EXHIBITING AT THE FAIR

1. Online entry is required for ALL JUNIOR EXHIBITORS. Online entry is accessed at the following:

http://marquettecountyfairwi.fairentry.com/

- 2. All exhibitors must comply with Marquette County Fair Rules and ATCP 160 General Requirements and Definitions.
- 3. If you have any questions regarding rules, requirements or entry procedures, contact the Fair Office at 608-296-5200 or by email at <u>marquettefairwi@gmail.com</u>.
- 4. All departments include requirements and/or class/lot specific instructions. Please make sure to read and follow all special instructions. If requirements are not followed, the overall placing will be dropped one place level. (For example, if the items in the sample were not pinned together with a note card as directed, and the exhibitor received a 1st placing, it would be reduced to 2nd place for not following the requirements.
- 5. As an exhibitor we ask that you respect the following:
 - Smoking is not allowed in any buildings on the grounds.
 - Vehicle and trailer parking is NOT allowed around the barns except during loading and unloading of animals.
 - Livestock trailers must be parked in the designated areas as determined by the Fair Board.
- 6. Camping is allowed only in designated areas on the grounds for a fee. Complete the form and include fee with all camping reservations.

WHO CAN EXHIBIT

<u>Who can exhibit</u>: Junior exhibitors need to be members of Marquette County and/or belong to a local youth organization that is in or extends in Marquette County to exhibit at the fair. They must however meet the following: at least be in 3rd grade but under 20 years of age as of January 1 of the fair year and belong to and be in good standing in 4-H, FFA, Scouts, breed groups or any other youth organization under adult supervision that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board.

Junior exhibits are not eligible for entry in Open Class.

FAIR RULES

(1) All Fair entries will close at 4:30 p.m. on June 4, 2022. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPT-ED. Entries are to be completed through <u>http://</u> <u>marquettecountyfairwi.fairentry.com/</u>

(2) Only one article under each Lot Number may be entered by the exhibitor except where

specified.

(3) Only articles which have never been displayed before will be accepted.

(4) All work must be done by the exhibitor.

(5) All exhibitors are required to carry liability insurance on exhibits. Proof of insurance may be required

(6) Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., nor Marquette County, shall neither be liable for any loss or damage to exhibits.

(7) Each exhibitor must securely attach official Marquette County Fair entry tags to the article to be exhibited. All tags must be affixed before approaching the judges or entry table. Untagged articles will not be accepted.

(8) Fair management reserves the right to dispose of ALL food exhibited.

(9) Department superintendents have full charge of exhibits and their arrangements.

(10)The Board of Directors of the Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., has the final decision on all rules. Any complaints must be made in writing. Any emergency not provided for in these rules shall be referred to the Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., and their decision shall be final. (11) Ribbons and entry tags and all other non-animal exhibits must be picked up AFTER 4:00 p.m. on Sunday.

(12) No dogs allowed on Fairgrounds, except Service Dogs, per county ordinance 80.16, but are subject to Fairgrounds Article IV subchapter.

MEAT ANIMAL AUCTION

Sale order is as follows for each species: Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Master Showman, All others by number drawn

Market Hogs - All market hogs must grade No. 3's. Any market hog weighing under 220# will not be permitted to sell through the auction and any market hog over 300# will sell at 300#. NOTE THIS IS A TERMINAL SHOW.

Market Lambs - All Market Lambs must grade Choice or better and weigh a minimum of 95#.

Market Meat Goats - All Market Meat Goats must grade Choice or better and weigh a minimum of 50#.

Market Beef - All Market Beef must grade Select or better and weigh a minimum of 1000# for beef steers, 1150# for dairy steers, 950# for beef heifers, and 1100# for dairy heifers. AOB animals to show and sell under the minimum weights must be registered and may be required to be DNA tested to prove parentage.

Market Rabbits and Poultry: Market Rabbits and Poultry will be exhibited by age and/or weight based on fair premium list entry lots. Poultry animals must meet all health test requirements and/or have necessary health certificates (for example, NPIP certificate; DATCP-issued certificate; pullorum-typhoid test; or mycoplasma gallisepticum test--turkeys).

ANIMAL/LIVESTOCK RULES

(1) All required animal health records must be presented to the appropriate Animal/Livestock Superintendent prior to the unloading of animals. Unloading must be done only with the approval of the appropriate Animal/Livestock Superintendent. No animals will be unloaded until the Superintendent clears you for unloading .

(2) All animals exhibited should be identified by registration name and number or by eartag number. Rabbits are to be tattooed. Any other arrangements must be made with the Fair board in conjunction with the designated veterinarian prior to the start of the fair.

(3) All animal/livestock exhibitors must clean their pens, stalls, or cages and check-out with the appropriate Animal/Livestock Superintendent before leaving the fairgrounds or forfeit their premium money.

(4) Stall rent for OPEN CLASS and JUNIOR DIVISION animals will not be charged. All feed and bedding must be furnished by the exhibitor.

(5) Livestock that has been properly fitted and given proper care will be eligible to receive premium money. All animals that are in poor condition or that show lack of care, as identified by Animal/Livestock Superintendent, will be disqualified and no prize money awarded.

(6) Vehicles and trailers will not be allowed to park in the barn area at any time during the fair except for unloading and loading.

(7) Livestock trailers must be parked in the designated area.

(8) If in any AOB class we have 3 of the same breed they will, at the discretion of the Superintendent, be broken into their own class in the show. This will be determined after animal check in at the fair and posted in the show order.

It is the exhibitor's responsibility to follow Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) Animal Health Rules and Regulations for animals exhibited at the Marquette County Fair.

Purpose:

To give children 4-8 years-of-age an opportunity to show beef or dairy calves at the Marquette County Fair.

Advance registration is suggested to estimate the number of participants however any child can show by registering the day of the show.

Register by calling UW-Extension 608-297-3141, or with the Dairy Superintendent the day of the show.

Requirements:

Ages are of January 1st of the exhibit year.

Calves may be brought on the day of the show (Saturday) and taken home the same day. If a stall is needed, check with Dairy Superintendent. Calves must be born after April 1st of the exhibit year and may be either sex and any breed.

Exhibitors show at their own risk. Marquette County Youth Organization Association, Inc., is not responsible for injuries.

All exhibitors will be awarded a T-shirt and a Participation Ribbon, sponsored by Sand Country Veterinary Service, Westfield.

No artificial filling/drenching or animals will be allowed at any time on Marquette County Fairgrounds. Artificial filling/drenching applies to any substance applied in any way (i.e., bottle feeding, syringe, IV, stomach pumps and other methods). If there is an animal wellness concern, the Marquette County Fair veterinarian should be consulted.

No medicines can be given to an animal at the show without a veterinarian's or the species superintendent's approval.
