


A Gentle Reminder

While I was working on my master's degree in Christian Education, I often heard that youth and children's ministers should "avoid the one-eared Mickey Mouse!" This strange sounding catch phrase was seemingly everywhere and it described a phenomenon found in many churches where the youth ministry exists outside of the life of the church—depicted graphically like this:



The unfortunate result of this kind of youth and children's ministry is that children do not make the connection that they are part of the church. Because of this, when they graduate from youth ministry they move away from the church and on to other things.

The preferable model of youth and children's ministry is the "doughnut." This is where the adults in the church surround youth and children's ministry. Children and teenagers know that they are a vital part of the parish and when they return from college, they know that the church is their home. Children and youth

A couple of weeks ago I heard about the one-eared Mickey Mouse and the doughnut again—just not in those terms. My husband and I attended a seminar at the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia given by some leaders in the Christian Education field. The speakers emphasized the importance of *intergenerational* ministry—ministry where children and youth are working with adults in the church. Studies have shown that whether children continue in the faith depends not on a spectacular Sunday school or a "really cool" youth ministry, but on *the number of conversations young people have with significant adults about their faith*. Parents are the most significant in children's lives but, as the African proverb says, "it takes a village to raise a child." A child surrounded by adults who are teaching and guiding her, praying for him, and loving her is a child who has been "raised up in the way he should go—and will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6, KJV) Over and over again the scriptures say that we should tell our children our salvation story (Exodus 13:8 and Deuteronomy 6:6-8 are just a couple of examples).

I have been delighted by the "doughnut" I see here at Augustus. We have committed and gifted teachers and youth leaders, prayer pals who are praying for our children through Lent, parents who make sure their children are in Sunday school and at confirmation classes, and a vestry, pastor and staff that puts children and youth ministry high on the church's priority list. Keep up the good work!

Whom Are You Looking At?

The disciples were thrilled. They had their Lord back in their presence once again. Since his Resurrection, he had appeared to them and others several times. They were still a little confused, though, when he talked about "*waiting for the gift his Father promised*" (Acts 1:5), and, then, "*He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight*" (Acts 1:9).

You can imagine their bewilderment. He had died and been buried and then had risen from the dead! He had walked among them and taught them again, and now . . . He is taken up into the clouds. No wonder they stood there – probably with mouths agape – looking into the sky where they had last seen him.

It took "two men dressed in white" (Acts 1:10) to bring them back to their senses. " 'Men of Galilee,' " they said, 'why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into Heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into Heaven'" (Acts 1:11).

Back they went to Jerusalem. Their eyes were no longer on the clouds, but they were still looking at Jesus. They waited. They prayed. They chose another disciple. And they waited some more – all the while looking at Jesus.

Whom are you looking at? Yes, Jesus has ascended. We can only imagine his



joyful, triumphant return as all the hosts of Heaven welcomed back the risen, victorious Savior. Because he is that Savior, because he is the Author and perfecter of our faith, "*let us fix our eyes on Jesus*" (Hebrews 12:2). Through his Word and Sacraments, he will lead us in his ways; he will teach us obedience and self-sacrifice; he will teach us love for our neighbors. With joyful and generous hearts, we celebrate the new life that Easter brings us by sharing the message of the Cross and the Empty Tomb with all who will listen. Keep looking at Jesus until in Heaven you see him face to face!



Stewardship is not about large giving, but gifts in small ways. A child's gift, although small, gives glory to the Lord in many ways. Stewardship does not have to be in monetary ways. A gift of time to an elderly shut-in serves the Lord, too, A gift of a loaf of bread to a homeless family could mean the difference between going to bed hungry or going to bed satisfied.

The Paschal Candle

What is the meaning and use of the Paschal Candle?



The Paschal Candle is a tall, prominent candle, visually representing Jesus' resurrection. The Paschal Candle may be adorned in different ways, although a cross, the letters Alpha and Omega, the current year, and five wax "Incense nails" representing the five wounds of Christ are often affixed to the candle. Because the Paschal Candle is a symbol of Jesus' resurrection, it is lighted only during the liturgies of the Easter season, from the Easter Vigil through the Day of Pentecost.

After the last liturgy on The Day of Pentecost, the Paschal Candle is placed near the baptismal font as a visual reminder that through baptism we are "join[ed] ... to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ". When Baptism is celebrated, the Paschal Candle is lighted. It is also lighted for funeral liturgies, the Paschal Candle being placed at the foot of the coffin. Here the tie to Jesus' death and resurrection is especially important.

The current use of the Paschal Candle is the outgrowth of a long and respected tradition in the Church, originating in ancient times. Candles were blessed when lighted in the early Church's worship. In the fifth or sixth century, the Paschal Candle became established as a symbol of Jesus' resurrection. In the Middle Ages, Paschal Candles were quite large, some weighing as much as 300 pounds, although most weighed only 10 to 20 pounds. Today, Paschal Candles are usually two (2) inches in diameter and at least 36 inches long. Though far smaller than Paschal Candles in the Middle Ages, they are the largest candles used in parishes today.



Personal Financial Stewardship

Loving Money

God's Word warns us about the love of money: "People who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs" (1 Timothy 6:9-10). Jesus said, "You cannot serve both God and money" (Matthew 6:24).

How much we love money is not dependent upon the amount of money that we may have. We can love money and have very little love of it, or we can have lots of it and not love it at all. Loving money is very subtle, and it can manifest itself in different ways. For example for those who have accumulated some money, it could be seen in an unhealthy obsession with the



investment markets. It could be seen in our desire to hoard our money and not give. Power and success for those who focus on money is relative to how much money they have.

Because we live in a very materialistic society, there is a great deal of interest in money. Webster's Dictionary defines materialism as "the tendency to be more concerned with material things than with spiritual goals or values." Materialism leads us to spend money we don't have in order to buy things we don't need so that we can impress people we don't even like. A materialistic person loves his possessions, is greedy, and lacks contentment.

The following are three negative consequences of both loving money and becoming part of our materialistic society:

- Distorts our thinking: Our hearts become darkened. "For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking become futile and their foolish hearts were darkened" (Romans 1:22-23).
- Stimulates our pride: We become self-sufficient rather than relying on God. "You may say to yourself, 'My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me' " (Deuteronomy 8:17).
- Preoccupies our thoughts: We have no time or concern for the needy or for God. "Their destiny is destruction, their god is their stomach, and their glory is in their shame. Their mind is on earthly things" (Philippians 3:19).

When we call upon God's strength, he will empower us to serve him rather than our money. As we spend time hearing and reading God's Word, he will strengthen our faith so we can break the power that money and possessions can have over us.


ADDITIONAL WAYS TO HELP WITH THE TURKEY DINNER:



Two Pieces of Wood That Spell 'Love'

Imagine someone loving you so much that he or she would give up absolutely everything—even life itself just to let you know how much you're loved! Sometimes people in our own families or special friends show us glimpses of that kind of love, but to love someone like that all the time is impossible for human beings. Only God can do that, and that's exactly what God did by sending Jesus.

Because Jesus died for us, life is different. For one thing, there are things we don't need to be so afraid of like being alone. Jesus loves us and comes with us in our hearts wherever we go. He died on the cross to show that to us, and that's why there are crosses in churches now. Crosses remind us that Jesus' love is so big that nothing can stop it or change it. What kind of crosses are there in your church? Sometimes at the beginning of worship, a person walks in carrying a cross attached to a long pole. That cross is called a processional cross. Others often follow that cross. It's like a little parade.

At home, make a cross from some tree branches—perhaps some from your Christmas tree if it's available. Hang the cross inside your front door to help you remember that Jesus loves you and is with you wherever you go. Then make one for someone in the hospital or nursing home, to let that person know the good news of Jesus' love!

Mpiandry: The Healing Shepherds

In Luke 15:1-7 Jesus tells a parable about the shepherd who rejoiced when the lost sheep was found. In Madagascar, there is a special kind of shepherd, the "mpiandry" (pee-AHN-dree). The mpiandry are church workers who care for orphans, the sick, and the poor who are some of Jesus' "lost sheep." The mpiandry also lead worship services in which they lay their hands on the heads of worshipers and bless them in Jesus' name. They pray that God will solve the people's problems and worries.

Talk about the mpiandry and consider ways that each of us can be shepherds. Read aloud the Bible reference. It may be fun for the family to act out the story. Preschoolers could follow a set of hoof prints to a "pen" (circle of chairs) and play the roles of sheep and shepherd. Older children can pretend what it would be like to be lost and share their feelings. Teens can consider the shepherd's role. What leadership qualities would a shepherd need? Adults can ponder how they as parents fill the role of a shepherd.

Make a flannel board for children to use when they retell the parable of the lost sheep. Older children can help younger ones draw and cut from construction paper these things: a shepherd, neighbors, several sheep, and a fence. Glue felt strips on the back of each piece to use on a flannel board. Glue a felt square to the lid of a clean large-sized cardboard pizza delivery box to make the flannel board. Store the figures inside the box.

Wrap wooden models of sheep (obtain at craft stores) in fuzzy yarn. Display them throughout your home as reminders of how God loves and cares for us like a shepherd cares for sheep. Play "Find the Lost Sheep." Have one family member hide (the game may be played indoors or out) while the others hunt for the lost sheep. When the sheep has been found, everyone cheers.

Enjoy a Malagasy meal. In Madagascar, rice is a staple of the diet. "Laoka" (LAU-ka) is meat and vegetable toppings spooned over rice. Make chicken topping by browning 1 cup thinly sliced chicken in 1/4 cup of oil. Stir in 1/4 cup each of chopped onions and tomatoes, 1/2 teaspoon minced ginger root, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer until tender, adding water if necessary.

Before the meal, lay hands on top of each other's heads and say, "God bless you." Close by asking for God's help in becoming good shepherds who care for others.
