At sweets for a "sweet New Year". Here is a delicious apple cake recipe which I have made and intend to make for the

New Year 5777. I found this a few years back and it was titled...

Jewish Apple Cake

6 cups peeled and thinly sliced Granny Smith apples (about 3 large) $1^{1/2}$ cups, plus 5 tbls granulated sugar, divided 4 tsps cinnamon 3 cups all-purpose flour 1 tbl baking powder $^{1/2}$ tsp salt 4 eggs 1/2 cup light brown sugar 1 cup vegetable oil ^{1/2} cup orange juice $2^{1/2}$ tsps vanilla extract 1. Preheat oven to 350⁰. Grease, sugar and flour a 10inch Bundt tube pan. 2. Combine apple slices with 5 tbls granulated sugar and cinneamon; set aside. 3. Combine flour, baking powder and salt in a bowl and set aside. 4. Beat eggs with remaining granulated sugar and brown sugar. Add vegetable oil, orange juice and vanilla; beat well. Gradually blend in flour mixture and mix until well blended. 5. Pour one third of the batter into the pan. Top with half the apple slices, draining off any liquid. Pour in half the remaining batter, making sure the apples are covered. 6 Bake 55-60 minutes, until the top turns golden brown and a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Let cool 10 min. in pan. Turn out onto a wire rack and cool completely. Serves 16.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian The Sound of Music

The Jewish calendar has a strange pace to it for me. The first six months of the year, from *Rosh Hashana* to *Passover*, tends to go slowly for me over all. Sure, there are times when the calendar speeds up. The High Holiday season tends to go really quickly and *Channuka* always disappears in the blink of an eye. Still, overall the time moves slowly.

The second half of the year seems to disappear like steam into the atmosphere. No sooner does *Passover* go by and we are at *Shavuot, Shiva Assar B'Tamuz, Tisha B'Av* and finally back at the High Holiday season. It never ceases to amaze me how that always seems to be the case.

I mentioned in my last **Scrott** article that I begin to prepare for the High Holidays right after *Tisha B'Av*. The season, for me as a Cantor, is the most difficult time of the year. The services are, in my opinion, the most beautiful of the year. If you read the text of the services in English, there are themes of incredible beauty presented. On Rosh Hashana we acknowledge that Hashem is our king. He created the world and rules over it. On *Yom Kippur*, we come to the king and humbly ask forgiveness for our wrongs and to be sealed in the Book of Life for a good year. These themes dominate the services with hundreds of topics and subjects that pop up in the liturgy.

The season presents many challenges to a Cantor. For example, how can these various themes be translated musically? And, this is key. The job of the Cantor is to try and bring the prayers to life through music. Prayer is called, in Talmudic literature, *Avodat Halev*, "Service of the Heart." Prayer is meant to be not just said but experienced with feeling and emotion. The Cantor's job is to try and translate the prayers into music that can evoke emotion consistent with the intent and meaning of the prayer.

When I was young, I used to hate the High **The Scroll...4**Holiday services. They were long and it seemed like my father, of blessed

memory, would go on and on and on and on. It wasn't until I reached my Bar Mitzvah that I began to see things differently. Then, when I was sixteen a wondrous thing happened. That year, during the Yom Kippur service, I was standing during the *Unesaneh Tokef*, prayer. As my father chanted this hauntingly beautiful prayer both in theme and music, I felt a tear roll down my cheek. I had decided long before that I wanted to be a Cantor like daddy. At that moment, however, I finally understood the kind of Cantor he was and that I wanted to be. It became clear to me that the art Cantorial music was not about high notes and operatic presentation, but rather trying to transform the words and intent of the liturgy into the energy of the heart.

One of the things that I particularly like about the High Holidays is how packed with substance they are. Not only is the liturgy of the High Holidays unlike any other during the year, just attending services is different. The shul is filled with people celebrating the holiest days of the year. The camaraderie and closeness, the achdut, this generates amongst us is totally in keeping with the theme of the season. On *Rosh* Hashana, our tables are not only adorned with the best we have, but they are filled with family and friends. Even the foods we eat have special significance. For example, many of us eat honey and honey based products to symbolize a sweet year and pomegranates because a pomegranate is filled with seeds and we would like our lives filled with mitzvot like a pomegranate. We search for a new and special fruit that we have not eaten in a long time so we can make a special blessing, the *shehecheyanu*, on the second day of Rosh Hashana. Even the clothing we wear can have deep connotations. For example, many of us even have the custom to wear white, because white symbolizes purity, and to avoid red because red symbolizes sin.

If there is a lesson for the High Holidays it is, that our lives should be infused with significance. We spend so much time just moving along the path of life without thought or consideration. In effect, life just happens. The High Holidays help us reverse that trend, take stock, and realize the incredible depth of experience that is right there before us. All we have to do is open our minds and hearts and let it in.

The entire High Holiday experience is an expertly conducted symphony. It is Hashem's symphony to conduct, and we get to be the orchestra. Each one of us, by allowing the meaning of the services, the meals and the season in general to enter our very beings, adds to the beautiful music that is the core of the High Holidays. Your presence at services, adding your voices to the congregational singing, and by trying to find your meaning in the words and cantorial music, are all integral parts of the massive ensemble that plays a masterpiece of feelings, actions and experiences to Hashem in our quest to be written in the book of life for a sweet, healthy, prosperous and joyous year.

Take the time this year to stop and let the season fill you with its song. Become one with

Hashem's orchestra. Reach out to your family, friends and community and be one with them. By living the High Holidays and not just passing through, you will be rewarded with a depth of experience that can add great meaning not only to your life but to each person you touch. View this season as an incredible opportunity. Don't let it pass you by.


Sisterhood Wishing Well



Chadash is an adjective and changes contingent upon the gender of the noun it is used to describe (chadash – chadasha – chadashim – chadashot).

Every month, we commemorate **Rosh Chodesh**. We **daven** (**pray**) for the new month at the appearance of the new moon. Based upon when **Rosh Chodesh** is declared, will determine when we will observe our holidays and festivals. **Chodesh** is the word for month and comes from the same root as the word **new**.




