Reflection Easter Week 5 Friday Acts 15:22-31 & John 15:12-17

We hear Jesus speak about Christians' true love of one another in the gospel. I think we see that genuine concern for other people and the accommodation of them as best as we can in the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles. We see it mostly in Paul and Barnabas who waste no time going straight to Jerusalem to settle a matter that upset the consciences of recent converts they had shepherded into the local Church. Surprisingly, we also see it from Jerusalem headquarters as they send return delegates back down to Antioch to help smooth over feathers. How often do you see a bureaucracy admit responsibility and take sacrificial action to make amends for its insensitivity? Well, we see it in today's reading from Acts. What had basically happened was that Paul and Barnabas had welcomed some converts into the Christian community, baptizing them and teaching them the social moral code of caring for neighbors and serving God. Then some bossy preachers showed up from Jerusalem demanding circumcision as a sign of one's salvation. This was news to the converts and they are deeply troubled about whether they are saved or not, since they are not circumcised. When Paul and Barnabas confer with the 'pillars' in Jerusalem, a resolution and remedy to the difference is worked out. Jerusalem sends delegates down to comfort the converts and to encourage their continued Christian formation and practice. Acts 15:24 tells about their peacemaking apology from the conciliatory letter saying, "we have heard that some of our number who went out without any mandate from us have upset you with their teachings and disturbed your peace of mind". Interestingly though, they slip in an excuse about the troublemakers bullying the new converts 'without a mandate from us' (as if they were rogue preachers). I also like how the letter from headquarters acts like a crafty politician eager to get a photo taken with a 'local hero' to gain better acceptance among the home crowd. They say in Acts 15:25 'we send representatives to you along with our beloved Barnabas and Paul'. Slipping in that 'our beloved' part! But I commend headquarters for actually sending down Judas and Silas as personal

representatives to meet in person and make amends for the divisive & 'troubling teaching'. And apparently Judas and Silas don't just show up and run, but they stay a while and continue to preach and encourage the Church in Antioch. Like good pastors, Judas and Silas stay a while in the community to listen, pray with and simply be among the church. Paul is so good like that too, as he always demonstrates the great Shepherding style he received from Christ Himself. What I mean is that Paul has the good habit of staying in touch with churches he has served, either by return pastoral visits for or faithfully sending letters that deal with real time issues affecting the people. All of them are great but especially his shorter letters to the Philippians and Galatians are wonderful examples of his pastoring heart.

And we see where he learned such love in the gospel today. Jesus tells us that true friendship means genuine and sacrificial love of others. He says, "Love one another as I love you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friend" (John 15:12-13) We are given many opportunities to demonstrate such love in these uncertain and anxious times of ours now. People often tell me that they are not sure how to react when they go in public now, and that they feel all the time like they may be doing something wrong, afraid that they are not the exact prescribed feet apart or they've accidentally let a mask slip a little on their cheek or feel bad that they can't hold the door for someone. I think we do our best for everybody when we simply try to put ourselves in the shoes of the other person and consider how they may wish to be treated. Of course, a smile and greeting surely helps too! But we can offer our love to others by simply being patient and slowing down in any of our interactions with them, giving a chance to listen to them or just offer our help safely in any way for them. We want to be safe, but also we are concerned to serve, because Jesus teaches us that we are created to show His love for each other!

Prayer for the Day:

Dear Lord, We pray for our communities -neighbors of all ages, backgrounds, education, occupations, politics and religious viewpoints. May we look at others as if through your eyes, Jesus, be less judging, and more loving. May we see them, like ourselves, as not perfect or finished but as works in progress that will be completed in due time by your hands. We pray for all of them; not only those we know by name and chat with through the day, but also the less familiar faces about whom we know so little and pass by with just a smile. Bless their homes and families, and let your love and peace shine within this community that smiles may turn into conversations, and strangers become friends. We pray this through Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. Amen

Say a little prayer, even as simple as 'Lord bless him/her who just said 'hi' to me, and bless their home & family' for everyone you encounter today.
