Metal Detecting for Arizona Meteorites

Information about meteorites being found with metal detectors.

For millions (maybe billions) of years, meteorites have been falling from the sky. Meteorites are where you find them, and can be found anywhere on the earth's surface. Scientist's believe that meteorites are reaching earth at a much greater rate than in the past years. Some meteorites may be as old as a million years in arid climates such as desert regions. Most meteorites in humid regions are destroyed (weathered away) within a few thousand years.

It is intriguing to know that a magnet attached to wooden sticks, now know as magnetic canes have been used since the 1930's to recover iron and stony-iron meteorites.

Today, metal detectors have made it more feasible to search for meteorites. In large, strewn fields of iron or stony-irons, meteorites may be buried by several feet of overburden.

Most of these areas can be worked by metal detectors to recover some of the larger, deeper fragments. Most of all the VLF model of detectors, work well for meteorite hunting. Although, most of the known strewn fields have been heavily worked, the Pulse Induction (PI) metal detectors are now becoming popular due to their superior depth abilities.

There are several different types of meteorites. 1. Iron. 2. Stony Iron. 3. Chondrite 4. Carbonaceous Chondrite.and 5. Achondrite.

Don't let the names throw you. If your metal detector reacts to it and it has some weight to it, keep it.

The Gold Basin, located in Mojave County is known for a large amount of meteorites. These fields were located by prospectors searching for gold in the region. For many years, prospectors were annoyed by the amount of hot rocks that were being detected. Low and behold, many of these so-called "Hot Rocks" were valuable meteorites that were being discarded as worthless material.

In some areas, prospectors were piling them up in large piles so they could metal detect certain areas for gold nuggets. Thousands of electronic gold & meteorites have been found that resemble the original gold basin meteorite.

They have been found in the Gold Basin, King Tut, White Hills, Golden Rule, White Elephant, Temple Bar and Hualapai Wash.

Due to the amount of Gold Basin Meteorites that have been recovered over the last several years the market has been flooded, and the price and value have dropped.

The Arizona Gold Claims that the Gold Searchers Of Southern Nevada presently hold, have produced large numbers of Meteorites as well as Gold.

If you believe that you have a possible meteorite that was found in Arizona, here is an address and phone number to help out during the identification process:

While out hunting for gold, or just out roaming the desert, you probably have walked by a meteorite and wasn't able to identify it.

A suggestion, anything that looks out of place that is heavy and black may be a meteorite. Pack it back out with you and have it checked out to see if it is a meteorite.

I'm not a serious meteortie hunter, but enjoy hearing about other finds besides gold nuggets. I know several guys personally that have done really well searching for space rocks, so the potential is out there. I hope that your success is as good as theirs.

How old is Grandpa?

One evening a grandson was talking to his grandfather about current events. The grandson asked his grandfather what he thought about the shootings at schools, the computer age, and just things in general.

The granddad replied, "Well, let me think a minute, I was born, before television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, Frisbees and the pill.

There was no radar, credit cards, laser beams or ball-point pens. Man had not invented pantyhose, air conditioners, dishwashers, clothes dryers, and the clothes were hung out to dry in the fresh air and man hadn't yet walked on the moon.

We listened to the Big Bands, Jack Benny, and the President's speeches on our radios. And I don't ever remember any kid blowing his brains out listening to Tommy Dorsey. If you saw anything with 'Made in Japan' on it, it was junk. The term 'making out' referred to how you did on your school exam. Pizza Hut, McDonald's, and instant coffee were unheard of. We had 5 & 10 cent stores where you could actually buy things for 5 and 10 cents. Ice cream cones, phone calls, rides on a streetcar, and a Pepsi were all a nickel. And if you didn't want to splurge, you could spend your nickel on enough stamps to mail 1 letter and 2 postcards

You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600 but who could afford one? Too bad, because gas was 11 cents a gallon. In my day, 'grass' was mowed, 'coke' was a cold drink, 'pot' was something your mother cooked in, and 'rock music' was your grandmother's lullaby, 'Aids' were helpers in the Principal's office, 'chip' meant a piece of wood, hardware' was found in a hardware store, and 'software' wasn't even a word. We were the last generation to actually believe that a lady needed a husband to have a baby. No wonder people call us "old and confused" and say there is a generation gap. ...and how old do you think I am ???.

This man would be only 58 years old!
