

## TOWN BOARD MEETING – 12/10/13

Supervisor Edna Frasier and Board members Marty Fitzgerald, Steve Ramant and Rudy Meola were present. Alvin Frasier was absent.

A moment of silence was held for Carla Bailey, Nancy DeLarm Fogwell and Donna Aloï.

The Supervisor thanked everyone for their Holiday in Hague efforts. Al Rider handed the Board an update on the Water Quality Committee citing the lawn sign program in particular. Art Steitz requested that the Town trucks slow down because a huge amount of slush was thrown on his house when they went by recently. Chris Navitsky, Waterkeeper, donated a book to the Town on promoting low impact development for Lake George.

In consideration of the minutes from the November Board meeting, Councilman Meola made three comments. He noted that committee reports should be in writing and asked if this will be done in the future. Councilman Fitzgerald and Supervisor Frasier said they felt that would take too much time but they would discuss it at the organizational meeting in January.

Councilman Meola then suggested that a cemetery committee be appointed as had been mentioned in November and Supervisor Frasier said she needed more time.

Councilman Meola further noted that the proper procedure before going into executive session is to list the item in the agenda which was not done last month. His objection was ignored by the Supervisor and Councilman Ramant interjected that it was “nitpicking.”

Councilman Meola reported that the Town Justice collected in fines \$12,181 which was sent to NYS and \$5,990 was returned to the Town from January through October 2013.

Councilman Fitzgerald reported that there have been a number of breakdowns in the highway vehicles which will put them over budget drastically.

ZEO Cathy Clark noted that it would be good for the Supervisor to get the letter about Shared Services at Roger Rock to the DEC before they consider the new LGPC regulations. She stated it was not reasonable for local boat owners to have to pay entrance fees at Rogers Rock if the Hague launch was closed. Through a Shared Services agreement, the State launch could be used by Hague residents on off hours. Councilman Ramant noted agreement especially since Putnam and Ticonderoga residents can use the Mossy Point boat launch for free.

Councilman Ramant reported that they will bring back the successful music programs for the Park in 2014. An order has been placed for new playground equipment and a lifeguard chair (the latter with funds from the Kiwanis).

Councilman Ramant also reported a cell tower was being put up by Verizon on the Gull Bay road and the Verizon hard-line has improved service on New Hague Road. He also reported on moves for speed signs.

Those interested in working next summer at the Town Park (lot attendants/stewards/visitor center) and Beach (lifeguards) can send in an application for these positions.

Al Rider took pictures of the children with Santa and Mrs. Claus during Holiday in Hague. Anyone that did not get their pictures can pick them up from Bertha Dunsmore at the Hague Community Center.

Supervisor Frasier reported that Paul Belden keeps the Board well informed about his work and has a new maintenance tracking program.

The award for the bid on Sifted Sand, Bank Run and Item 4 that had been discussed last month went to Pat Armstrong. Although not the lowest bid in all categories it was felt that operation was closer and easier for the highway department to use.

The Board approved a proposal from AC Electric for \$1,760 for installation of lighting at the Community Center.

The Board also approved a contractual agreement for medical testing for Town employees and a vaccination and immunization agreement for Sewer employees.

The date for the 2014 fireworks will be on the Friday of the Hague Arts Fair weekend which will be August 1, 2014.

Councilman Meola asked about the Supervisor’s county report. She responded that although she does not give an oral report each month, she puts out a newsletter every two months.

## ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS – 11/21/13

Chairman Robert Goetsch, Jon Hanna, Lindsay Mydlarz, Linda Murry, Ray Snyder, Chris Navitsky and Maureen Cherubini were all present.

### STARKER (12.18-1-23) 8 Fowler Lane (TRI)

The applicants would like to install a series of retaining walls, install a patio off the basement, and construct a fire pit area. A series of steps and pathways are also proposed. The Board approved the north retaining wall and two other walls are to be located outside of the 50 foot setback. Other parts of the application were tabled for next month.

## PLANNING BOARD – 12/5/13

Vice-Chairman Bruce Clark and members Bob Whitaker, Martin Fitzgerald, Mike Cherubini, Pam Peterson and Judy Gourley were present. Chairman Dick Frasier was absent.

### SILVER BAY YMCA (93.16-1-19) 87 Sabbath Day Pt. Rd. (TRI)

The application is for a 2 lot subdivision of a .53 acre vacant parcel on the Lake. If approved the parcel will be sold to adjacent land-owners who each intend to merge approximately half the property (.265 of an acre) to their abutting lots. The Board will hold a public hearing next month.

LUKE VENTURES, LLC (Made in Hague) (43.5-1-26) 9077 Lakeshore Drive (Hamlet)

All conditions have been met on the initial approval and the Board gave final approval subject to the parking being monitored.

### **PARTIAL PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS**

David Martucci, Sole Assessor, urges all primary residence homeowners to contact the office (543-6161) to see if they are eligible for the following exemptions:

Senior Citizens' exemption: primary residence homeowners over age 65 with the following household income ceilings for the listed taxing jurisdictions:

- County \$32,399 ( Includes sliding scale )
- Town \$23,700 ( Includes sliding scale )
- School \$30,399 ( Includes sliding scale )

This exemption must be renewed each year. Renewal forms will be sent in late December to those who had this exemption last year.

Enhanced STAR exemption: primary residence homeowners over age 65 with household income less than \$81,900. This exemption must be renewed each year unless an Optional Verification form is submitted. Renewal forms will be sent in late December to those who had this exemption last year.

Basic STAR exemption: all primary residence homeowners with annual income below \$ 500,000. This exemption does not have to be renewed each year, however in 2013 a one-time re-registration program was initiated.

Veterans' exemption: primary residence homeowners with military service during wartime periods. This exemption does not have to be renewed each year.

Details and applications are available Mondays and Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The filing deadline is March 1, 2014.

### **MANDATORY BOAT INSPECTIONS**

The Lake George Park Commission (LGPC) is one step closer to resolving the issue of how to prevent more invasive species from entering Lake George while also not unduly inconveniencing boaters. Although the State of New York has reversed its original position and now agrees with the principle of mandatory boat inspections at the launch sites on Lake George, it is hesitant to keep boaters from launching after hours, when no inspectors would be at the launch sites.

The State's proposal was to have state-paid inspectors at the five major public launches around the lake from dawn to dusk – leaving them unattended throughout the night – during the 2014 boating season. The inspectors would check every trailered boat before being launched to determine if it meets the "Clean, Drained and Dry" standard. Any boat not passing inspection would be washed at a special decontamination station, all free of charge to boaters. The program would cost \$700,000 annually. Half of this cost is expected to come from the State

and the other half would be contributed by S.A.V.E., a partnership that includes area town, village and county officials plus conservation groups and researchers.

It all sounds ideal. But here's the conundrum. What happens when someone wants to launch their boat at 4 am for some early morning fishing but there is no inspector at the launch? Should the launches be locked down when no inspector is present? The State was intent on enabling 24 x 7 access, whether an inspector was there or not. But many saw this as a huge loophole that would severely damage the effectiveness of the program. And, because the \$350,000 contribution to the program from S.A.V.E. is entirely contingent on the closing of this loophole, funding would be a problem if the loophole wasn't closed.

On December 3, the LGPC and the state drew praise from S.A.V.E. when the draft regulations for the mandatory inspection program were approved and the draft Final Environmental Impact Statement was modified to provide for closing the "after-hours loophole," referencing up to 24 hour staffing. How will this be accomplished? S.A.V.E has pledged to contribute an additional \$50,000 to the program in 2014 to pay for 'night monitors' at the two State launches – Mossy Point and Rogers Rock – during the hours when no inspectors are present. The monitors will not inspect boats. However, if a boat has been previously inspected and is clipped to the trailer – indicating that it has not been on any other body of water since that inspection – the monitor can allow the boat to launch. Monitors will also collect information on the launch demand during off hours and be available to answer questions.

This proposed solution ensures that no uninspected trailered boats can be launched, while also allowing boaters with inspected boats to use the launch during off hours. In addition, the monitors would be authorized to 'seal' boats coming out of the lake by clipping them to their trailer. This would enable them to relaunch in Lake George without the need for inspection. "We now have the working elements for a mandatory inspection program that builds upon the work of our Lake Stewards and provides for lasting success," said Walt Lender, Executive Director of the Lake George Association, a member of the S.A.V.E. partnership. And Eric Siy, Executive Director of The FUND for Lake George, also a S.A.V.E. partner, noted that the new program could serve as a model for other water bodies. "Winning the war on aquatic invasives will take unprecedented cooperation and commitment across sectors and levels of government," he said. "There is no time to lose."

### **FORT TICONDEROGA EVENTS**

This event "Amazing Things! Highlights from Fort Ticonderoga's Collections" is from the "Fort Fever Series" and the cost is \$10 per person collected at the door. The Salvation Army's red kettle at the holidays is a symbol of an organization that had its beginnings in England and its first meeting in America in Philadelphia in 1879. Its activities in France during World War I, while the eyes of the nation were focused on the War, represented one of its finest hours and brought recognition and respect to the mission of the Salvation Army.


The Army sent some of its officers to France in 1917 to reconnoiter the conditions and the needs of our doughboys. Their leader, Colonel William S. Barker, cabled back to America to send "lassies."

The first team of Salvationists arrived in France in August and by September 1st work began on their "hutment", a 40 x 150 feet building with ten windows on each side. The hut was staffed with 5 men and six lassies who gave concerts and musical services as well as running the canteen.

By the end of the war there were 400 such huts, many near the front lines, and all offering respite from the horrors of war in a homelike atmosphere staffed by the "lassies".

Imagine these women in the trenches serving the young soldiers as well as their God – all this even before women had won the right to vote in the United States in 1920! They brought a softer woman's touch to these boys so far from home – delivering coffee and baked goods, helping them to write letters home, mending the boys' clothes and offering a sympathetic ear.

The Salvation Army also provided a service that enabled the young men to send money home to their loved ones. The funds were forwarded to Salvation Army offices in the States and were then delivered to the soldiers' families and friends. Often the families were found to have even greater needs that were addressed and alleviated by the Army officers.



The donuts were a great hit for the Salvationist volunteers. In fact, with conditions for baking being difficult in the huts, two of the young volunteers came up with the bright idea of frying the donuts in soldier's helmets. They could fry seven donuts per batch! A New York Times correspondent with the American forces in France wrote: "When I landed in France I didn't think so much of the Salvation Army; after two weeks with the Americans at the front I take my hat off to the Salvation Army, and when the memoirs of this war come to be written the doughnuts and apple pies of the Salvation Army are going to take their place in history." The war ended in 1918 and the Salvation Army volunteers stayed on in Europe to continue their mission of providing comfort to American troops overseas.



I ran across an article in a *Lake George Mirror* from the early 2000's about an artist, Robert Selkowitz, whose work was being exhibited in Glens Falls and at the Adirondack Mountain Club. The works to be exhibited resulted from a stay at a friend's home in Silver Bay. He paints in pastels and oils and when "googled", it would seem that the painting above was surely of Lake George. **DIED:** Donna J. Aloï, 68, of Peru and Hague on November 14, 2013. She was the daughter of the late Jack and Doris Bolton of Hague.

Donna graduated from Corinth High School and from SUNY Plattsburgh. She was a retired elementary education teacher from Peru Central School.

Survivors include her two children, Traci Aloï and her husband Chip Dickerson of Clifton Park, Mark Aloï and his wife Courtney of Keeseville; their father, James Aloï; her brother Donald Bolton and his wife Penny and four grandchildren.

**DIED:** Nancy DeLarm Fogwell, 83, died on November 25, 2013, from Alzheimer's disease.

Nancy graduated from Springfield High School in Springfield, VT and attended Colby Junior College in New London, NH. After spending a summer on Lake George waitressing at Island Harbor Hotel in Hague, she met and married William Keith DeLarm in 1948. Together they raised their family of four children and operated DeLarm's Dairy and then Wintergreen Lake Campsite until his death in 1979. Nancy remarried in 1984 to Richard E. Fogwell who died in 1995. They lived in Hobe Sound, FL and Hague.

Nancy is survived by her four children and their spouses, Susan DeLarm-Sandman of Andover, MA, Sally DeLarm Rypkema and Sheri DeLarm Ginn, both of Hague, and David Keith DeLarm of St. Augustine, FL; eight grandchildren; and a stepson, Richard Fogwell of Stamford, Conn.

A private burial was held and a gathering of friends and family to remember and celebrate her life is planned for early summer.

**DIED:** The Reverend Dr. Robert B. Marr, 95, on November 28, 2013. He was a summer resident of Hague for the past 41 years and had resided most recently at Lake Prince Woods retirement center in Suffolk, VA.

Bob Marr first came to Hague in 1938 as the tennis pro at Silver Bay YMCA. He worked as the hike leader at Silver Bay in the summer of 1942 when he met his future wife, Barbara Putnam, who was working as a waitress at Silver Bay. Their first date was at the "Cave" in Hague.

Rev. Marr was a graduate of Springfield College and Andover Newton Theological School. During his long career, he served several churches affiliated with the United Church of Christ as well as a guest minister at nondenominational services during the summer at Silver Bay, Huletts Landing, and Grace Memorial Chapel at Sabbath Day Point, where he also served on the Board of Trustees.

Rev. Marr is survived by his wife of 69 years and five children: Wayne Marr of Damascus, MD; Lauren Marr of Galway, NY; Diane Marr Asiel of New York City and Hague; Bruce Marr of Chicago, IL; and Sarah Marr of Colorado Springs, CO as well as several grandchildren and great grandchildren.


