"Good morning Dr. Reyes, how are you this morning? I am fine thank you, and you?" Simple words, spoken as late as the end of September 2006, but not understood or able to be spoken by one of our two new doctors, Dr. Marina Reyes.

Dr. Reyes was born in Rizaan, Russia, where she lived with her father and mother and her husband. While living in Russia, she studied medicine and received her M.D. in 1986 at Rizan University School of Medicine.

In 1986 she moved to Cuba to further her education in Internal Medicine, and she completed her residency in 1996. She continued in Cuba, practicing Internal Medicine until she came to join the staff at La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital in Santa Elena, Belize, Central America, leaving her 23 year old daughter, Alisa, behind in Cuba.

After a month of English tutoring, and lots of hard work studying – struggling with our idiomatic language called English, and lots of prayers from the staff, Dr. Reyes passed her Medical Council of Belize interview!

The staff at La Loma Luz welcomes Dr. Reyes with open arms and wishes her all the best, as she starts in a new country, with a new language, and a whole new set of faces!

Federico Landero, one of our lay workers in Belize, works in the area of Bullet Tree, close to the Guatemalan Border. He is a member of the Bullet Tree SDA Church, with a congregation of approximately 100 members. He is a Bible worker for the Cayo District. Federico stands with his family, including his mother. He has one daughter not shown. Following is an account that Federico gave to us.

In addition to working in outreach activities, I serve my local congregation by helping with Evangelistic Meetings, Vacation Bible School and passing out literature. During the last two months, I have given out 600 pieces of literature in Belmopan, the capitol of Belize. Jesus has given me the privilege of seeing 24 people baptized during the first week of my campaign, that I had worked with, and more are preparing for baptism.

There are many activities both inside and outside of the church. Serving God involves time and talent, in order to finish the work of God, so that He can come as soon as possible, and take us home with Him. I have learned that we exist for two reasons. One, to fulfill the mission Jesus gave us and two, to help people grow spiritually. Let us believe in God's promises and determine in our hearts to give ourselves to God.

Each year we receive dozens of requests for assistance in completing houses of worship. The need arises after MPIsponsored laymen establish groups of believers in remote, unentered areas.



New believers,

excited about discovering life-changing Bible teachings, can't wait to have their own church building. Often they meet under trees or tarps to get shelter from sun and rain.


Doing what they can, families gather native materials and cut lumber by hand, but lack funds for corrugated





steel roofing. Usually a boost of \$600 to \$1,000 will provide roofing materials for a building that will hold 200 to 400 members. As worshipers outgrow

their simple buildings, they begin putting up a more presentable,



permanent structure, often at great sacrifice. Many times the new one is built around the original dilapidated building. But



the process often takes many years. Assistance of \$5,000 to \$10,000 can help complete these churches. These folks want the very best for God's House, and appreciate every contribution, large or small.

MPI often receives letters of gratitude, signed by the church leaders and accompanied by pictures. They invite

you to come visit their churches, and treat rare outside visitors like royalty. Most of all, they look forward to meeting together as one big family around the Great White Throne, to worship our God and Creator every Sabbath throughout eternity.

GOD SOLVED OUR PROBLEM

Gillen Simamvwa Bible worker pioneer Central Zambia Conference

In the month of April 2002 we conducted an evangelistic series for one month. We had an average attendance of 217 people per night. Eighty persons decided to follow Christ and 26 were baptized. We rented a class room in a nearby school for worship. We began to seek a place to build our church. The senior Headman and the other four Headmen in the surrounding area totally refused to give us a place to stay. A committee was formed and a decision was made to **never** give us a place to build a church.

For three years we prayed earnestly for a place but nothing changed. In January 2006 our Saviour reminded us of His principles in His Word. "Fight evil with good." We decided to hold a charity day at a place we deemed would be best for us to build a church. We began asking donations of clothing of any size and gender. At the end of April we had everything we needed. We then approached the senior Headman, asking him where to conduct the ceremony to hand out the clothes to the needy in the community. He quickly ordered the Headman of that territory to allow us to hold this function only.

We requested each headman to give us 26 needy people in his village from all age groups who should receive help from us at the ceremony. The ceremony was held on May 28, 2006 and 316 people from all the villages attended. People began to eat as early as 7:00 and drank a maize drink (chibwantu). I conducted an 11:00 service. We all had lunch together and the leftovers were donated to the needy.



At 2:00 pm we started our alms giving ceremony with a text from the book of Acts: *Blessed is the hand that gives*. Besides the 19 people who responded to the love of Jesus, 97 people received clothes, 4 took shoes, 6 had new blankets. The Headmen were given cooking oil.

I requested the senior Headman to give some closing remarks. His confession surprised us. The idea of rejecting us was initiated by him from the devil and that all who rallied behind him had evil spirits. After a lengthy confession he pronounced and declared to all his Headmen that the place where we were standing on would be given to us and no one should ever talk ill of the Seventh-day Adventist church, but that all must emulate the brotherly love that was exhibited.

The church members immediately started making blocks for the church building. Everyone's prayers and support around the world are greatly appreciated.


