New College's President O'Shea Wins Major Math Award

President Donal O'Shea of New College of Florida is a co-winner of the 2016 American Mathematical Society's Leroy P. Steele Award for Exposition, one of the highest distinctions in mathematics. O'Shea and fellow mathematicians David Cox and John Little received the award for their 1992 book *Ideals, Varieties and Algorithms*. Its fourth edition was released this year.

The book, nicknamed CLO for its authors' initials, is known as a classic for making the complex field of algebraic geometry widely accessible. "Even more impressive than [the book's] clarity of exposition is the impact it has had on mathematics," the prize citation states. "CLO, as it is fondly known, has not only introduced many to algebraic geometry, it has actually broadened how the subject could be taught and who could use it."

The Society noted that the three authors of the landmark book are top-flight mathematicians who teach at small liberal arts colleges: O'Shea taught at Mount Holyoke College for more than 30 years before becoming the president of New College in 2012, while Cox teaches at Amherst College and Little teaches at College



of the Holy Cross.

O'Shea has been recognized previously for his ability to turn complicated mathematical concepts into broadly understandable prose. In 2008, he received the Peano Prize, one of Europe's top awards for mathematical writing, for his book The Poincaré Conjecture: In Search of the Shape of the Universe (Walker & Company, 2006). The AMS Steele Prize will be awarded on January 7 at the Joint Mathematics Meetings in Seattle.

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educations news continued SCF earns a Military Friendly School designation

State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota (SCF) will award its first scholarships for veterans beginning with the Spring 2016 term thanks to funds donated by American Legion NO-VEL Post 159 in Venice, the Venice and Sarasota Kiwanis Clubs, Sarasota Military Officers Association, Northwestern Mutual Foundation, Giving Girls Giving Circle, VFW Post 2488 Ladies Auxiliary, SCF Foundation Board members Michael Fuller and Dorothy Korszen, and many other individuals.

The NO-VEL Post donated \$3,300 from the proceeds of its Veterans Golf Open last year to complete the SCF Foundation's available matching funds and bring the SCF Foundation Veterans' Endowed Scholarship Fund to \$50,000. An additional \$6,000 generated by the tournament will be used to establish the American Legion NO-VEL Post 159 Remedial Education Fund for veterans enrolled at SCF Venice.

These efforts recently earned SCF a Military Friendly School designation from Victoria Media, publisher of G.I. Jobs, for the sixth time. SCF's Veterans Centers offer assistance with admissions, course selection, financial aid and tutoring, while student clubs, including the SCF Bradenton and Venice chapters of the Student Veterans of America, provide support to veterans as they adjust to civilian life. There are nearly 370 veterans and their dependents enrolled at SCF.

The SCF Veterans Scholarship is available to students enrolled at any of the three SCF locations or online who received an honorable discharge from the United States Armed Forces, and have a minimum

USF Sarasota-Manatee Establishes College of Science & Mathematics



To better serve the higher education needs of the community, USF Sarasota-Manatee will establish a College of Science & Mathematics (CSM) as part of a realignment of its four colleges. In addition, the current College of Arts & Sciences and College of Education will merge to create a College of Liberal Arts & Social Sciences (CLASS). The College of Business (COB) and College of Hospitality & Tourism Leadership (CHTL) will remain unchanged.

"By aligning our programs in this new college structure, USF Sarasota-Manatee is in a better position to serve our growing student population while also positioning the campus to obtain new resources in the future," Regional Chancellor Dr. Sandra Stone said.

USFSM launched its Biology program in partnership with Mote Marine Laboratory in fall of 2014 which quickly became one of USF Sarasota-Manatee's fastest growing programs. "This realignment puts us in a better position for future growth of science and math programs which are programs of strategic emphasis and demand at the local, state and national levels," Dr. Stone said. The new College of Liberal Arts & Social Sciences will include three distinct areas: a School of Education, a Department of Liberal Arts and a Department of Social Sciences. By combining these three areas, USFSM has created a college that provides handson research and learning opportunities at the undergraduate and graduate levels while allowing for content area

preparation which is a foundation for higher education. In addition, the college will include programs that produce workforce-ready students.

As part of the realignment, no majors or programs will be added or eliminated. The alignment of the colleges will become effective for the fall 2016 semester and should have little impact on the day-to-day experience for current students.

USF Sarasota-Manatee's College of Business, accredited by AACSB International (The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business), will remain unchanged. The College of Hospitality & Tourism Leadership will continue to play an instrumental role in training the next generation of leaders for Florida's booming hospitality and tourism industry. USFSM will remain committed to preparing teachers for the community through the School of Education's arts-integrated programs. "We value our partnership with USF Sarasota-Manatee and their commitment to education," said Dr. Diana Greene, superintendent of schools for Manatee County. "We will continue to support them in the new alignment structure." To assist with the transition, the campus has formed a committee to handle the day-to-day changes and keep students, faculty and staff informed.
