executive Director of the united campus ministry serving the campuses of FIU, UM, and Miami Dade College. Katie helped us understand that privilege is rooted in culture, an innate thing that is not bad.

Those of us who are Anglo/Caucasian need not apologize for white privilege. Privilege, no matter whether it comes from being white or male or educated, is innate. It is bestowed upon you by society. White privilege doesn't mean you have never struggled; it means you have had no struggles based on race. Nor does privilege imply that all a white person has accomplished is unearned, nor does it negate the hard work needed to reach a level of success.

White privilege is being able to turn on your TV and see, for the most part, people of your own race; It's being able to live your life without being unfairly stereotyped, or racially profiled. It's living your life without others considering you suspicious or dangerous. It's a systemic bias, and one that we can, at least, recognize.





Confirmation Class 2019

Confirmation in the United Methodist tradition is a rite through which young Christians affirm the faith of the church, renew the vows of baptism, and commit to lives of discipleship as professing members of the United Methodist Church.

The "We Believe" student guide helps prepare young people for the rite of confirmation by teaching them about the Christian story and essential Christian beliefs, explaining distinctive United Methodist emphases, giving them a deeper understanding of the confirmation vow they may choose to take, and helping them live into those vows even before they are confirmed.



The "We Believe" confirmation program is grounded in these three core principles:

- Confirmation is the continuation of one's faith journey and the beginning of one's covenant relationship with the church.
- Confirmation is more than just a series of classes. Confirmands will be fully engaged in the life o the church through worship, service, small groups, and involvement in other ministries.
- Confirmands should emerge from their confirmation experience prepared for a life of Christian discipleship.
