August's Club Meeting

The club met on August 6, 2015 at 1773 Warm Spring Rd. Chambersburg, PA, 17202. The social began at 6:30pm., and the meeting started at 7:00pm.

There were two demos for the night. First up was Jim Stottlemyer discussing the installation of a safety switch, followed by Bob Robinson turning a glass stem.

Demos

Jim discussed reasons for adding a switch, mostly it is a safety item. With many lathes, you need to reach through a zone that most debris would go if your part exploded or came loose from the chuck. I want to be able to turn the lathe off at the first sign of trouble without putting my arm or, worse yet, my neck in danger. We had a brief overview of switches and wiring. Several working switches were displayed starting with the factory switch. The simplest addition is a foot switch. This was added and demonstrated. Next, an additional switch was added to the circuit. It was a locking push-button switch that could be mounted anywhere. This push-button switch is very similar to the one added to the club lathe. Finally we discussed magnetic switches. This is by far the best option for most machinery. Cost can be an issue, but used ones are available to club members at a very reasonable price, \$600-\$800 dollars less than if purchased new. This type of switch has thermal protection sized to your machine, easy remote additions and requires a restart anytime the power fails. All the variations were demonstrated, and finally a shop made leg switch was shown. This switch extends along the length of the lathe and only requires a bump to stop it. We had some good questions afterwards and favorable comments. I am not sure how many members went home and modified their lathes but some probably did.

Bob demonstrated making stems for wine glasses. He gets his glass from Craft Supply. Turning is fairly straight forward, drilling the hole early allows additional support from the tail stock. One critical area is the fit between the wood and the flare of the glass. This should be seamless. It is best to do the final cuts in this area last, so as to leave adequate support for the tail stock center. A tight fit will look good and keep water from getting to the wood. A water- proof and taste free finish is critical. The stems are attached to the glass with a RTV type adhesive. You should see adhesive pushed out at the wood to
