<u>6 Things to Know about</u> Memorial Day

From its Civil War origins to modernday traditions, learn more about this solemn holiday.

- 1. The U.S. isn't the first country to establish the practice of honoring those who died in battle. Ancient Greeks and Romans held annual days of remembrance for loved ones (including soldiers) by holding public festivals and feasts in their honor.
- 2. In May 1868, Gen. John A. Logan, commander-in-chief of the Union veterans group the Grand Army of the Republic, issued a decree that May 30 should be a national day of remembrance for the more than 620,000 soldiers who died in the Civil War.
- 3. Memorial Day didn't become a federal holiday until 1971.
- 4. It wasn't until World War I that the focus of this holiday expanded to include remembering those killed in all wars.
- 5. The American flag should be hung at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day.
- 6. Since 2000, all Americans have been encouraged to pause for a National Moment of Silence at 3 p.m. local time.
