Outstanding Taxes Due December 31st

A reminder that any outstanding taxes are due on December 31st, 2021 otherwise are subject to an 18% penalty on January 1st, 2022.

Bylaw 309-2020 in place for Snow Clearing, Removal and Storage

In 2020, the Summer Village's public works department along with several contractors completed an extensive drainage upgrade project in several areas. One issue affecting the drainage in the Summer Village is the continued and deliberate placement of snow into the ditches during the winter months which eventually freezes into ice and affects the flow of water through the culvert system during the spring thaw. Under the newly passed Bylaw 309-2020 which is now in effect, and in order to protect the Summer Village's infrastructure and drainage system, the bylaw clearly outlines unauthorized clearing, removal or storage of snow debris as follows:

- 3.1 All Snow Debris cleared on a residential lot shall remain on the subject parcel, unless being hauled outside of municipal boundaries or to designated snow storage facilities within the community as may be designated by Council from time to time.
- 3.2 No Owner or Occupant of any private property within the Summer Village of Silver Sands shall remove Snow Debris from a private property and allow it to be stored or transferred:
 - (a) On to or push across any Highway, Roadway, Laneway or other municipal or provincial vehicular or pedestrian traffic route;
 - (b) On to any Public Lands, and particularly any road right-of-way, ditch, drainage swale, culvert channel, sidewalk or drainage egress within the municipality;
 - (c) On to any other private property within the municipality, whether owned by the same property owner as the originating lot or otherwise, without the expressed approval of Council and whereby such approval may be conditional on any protections or provisions deemed reasonable by the Chief Administrative Officer.

For the purposes of this section, where it is apparent the material originated from the land, the person owning or occupying the land shall be responsible.

Non-compliance under this bylaw can result in enforcement measures including a minimum and specified penalty for a violation of any provision being a fine in the amount of \$500.00, and, if a person violates the same provision of this bylaw twice, the minimum and specified penalty for the second and subsequent violation shall be a fine in the amount of \$1,000.00.

Please do your part to help protect and promote the general good operation of the core infrastructure and planning improvements throughout the Summer Village. If residents are seeking a location to move their snow to, please let the Administration office know and at that time we will endeavor to find a location.

A Reminder to Build Yourself a 72-Hour Emergency Kit!

In an emergency, you will need some basic supplies. By taking a few simple steps today, you can become better prepared to face a range of emergencies. Individuals and families should be prepared to be self-sufficient for a minimum of 72 hours. On this page you will find emergency kit lists to help you and your family become more prepared. The items below will not apply to every situation or every person. Personalize your kit to suit your particular situation. Here are some basic items to consider for your emergency kit:

- ✓ Three-day supply of water (4 L per person per day)
- ✓ Non-perishable food for all family members and pets (three-day supply)
- ✓ First-aid kit
- ✓ Flashlight, battery-powered radio and extra batteries
- ✓ An extra set of car keys, credit cards, and cash
- ✓ Sanitation supplies
- ✓ Extra eyeglasses or contact lenses
- ✓ Important family documents and contact numbers
- ✓ Prescriptions or special medications
- ✓ Chargers for electronic communication devices
- ✓ Insurance documents
- ✓ Emergency phone numbers list
- ✓ A change of clothes for each family member

Fire Services/Insurance

Did you know that the cost of fire suppression by the fire department is payable by the property owner? In our area we have seen the cost of fire suppression for a structure fire as high as \$28,000 and for a wildland (grass fire) as high as \$12,000.



Be sure to check your home insurance policy or talk to your insurance agent about what exactly your policy covers and how much it covers. Besides inquiring about your home structure fire insurance, we encourage you to inquire about wildland insurance (for a grass fire that happens but never reaches a structure).

ALSO, be aware that should the fire department be dispatched by 9-1-1 to your residence for any reason (house alarms including false alarms, campfire, downed utility line, etc.) you, as the property owner, will receive an invoice. The only exception is for medical response calls (assisting Alberta Health Services) – there is no charge for these calls.







SAFE & HAPPY HOLIDAYS - FIRE SAFETY TIPS

As we approach the holiday season, let's keep it safe by following a few fire safety tips.

Home Fire Escape Plan -Take the time to make a home fire escape plan, and practice it; you never know when you and your family might need it.

Fireplace – Have your chimney inspected and cleaned by a professional. Ensure the flue is open before lighting up. Avoid burning wrapping paper, which may create a dangerous flash fire.

Indoor/Outdoor Decorative Lighting – Using decorative lighting correctly can be the difference between happy holidays and having more than just chestnuts roasting on an open fire. Follow these Do's and Don'ts on decorative lighting to prevent injuries and fires.

Do's

- Use lights with a safety certification (CSA, ULC, etc.).
- Replace old or damaged lights.
- Plug outdoor lights into a GFCI outlet.
- Turn off the lights when going to bed or leaving the house.

Don'ts

- Use inside-only decorative lights outside.
- Use electric lights on a metallic tree.
- Run electrical cords through or across doorways or under carpets.
- Overload the circuit by plugging too many lights

Holiday Tree – Always place the tree out of the way of foot traffic and do not block doorways or exits to the outside. Make sure the tree is well-secured in a sturdy stand, and place it away from any heat sources, including fireplaces and burning candles.

- **Artificial Tree** Look for the "fire resistant" label, which indicates that the tree will resist burning and should extinguish quickly.
- **Real Tree** Make sure it's green, the needles are difficult to pull from branches, and don't break easily when bent. Cut a few inches off the trunk to expose fresh wood, allowing better water absorption, and preventing the tree from drying out prematurely. Immediately dispose of the tree as soon as the holidays are over, or when the tree is dried out.
