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Always First Saturday in May

Growing up in Kentucky, the first Saturday in May is a big deal. That's because it's Derby Day! Also known as the "Run for the Roses®," it's been called the "most exciting two minutes in sports." And while the duration

is short, the build up to it can be quite the festive occasion.

At my house, while the gentlemen made plans for wagering, the ladies polished up the mint julep glasses, donned lovely hats and prepared our favorite Kentucky dish: Hot Browns! Consisting of



toast layered with turkey and ham, smothered in cheese sauce and topped with bacon and a slice of ripe tomato all broiled to bubbling perfection.

Almost as important as the race itself are the prerace traditions, particularly singing "My Old Kentucky Home," just prior to the start. Most people don't know all the words, so voices get a bit muted after the first two lines, but they spring back to life when we get to the chorus "weep no more my ladies," which everyone seems to know. Be sure to STAND during the singing of My Old Kentucky Home. It's tradition.

Beyond being the reason for a party, the Derby has a history, popularity, and rich traditions few American sporting events can match. Did you know it's the longest running sporting event in the country? Beginning in 1875, it has run uninterrupted for 143 years, even through the Great Depression and both World Wars. This year will be the 144th running of the Derby.

It all began in 1872 when Meriwether Lewis Clark, grandson of William Clark of Lewis and Clark fame, crossed the pond to Eurpoe and saw the Epsom Derby in England. He also enjoyed the French Jocky Club and returned to Louisville inspired and determined to replicate both a spectacle horse race and a Jocky Club experience.

Needing financial help to fulfill his dream, he turned to his uncles John and Henry Churchill who gave him the land for the racetrack and helped him organize a group of local racing enthusiasts into the Lousiville Jockey Club. The Club members raised money to build the permanent racetrack now well known as Churchill Downs. The track opened on May 17th, 1875, and the Club sponsored the first Kentucky Derby. With a field of fifteen three-year-old thoroughbreds racing 1.5 miles, cheered on by an estimated crowd of 10,000 specatators, Aristides won the first Kentucky Derby.

NBC TV coverage begins Saturday, May 5 at 2:30 p.m. The race is set to start at 6:46 p.m. As of mid-April, Bolt d'Oro is the favorite, but Justify, Audible, and Mendelssohn are names to watch. Happy Derby Day!



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

Advanced Care Directives: End of Life Planning and The Living Will

If you have ever been to the Emergency Room, hospital or even your doctor's office for a procedure or test, you have been given a sheaf of papers to sign indicating that you were advised of your rights to have an 'Advanced Care Directive' (ACD). Most of us just sign the papers without even looking at them. This month, I would like to tell you what these papers could mean to you or your loved ones.

Most people have heard the term 'living will'. A living will is a legally binding document that describes what kind of medical treatment or interventions you want to receive if you are terminally ill, in a persistent vegetative state or have an end stage disease. The living will is only one type of Advanced Care Directive. The living will takes effect when you become terminally ill. The document may cover topics such as "Do I wish to be resuscitated?"; "Do I want to be artificially fed or receive intravenous fluids when I am dying?"; "Do I want to be put on a ventilator when it may artificially prolong my life?", "Do I want to have my pneumonia treated when I only have a few days to live?" "Do I want to be transported to the hospital if I worsen?" or "Do I only want to receive 'comfort care'- pain meds and medications to ease breathing as I die?" The living will is legal once it is signed and witnessed. It takes effect only when you are unable to make your own decisions. Any patient can change their living will at any time if they are of sound mind.

Another type of Advanced Care Directive is called a medical power of attorney, health care proxy or durable medical power of attorney. These documents are usually state specific, meaning that each state may have slightly different legal requirements. These types of ACD are kept in the medical record and can be updated at your request. The medical power of attorney or health care proxy allows you to appoint someone - known as a proxy - to speak for and to make healthcare decisions for you, if you are unable to communicate your wishes. In a sense, these documents let you plan - ahead of time - what you would want done in case of a catastrophic situation such as a car wreck, massive stroke, massive heart attack, brain injury, coma or any condition that would render you unable to communicate or make decisions. It is legal only when a physician has declared you incompetent or unable to make medical decisions. The ACD forms are usually several pages long, covering specific scenarios you might potentially encounter. You initial the medical 'choice' you think you would make in that specific situation. When (if) the time comes, the proxy is legally responsible to indicate your wishes, acting on your behalf as if they were you! As you can see, it is extremely important that you choose your proxy carefully. Most patients use a nearby family member or someone they trust. Most ACD forms have a place for an alternate proxy if the first choice is unavailable or unwilling to serve. Your doctor or healthcare provider cannot be a proxy in most states.

Finally, A DNR or Do Not Resuscitate Order is not technically an Advanced Directive. It is an agreement made between the doctor and you (or your health care proxy) to not begin CPR if you stop breathing or your heart stops beating. The DNR order is placed on your chart or displayed in your home. Once the order is signed, the family cannot override it. This helps insure that your wishes are followed once the extended family arrives and begins to enter the often emotionally charged situation.

Many of us are living in the 'sandwich generation', somewhere between our children and aging parents. Putting an Advanced Healthcare Directive in place not only makes good sense for your parents; it makes good sense for you! Georgia now has one single document called the Georgia Advance Directive for Healthcare that combines the living will and the medical durable power of attorney. Google search for Georgia Advance Directive for Healthcare for this four part document and fill it out today!

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

Another Look at DeKalb's Recycling Program

It's a small thing that creates big results... participating in DeKalb County's curbside recycling program. If you receive garbage pickup from DeKalb's Sanitation Division, you're eligible to participate in the Residential Recycling Program. This program is easy to join and to use! All acceptable, recyclable materials go into one county-approved recycling container – placed at your curb on collection day. Sorting recyclable material is NOT required!

The county has put together a lot of information on its website about the "why" and "how" of its many sanitation collection services. Be sure to check out the site at: www.dekalbsanitation.com.

Meanwhile, here are the highlights of the newest changes to the Residential Recycling Program:

Two recycling container options became available in September 2017. A standard, 35-gallon recycling roll cart has replaced the 18-gallon recycling bin and the 40-gallon recycling bags. (You can continue to use 40-gallon recycling bags until your inventory is fully depleted.) A 65-gallon recycling roll cart upgrade option is available (for a one-time \$15.00 fee). If you are a new recycling subscriber, you will receive a complimentary 35-gallon roll cart after you enroll — or you can pay the one-time fee to receive the bigger, 65-gallon roll cart for recycling.

If you still have an 18-gallon blue bin, DeKalb's Sanitation Division will service it for now, but you need to trade it in for a 35- or 65-gallon roll cart by the end of this year (deadline extended to December 28, 2018). The bins are being "recycled" – or repurposed – for use in the DeKalb County School District's recycling program.

Also, you've likely heard about a change in the county's recycling procedures for glass. The county has stopped accepting glass in its curbside, single-stream, recycling program. The county made those changes to ensure residents' glass will be processed in a responsible and environmentally friendly way. To help residents effectively participate, DeKalb County has set up several sites that accept glass food and beverage containers.

All glass items intended for recycling must be separated from other recyclable materials and taken to one of the locations where county-operated containers receive these items. Probably the most convenient location for Smoke Rise residents is Fire Station 22 at 1859 Montreal Road, Tucker, GA 30084. Look for the container in the front area, to the right of the building. For a complete list of DeKalb County's glass drop-off locations, procedures, and what types of glass are accepted, go online to www.dekalbsanitation.com.

Although not ideal, residents who do not want to sort their glass and drop it off at a recycling center should throw it away with the rest of the non-recyclable trash.

Requests for recycling roll carts can be submitted by mail, email, online, or in person at the Sanitation Division's administrative office. A recycling subscription form is available online and must be completed for all roll cart requests. Recycling bin trade-ins are processed at the Sanitation Division's administrative office, 3720 Leroy Scott Drive, Decatur, GA 30032, Monday through Friday, from 7:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m.

Residents also have the option to attend one of several roll cart exchange events. The list of roll cart exchange events, with dates/times/and locations can be found online at the sanitation web site. (Look for the "Recycling Events" link.)

These recycling container changes provide subscribers with more durable and practical recycling container options and support the Sanitation Division's move toward safer and more efficient recycling collection using fully automated collection vehicles. More than 87,000 of the Sanitation Division's 150,000+ households serviced are subscribed to the single-stream recycling program.

By recycling, we save energy and natural resources. Smoke Risers, please help

keep our community "green" by lining our streets with blue every week. 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
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The Mountain Mums Had a Crafty April


Smoke Rise Community Garden Update

Plans are moving right along for the Smoke Rise Community Garden. The old beds have been removed, the soil turned and bulldozed into Tucker's biggest compost pile. 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HODGE PODGE

I don't know about you, but I think I may have reached my "sell-by" date. While eating oatmeal, a chunk of my back molar broke off. This added to my calcium intake for the day-- because I swallowed it, of course. Then the tooth next to it got all wonky, so I had to have two crown preps and a root canal--all in a three-day span! The fun never stops! Since these fillings are about 55 years old, I guess I got my money's worth. But wow! Then my eye doctor says I have cataracts and myopic macular degeneration. This just means I can't see... which I already knew. So I guess I'll win the lottery and have that surgery done soon. Next I figure my hearing will go. Let me rephrase that: MY HEARING IS SQUIRRELLY! WHAT? EH? SPEAK UP! So all this falling apart and getting old stuff is my motivation for a cocktail or two and a few nibbles. I am trying to be diligent about my backside spread keeping up with my front-side droop. These wafers are one of my new favorites:

Parmesan Wafers

2 cups freshly grated Parmesan cheese (not the stuff in a jar or bag...it has cornstarch in it)

1 3/4 cups plain flour

2 sticks real salted butter

1 teaspoon dill weed

Whirl the cheese and butter in food processor until it starts to combine. Add flour and whirl it around using the on-off pulsing button until it comes together. Dump on waxed paper and form into two 12-inch long logs, about 2 inches round. I made mine square because I'm no good at keeping things round. Wrap and refrigerate at least an hour. Cut 1/3 inch thick with serrated knife. Place one inch apart on parchment lined cookie sheets. I use insulated cookie sheets. Bake at 350° for about 25 minutes or until just starting to brown. Cool on racks. These are wonderful and amazing with champagne, by the way.

I only wanted to make half this recipe. After about an hour, I finally figured out that half of 1 3/4 cups flour had to be done as tablespoons. So for half recipe, use 1-cup cheese, 1 stick butter and 14 Tablespoons flour. I drove myself crazy trying to do that math, so I had to have an extra glass of wine. And then I forgot the dill, but I really didn't care. You can use rosemary finely chopped too, but I think rosemary tastes like pine trees, so that's why I used dill.

The wafers would be wonderful with soup or a salad, and I had a hankering for copper penny salad and made a big one that I'm still eating on out of the fridge. If you haven't made it for a while, make this and experiment with all the veggies you love.

Copper Penny Salad with extras

Dressing: 1 can tomato soup, undiluted 1/2 cup oil (not olive or motor)
Scant 1 cup sugar 3/4 cup apple cider vinegar salt and pepper

Mix well and set aside. Cook about 1-2 pounds of peeled carrots, cut into "pennies". Put hot carrots in dressing; this ensures that the sugar dissolves well. Add 1 small sliced onion and 1 sliced bell pepper. I added cooked green beans and brussels sprouts because they were left over. Delicious! Stir well, cover and refrigerate. Lasts for at least a week in refrigerator. The dressing is wonderful on spinach, bacon and avocado too.

Ok... This shrimp spread is from my pretend niece Carter. We beg her to bring it to every family gathering and it always gets gobbled up. It is a wonderful appetizer and easy. Carter is one of my heroes.

Shrimp Spread

3 cans shrimp (there seems to be only one size can with tiny shrimp in it. It's a medium sized can. That's all I can tell you.) 1 stick of room temp butter

1 really small diced onion - be cautious so it's not too oniony 1/2 cup mayonnaise

1 teaspoon worchestershire sauce

Salt and pepper

Drain shrimp and just mix everything together until it holds together. Note that there is no cream cheese in this...I was surprised too! Carter's directions say to "mush" it together. I like technical culinary terms like that.

Refrigerate, covered, overnight, and serve with crackers. If you really go to town with this and combine super, super well, it's somewhat like what the British call potted shrimp. It makes darling tea sandwiches.
