

Did you know that Christmas is not over? In the Lutheran Church we celebrate Christmas for twelve days, from December 25 through January 5, inclusive. These (not the days before Christmas) are the Twelve Days of Christmas. Here is what some believe is the symbolism in that well-loved carol:

"My true love" is God, the giver of all good things.

- 1. (Dec 25) The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus.
- 2. (Dec 26) The two turtledoves are the Old and New Testaments.
- 3. (Dec 27) The three French hens stand for faith, hope and love.
- 4. (Dec 28) The four calling birds are the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, John).
- 5. (Dec 29) The five gold rings recall the Hebrew Torah (Law), the first five books of the Old Testament.
- 6. (Dec 30) The six geese a-laying stand for the six days of creation.
- 7. (Dec 31) The seven swans a-swimming represent the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit (wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord).
- 8. (Jan 1) The eight maids a-milking are the eight Beatitudes (see Matthew 5:3-10).
- 9. (Jan 2) The nine ladies dancing are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control).
- 10. (Jan 3) The ten lords a-leaping are the Ten Commandments.
- 11. (Jan 4) The eleven pipers piping represent the eleven faithful disciples.
- 12. (Jan 5) Twelve drummers drumming symbolize the twelve phrases in the Apostles Creed.

Perhaps this Christmas season, you could reflect on each of these things on its appropriate day.

## Posture at Worship

Why does Lutheran worship have so much "getting-up-and-down" in it?

Compared with many denominations, Lutherans do seem to engage in a great deal of "liturgical calisthenics". Our liturgies are filled with action and movement because common gestures in our worship are a way to let the *whole person* pray, as well as a way of expressing the unity in prayer of the *whole people of God* - the Church. We use gestures and movements because of a deep respect within the Lutheran Church for the Incarnation (God in human flesh and blood) - theology comes off the page and becomes a matter of the heart and body.

It is not, of course, a matter of just any gestures performed in just any way. Certain actions convey special meanings for Christians. Some of these include:

SITTING: Sitting is the easiest posture to explain in worship, perhaps because we do so little of it. We sit to listen (at the first and second readings and the sermon) and to watch and wait (during the distribution of Holy Communion).

STANDING: We rise to greet the clergy as they enter the Church, to express our joy (Song of Praise, Offertory, Prayer after Communion), to honor Christ (Gospel Acclamation and Gospel), to voice our beliefs (Creed), and to welcome the Christ who is in our midst (Great Thanksgiving).

KNEELING: We kneel to express sorrow and humility (Confession) and to show adoration of God (receiving Holy Communion).

BOWING: Bowing is an action of reverence. We bow our heads in prayer to show respect for God and toward the altar and the cross because they represent Christ's presence among us.

These, along with making the sign of the cross (to remember our baptism), sharing the Peace, processing and recessing, and many other gestures, are ways of expressing our faith, showing deep adoration and heartfelt praise, and being people who can fully pray.

#### Forgetting What Is Behind

orget about it." It's a phrase we may say to ourselves when we don't want to face up to something. Perhaps we give it in the form of advice to someone who's complaining about an offense he's received. According to Paul, it's a good thing to do. It's counsel he followed himself: "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13b-14).

Paul had a past anyone would want to forget. In his Pharisaical zeal, he had caused the imprisonment, persecution, and even death of many who were followers of the Way. All that changed, we know, when he himself faced Jesus on the road to Damascus.

Yet, from our reading of Scripture, we know he didn't "forget what was behind." He brought it up many times as he explained the change that Jesus had brought about in his life to the other apostles and as he testified in the highest courts of the day.



Like Paul, we can't forget about our past sins ... and maybe that's good, as long as we remember that Christ has forgotten them! Remembrance of our sins serves the purpose of keeping us humble and grateful, aware that we walk in God's ways only as we rely on him to lead us, thankful that he forgives all sin, past, present, and future. Then we are not encumbered by guilt (1 John 3:20). We can "[forget] what's behind" and "press on toward the goal" that Christ has lain out before us as we serve him with all the gifts he so graciously gives us.

We begin a new year in God's grace. We also begin each day, sometimes each moment, as newly forgiven, cleansed stewards equipped through Word and Sacrament to fulfill God's purposes for our lives.



Our own growth and the growth of our church depend on the willingness of us all to invest that talent for others. As a member of your church, you are called to share in all aspects of its life. Membership is responsibility - the response to the call to ministry, and service. To be a church member is to answer that call with time and talent.

### **Manage Credit Cards Wisely**

The Bible warns us that debt should be taken seriously and avoided when possible. In Proverbs 22:7 we read, "The borrower is servant to the lender." As servants, we become obligated. Debt enslaves, and, through debt, we lose our freedom. Debt can impede our serving and giving. If we are in debt, we may not be able to do what God wants us to do with our money because we already owe it to others. If debt is out of control, our livelihood and homes can be in jeopardy.




Credit cards are the simplest type of debt to obtain, but are also the most expensive if the balance is not paid at the end of the month. In more than half of the states, there is no limit on the interest rate that can be charged for carrying a balance.


The cost of not paying your balance in full can add up very quickly. For example, if you have a credit card balance of \$4,000 and plan to pay it off over 36 months, the costs are as follows:

Interest Rate	Time to Pay Debt	Interest Expense		
9.9 %	36 months	\$ 610		
15.9 %	36 months	980		
19.9 %	36 months	1.227		

At a rate of 19.9 percent interest, a person would have to pay an additional 30 percent for what had been purchased. Moreover, as new items are purchased with a credit card, it is that much more difficult to make the payments!

The phrase, "We are in the world, but not of the world," aptly describes us as Christians on how we should be viewing and using debt. We should only be comfortable purchasing what can

## **Mpiandry: The Healing Shepherds**

n Luke 15:1-7 Jesus tells a parable about the shepherd who rejoiced when the lost sheep was found. In Madagascar, there is a special kind of shepherd, the "mpiandry" (pee-AHN-dree). The mpiandry are church workers who care for orphans, the sick, and the poor who are some of Jesus' "lost sheep." The mpiandry also lead worship services in which they lay their hands on the heads of worshipers and bless them in Jesus' name. They pray that God will solve the people's problems and worries.

Talk about the mpiandry and consider ways that each of us can be shepherds. Read aloud the Bible reference. It may be fun for the family to act out the story. Preschoolers could follow a set of hoof prints to a "pen" (circle of chairs) and play the roles of sheep and shepherd. Older children can pretend what it would be like to be lost and share their feelings. Teens can consider the shepherd's role. What leadership qualities would a shepherd need? Adults can ponder how they as parents fill the role of a shepherd.

Make a flannel board for children to use when they retell the parable of the lost sheep. Older children can help younger ones draw and cut from construction paper these things: a shepherd, neighbors, several sheep, and a fence. Glue felt strips on the back of each piece to use on a flannel board. Glue a felt square to the lid of a clean large-sized cardboard pizza delivery box to make the flannel board. Store the figures inside the box.

Wrap wooden models of sheep (obtain at craft stores) in fuzzy yarn. Display them throughout your home as reminders of how God loves and cares for us like a shepherd cares for sheep. Play "Find the Lost Sheep." Have one family member hide (the game may be played indoors or out) while the others hunt for the lost sheep. When the sheep has been found, everyone cheers.

Enjoy a Malagasy meal. In Madagascar, rice is a staple of the diet. "Laoka" (LAU-ka) is meat and vegetable toppings spooned over rice. Make chicken topping by browning 1 cup thinly sliced chicken in 1/4 cup of oil. Stir in 1/4 cup each of chopped onions and tomatoes, 1/2 teaspoon minced ginger root, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer until tender, adding water if necessary.

Before the meal, lay hands on top of each other's heads and say, "God bless you." Close by asking for God's help in becoming good shepherds who care for others.
