

## THE LORD'S COMING IS COMFORTING!

(Is. 40: 1-5, 9-11; Ps. 85: 9-14; 2Peter 3:8-14; Mark 1:1-8)

*Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God.*

A few weeks ago the President announced that by the end of this year, the war in Iraq will finally be over and he will order all the troops to withdraw and return home to their families for the Christmas holidays. Since the announcement, the families of the soldiers have been preparing and waiting in hope and anticipation for the return of their love ones from the war zone. Waiting can be a tantalizing experience. Families are biding their time and praying that nothing bad happens to their loved ones in the war zone between now and Christmas. Just like the families of the troops in Iraq wait anxiously for the safe return of their loved ones, spouses wait eagerly for the arrival of their newborn baby. Preparations are made. Baby-showers are organized, and necessary items are acquired. Close friends and family members are often invited to wait expectantly and to share in the joy and fun of welcoming loved ones from trips, or the newborn baby.

Last Sunday's readings paint a picture of a people overwhelmed by trepidation and despair but enlightened by hope and dependency on God. Today's readings reflect on repentance and new beginnings. The context of today's first reading reveals the anxiety and the desperation of the Jewish exiles in Babylon. They are desperately waiting for freedom. Prophet Isaiah is consoling them and encouraging them to have hope. He assures them that God will intervene and bring them back from slavery to freedom. He is exhorting the people to have hope and be prepared for God's intervention in the coming of the Messiah – to “make straight...a highway for our God.” With the assurances of hope, the coming of the Lord will enable “every valley to be filled in, and every mountain and hill to be made low; and the rugged land to be made plain...” The Lord is coming to bring us back from the *foreign land* of pain and suffering – a *land* of fear and antipathy – a *land* where babies are aborted without any qualms of conscience – a *land* where unemployment and homelessness permeate – a *land* where sickness and hunger torment God's people. For us all, the Lord is coming this Advent and “His glory shall be revealed.” Whatever our problems in life might be, you and I should be hopeful and take heed of what the Lord says through Isaiah, “Comfort, give comfort to My people...”

Like those anticipating the return of their loved ones from exile – from overseas trips – the birth of a child – we must plan and prepare adequately throughout this Advent for the coming of the Lord at Christmas. Advent is a time for a new beginning! This is a time of grace that affords us an opportunity for a spiritual *start over*. It gives us the opportunity for true conversion! It is a time to ponder and to establish a new relationship with God, so that *the day of the Lord will not come like a thief upon us*. During this season we are challenged to look at our lives afresh. It's a time for us to humble ourselves, and like John the Baptist, admit that, “One mightier than I is coming...I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of His sandals.” We can do this by acknowledging our sins and confessing them; by reaching out to the poor, the less privileged and the weak. As one puts much energy into praying, preparing, and waiting patiently for the day of the safe return of a loved one or the birth of a child, you should all the more, prepare effectively by “conducting yourselves in holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God.”

### OUR PARISH GIVING TREE

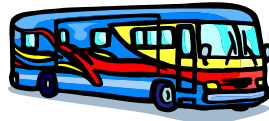

Next Sunday, December 11<sup>th</sup>, there will be a second collection to help support the retired religious of the New York Archdiocese.

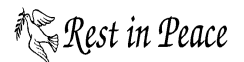
