'Step Twelve'

“Having had a spiritual awakening, as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.”



He said: Alcoholic, there is no “spiritual path.” Each of us makes our spiritual life as we journey, Step by Step. Sponsors guide us with their experiences towards our own path.

Emotional sobriety is where my actions enhance my life and the lives of those around me. Achieving physical sobriety is Step One. Maintaining physical sobriety and walking towards emotional sobriety and spirituality comes through all three legacies of Alcoholics Anonymous: Recovery (The 12 Steps), Unity (The 12 Traditions), and Service (The 12 Concepts).

Through these legacies I have learned that the object of my love is my Higher Power, my Fellowship, and now, only through these relationships, I can count myself among the objects of my love. Freedom from the bondage of self loathing is a gorgeous reality.

My actions say, “I love you.” When I give back what I have received in sobriety through Recovery, Unity and Service.

In Service I found a noble reason for the sober life. The Path Within blossoms by carrying the message to the still suffering alcoholic, the spirit of Tradition Five.

Being a GSR opened new horizons in sobriety. In service I have noble friends on the path of spiritual sobriety. The fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous in Area 17, the Hawaiian Islands, is alive and carrying the message.

A General Service Representative, GSR, carries their group’s conscience through the District, to the Area, to the General Service Conference and vice versa. This communication through the service structure is how we become aware of the yearly changes to the structure and guidelines of Alcoholics Anonymous. Communication and leadership through the group conscience are the two primary functions of the GSR. As the GSR, I came to understand that the group conscience is my higher power in action.

I recognized the reformatory power of giving on a trip to India my first year sober. Mother Teresa is a hero of mine, and I chose to volunteer for six weeks at her “home for the dying” in one of the poorest slums in India. I was to be working with some of the most deformed, destitute children in the world. It was a gated community, and the gate was not to protect what lie inside, but more allegorically, to separate the dying from the outside. It was a community referred to as “The Untouchables” by the Indian caste system. In essence, these children were the cast-offs of society. As I walked there my first day, I imagined the strength I would need to witness the poverty and imperfections these children had to bear. Every muscle twitched with the instinct to turn and run. I feared I would not be capable of “withstanding” it. No one would know if I didn’t follow through with my plan. I was alone, and everyone had encouraged me not to go. I continued.

What did I discover? That each of these little beings had been created differently, but it inspired appreciation for their originality. The children didn’t know their fate within the confines of these walls. They were a joyous clan filled with camaraderie. Many children didn’t have legs so naturally the other kids carried them from place to place. On that first walk I sensed blindly that I would find “God” there. On the walk home, that evening, I knew I had. Through working with these children, and the nuns that cared for them, I recognized my own belief of being an “untouchable.” I had imprisoned myself in an illusion of separation and my drinking kept that illusion strong. The TRUTH was that I could not feel love until I extended it. I must give love, and practice it, to feel it. I had remained “untouchable” until I reached out. I saw such unique creation in each of those little

The meeting lasted over 2 hours with each of us sharing a little about how we stay sober today. Sobriety is epic.

November in Our History:

Nov. 1952: A Grapevine Article: “Two years ago on Nov. 16th, 1950, Dr. Bob died at his home in Akron, Ohio. It was Thursday, close to noontime, one week before what would have been his 71st Thanksgiving Day. It was 15 years and 5 months after his own last drink, and it was 15 years and 5 months in which he had personally ministered as friend, teacher and physician to 5000 alcoholics. To each of them he was simply “Dr. Bob” and to history he will be “Co-Founder of Alcoholics Anonymous.” To Bill W. he is “The Prince of Twelfth Steppers” and “The Rock upon which AA is founded.” Dr. Bob met his death serenely for he had to the fullest given himself to life. He left the rich gifts of Simplicity, Love and Service. We who followed him in “The Way Out” give him thanks anew for the message he so tirelessly carried. We think this man who learned true humility would most like the memorial that is still to come ... Those thousands now sick and despairing who will yet find our way out of dilemma into recovery, strengthened by the invisible hand of Dr. Bob.

Nov. 1st, 1934: ‘Ebby’s surrender date’ in the Oxford Group. This is 3 weeks before he calls on his old friend, Bill Wilson, with the message of sobriety (Big Book p. 9, 10, 11, 12).

Nov. 1943: Groups in New York City celebrate A.A.’s 8th anniversary, attended by over 800 members. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale is the guest speaker.

Nov. 1964: Lyndon B. Johnson was the first U.S. president since Lincoln to recognize alcoholism as a health issue. One of his first actions in office was to appoint an advisory committee to John W. Gardner, Sec. of Health, Ed. & Welfare, on priorities concerning alcoholism. This action by President Johnson didn’t come out of nowhere, his father died of alcoholism.

Nov. 1968: The First International Conference of “Young People in AA” held at Niagara Falls, New York.

Concept XII (Prudence)

The Conference shall observe the spirit of A.A. tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that the sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and, whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government, and that, like the Society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought & action.

- ✓ How do we guard against becoming a “seat of perilous wealth or power?”
- ✓ How do we practice prudent use of our Seventh Tradition contributions and literature revenue?
- ✓ Do we insure the spiritual liberties of all A.A. members by not placing any member in the position of absolute authority over others?
- ✓ Do we try to reach important decisions by thorough discussion, vote and, where possible, substantial unanimity?
- ✓ As guardians of A.A.’s traditions, are we ever justified in being personally punitive?
- ✓ Are we careful to avoid public controversy?
- ✓ Do we always try to treat each other with mutual respect and love?

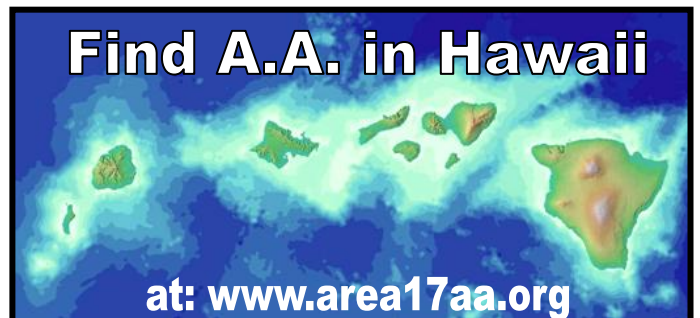

Kauai Intergroup Report

For Budget Assembly, October 5,6, 2013

MEETINGS: We have 69 meetings on Kauai. Eighty-five percent are wheel chair accessible. We have no known deaf or blind AA members. Forty percent of the meetings are on the beaches. Most non- beach meetings pay five dollars rent per meeting. We do not have insurance costs. We estimate we have 170 active AA's on Kauai.

TELEPHONE: Our phone system is virtual and is covered 24/7 usually in eight hour shifts. There are a few complaints but overall the system is working well.

EVENTS: Intergroup funds (usually \$100-150 per event) island events on request from the chair of the event and the vote of IG members. We have about eight major events per year. Thanksgiving is the biggest and attracts about 100 participants for Big Food, two meetings, a raffle, an Al-Anon meeting and musical entertainment.

WEBSITE: Our website is a real staple for our island AA's. It has been in operation three years, has had a total of 35,589 hits, and is now logging in 5,000 hits per month

SCHEDULES: In addition to having the full schedule on the website, we produce paper schedules about three times a year for visitors, members, our PI racks, the Emergency Rooms of the Hospitals and a few doctors' offices.

TREASURY: Our present balance is \$3,916.

NEWSLETTER: Our Garden Island Sobriety newsletter is six pages of welcomed information containing recovery columns, meeting changes, birthdays, finances of Intergroup and District and a cherished Archives section. It is available in color with online subscription and in black and white from the GSRs.

LITERATURE: IG handles books and pamphlets for sale and to supply AA racks around the island. The

stock is kept in a locker which is kept tidy and documented by our literature chair. Only three people have the combination to the locker.

Kauai Intergroup meets once a month, is attended by 10-14 people, and is in good shape.
