WELCOME

Welcome to 'Old Durham' Church's first Eucharistic worship since Lent. We are taking a variety of precautions in order to gather and celebrate as safely as possible during this time of COVID-19. Please take note of these precautions, and please also recognize that all of this is new to all of us.

The basic precautions are these:

- Masks are to be worn except momentarily while consuming the sacrament;
- six feet social distance is to be maintained, even during the Peace; and
- there will be no singing, and limited congregational speaking.

Many of the spoken "Amen"s have been replaced by a notation to use "Percussion." At these points you are encouraged to ring, rattle, bang, or clap whatever you have at hand.

Holy Communion is the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ given with bread and wine. In our Anglican tradition, we understand the entire assembled congregation as the body whose prayers consecrate the elements of bread and wine; the priest does not consecrate the sacrament alone. Because we are required by infection control protocols to offer only pre-consecrated bread, the wafer you receive this morning will be quite stale—consecrated when we last gathered as an assembly in March. The elements that we consecrate this morning will be set aside to be consumed at our next Eucharist. While both wine and bread will be consecrated, only the Presider will receive the wine.

When it comes time to distribute the sacrament, please stay in your seating area. The Presider will come to each household to distribute the bread. The Presider will use tongs to place a piece of wafer in your hands. Once the Presider has moved away from your seating area, you may remove your mask for a moment to consume the bread.

If you prefer not to receive Communion, you may cross your arms over your chest, and the priest will offer a prayer of blessing.

Restrooms are located in the Parish Hall, across the parking lot from the church. Please enquire at the Welcome Desk and someone will unlock the Parish Hall for you. Only one person may enter the Hall at a time.

Special thanks for this service go to Chris Dudley for the generous loan of his sound system, John Welch and his crew for preparing the space, George Chisholm for maintaining the paperwork, and the Re-gathering Task Force for patiently working through the logistics.

The purpose of the meeting will be to elect two members to the Vestry and to approve a correction to the parish bylaws.

The Vestry candidates proposed by the Nominating Committee are George C. and Rick V. Biographical information about each of them is provided below.

The bylaw correction is to do with who is eligible to be elected Senior or Junior Warden. In the revision of the bylaws approved in November 2018, it states in Article 4, Section b, Paragraph 1, that "A member of the Vestry who has served at least one

full term as a regular Vestry member is eligible for election as Senior or Junior Warden." This sentence should be corrected to read, "A member of the Vestry who has served at least one full year as a regular Vestry member is eligible for election as Senior or Junior Warden." The substitution of the word "term" for "year" was an error. A full "term" is 3 years, and it is not always the case that there are members serving on the Vestry who have already completed a 3-year term. In fact, that is the case this year, leaving the parish in the situation of not being able to elect either a Senior or Junior Warden unless this correction to the bylaws is approved.
