I just returned from a camping trip at Cape Henlopen State Park. A quick drive from my house, Cape Henlopen provides many activities to get outside. I camped for a week and ran a POTA station every day making over 600 contracts. POTA is a great way to continually test your portable kit to make sure all is operating correctly. Using equipment over and over again allows you to assemble your station and get on the air quickly and repeatably. Although there is a cell tower just a brief walk from the campground, I also wanted to test out a new addition to my gear. A Starlink Mini satellite system. This system is selfcontained in a single package (antenna, power connection, router and network connection) and is slightly larger than a sheet of paper. Starlink quickly became a life saver for many in North Carolina. Many reports came in mentioning Starlink was the only access to the outside of devasted areas. Deployment of the unit was fast and easy and it can run off of a simple USB-C power bank which makes the unit very portable and can simply be placed on the ground or a pole. These online Zoom based classes offer training on the WinLink Global Email over Radio System. The topics vary so there is no set agenda. The group assists newbies and experienced users alike with any issue. Past topics have been connection type (sessions), creating an email and addressing, Peer to Peer (P2P), etc. The Zoom starts early at 7pm to assist operators to get bugs worked out of the systems. The main course starts just after

The next training is scheduled for Tuesday, November 19, 2024 at 7pm. ARRL Service Disruption Update – DXCC Resumes Operations DXCC is now back online and fully functional. The application will still need to be completed via the online portal with accuracy being key. After completing your application, you may bring your cards and forms to a local DXCC Card checker or send in the paperwork and cards to the ARRL DXCC Desk. Join the National Traffic System (NTS) - Traffic and Message Handling & The Radiogram Portal (open to the public) The ARRL got its start by organizing message delivery to get messages delivered efficiently and accurately to their destinations via different radio stations. This tradition continues today using CW, voice and digital. Why practice traffic handling? It teaches good operating skills, gives you valuable skills in passing health and welfare messages in times of emergency, learn how to operate under adverse conditions without power and create friendship and camaraderie. Any license class can handle traffic, even with a basic handheld radio. With the NTS2.0 update came the Radiogram Portal. This web-based portal allows for anyone to send a Radiogram via Amateur Radio. This is a great way to introduce the public at your next public service event to amateur radio. Have them send a message to a family member wishing them a Happy Birthday. I used it a couple

HAPPY NEW YEAR!

And we are off and running with the continuing "change and challenge" that I commented on last month. We were quite busy in the past year with just under 4,000 volunteer hours contributed to the county by the combined AUXCOMM and CERT programs. How long they will continue to stay under one administrative section remains to be decided somewhere down the road. The problem is, managing that many volunteers and their hours, takes other volunteers in administrative positions, and we don't have enough people to split things up, yet. And, from what I'm already seeing, and it ain't even January yet as I write this, we're probably going to comfortably break the 4,000 hour mark this year.

We will be going into the New Year with a commitment to have back-up personnel for all of our named positions on the Management Team, be they deputies or assistants, for both AUXCOMM and CERT. The EOC is promoting the ICS tenet of "continuity of operation", covering both support systems, i.e. redundancy; and personnel, someone to step in and carry on. It's a great opportunity for some of our newer members to get the experience they need to eventually move up the chain of command. Some of us in the upper levels are reaching a point in our lives where slowing down is looking very

attractive, and that will leave positions to fill. After the first Management Team meeting, January 2nd, we will be able to put out a tentative calendar, so you can 'save the dates' where we have events scheduled. Speaking of which, we may have a third Marathon to cover. Getting out there and supporting the county's effort is critical for us. They are supporting us, we need to support the coverage of events where we're assigned. Also, as we do more things, hopefully, we will attract more operators interested in public service. Not only will we be doing, and also looking for publicity about what we do, the "whats and the whys". We've got a program going that is attracting favorable attention from other areas in the state, and that's a good thing. Getting it out there for the public to see will be the next step in promoting both programs.

Training will be accented this coming year. The regular monthly meeting will now have a training session, each month, based on one of the entries from the Task Book. There will also be four quarterly exercises this year with different scenarios and problems for the participants to solve. Where appropriate AUXCOMM and CERT will be working together in events, exercises and other public service opportunities. Task Book entry's getting signed off at our meetings is a sign that people are beginning to take this process seriously.

In mid-January the Department of Public Safety, all three divisions, will be working on developing a new County Emergency Operations Plan. AUXCOMM and CERT fall under the Emergency Management Division and will be written into the county plan for the first time. A few members of the Management Team will have a role in the development of the plan. That kind of recognition comes as a result of our efforts over the past couple of years, and the fact that we've been there, supporting the EOC since it opened the new building in 2008. This past year, we went through another "new building" cycle; and we are still there, still serving, and still growing! Let's make2025 a record breaking year with success in what we do. Later.
