Marion's Fishing Corner

The rigors of spring-

Largemouth bass are entering into a very physically demanding part of their life cycle. Getting through a successful spawn can be quite difficult on them.

You need to remember that they have just endured a very long, harsh winter. A winter in which very little feeding activity has taken place, and they have been surviving for the last few months on a layer of "fat" that they built up last fall. So their nutrition levels are low as they enter into a rigorous reproduction cycle. Females are heavy with eggs and ready to go on nests. The smaller males are busy with the laborious task of fanning out these nesting areas to provide silt-free areas for the eggs to be deposited. They are also charged with the task of "bumping" the female's abdomen area to loosen the eggs and make depositing them easier.

Once the eggs have been laid, the aroundthe-clock task of guarding the nest begins. The nest must be protected from an endless number of egg-eaters including bluegills, crawfish, and even other bass. Once the eggs hatch, the fry must be protected from those same predators until they are large enough to swim away and fend for themselves. This entire process can be very taxing on the adult bass, and we need to appreciate what they must endure. Research studies have confirmed that approximately one-third of the total population of mature bass in a



lake will not spawn on consecutive spring seasons. Some of the females will skip a year, even though they are mature, spawning age fish. Allowing the females to have a year off on occasion is nature's way of prolonging the life span of mature brood fish.

So please keep all this in mind when you catch your next bass. That fish has been through a lot and deserves it's freedom. Gently release it and be content to know that it will have the chance to spawn again next year..

Remember to catch and release, because a bass is far too valuable of a resource to catch just once.

Sugar Land Animal Services has reduced adoption fees to \$50 for cats and \$55 for dogs through May 2. The fee includes vaccinations, spaying/neutering and a microchip with a lifetime registration.

All shelter pets require a sleepover allowing potential families to try out a pet in their home for three to five days. If it's a perfect match, just return to Animal Services to finalize the adoption.

The City also hosts adoption events at Petsmart, 16758 Southwest Freeway. Adoptable animals from the City's animal shelter are displayed on a daily basis. Cats are at Petsmart during daytime hours seven days a week, and dogs visit the store on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

March "Yard of the Month" John & Carolyn Sears, 14118 Ragus Lake Dr.

The March Yard of the Month award has been presented to Carolyn and John Sears, who live on Ragus Lake Drive. They are quick to point out that their landscaping was done by the original owners of the home, Pat and Vince Griffin, who built the home and lived there until 2010. Pat was especially proud of their pine tree forest, with 28 evergreens along the West side of the property in addition to the large pine trees on the South side.

The Griffins were also responsible for the layered hedges around the house. Red-tip photinia, dwarf yaupon hollies, nandina, variegated liriope, foxtail fern, with a few elephant ear plants. The net effect has been a comfortable "finished" look to the house, with relatively low maintenance. The trees, of course, shed plenty of pine cones – which John and Carolyn pick up after their daily walk around the Lake.

The Sears have mainly added to the yard by subtraction: removing/replacing plants that become unruly or unhealthy. Some of the subtractions were sad, however. There was a beautiful Norfolk Pine tree in the side yard which Pat Griffin had transplanted from her childhood home in Galveston; that tree succumbed to a hard freeze. And about a year ago one of the large pine trees on the South side became diseased and had to be removed.

The Sears were thankful for the award and the \$25.00 gift certificate to Caldwell's Nursery. It made two families very surprised and pleased.




RETURN ON INVESTMENT Remodeling and replacement projects can add value to your home, but some projects recoup their costs better than others. According to Remodeling Magazine's 2015

Remodeling Cost vs. Value Report, small and exterior projects return the most value for your money. The project that offered the best value overall was a steel entry door replacement, which recouped 101.8 percent of its costs when the home was sold. The steel entry door is consistently the least expensive project named in the report, costing about \$1,200 on average. The second best value is the addition of a manufactured stone veneer, which can recoup 92.2 percent of its original cost, but be prepared to invest at least

\$7,000 for the improvement. Replacing a garage door can return 82.5 percent for an upscale project and 88.5 percent for a midrange project. Replacing your home's siding with fiber cement will return 84.3 percent of the costs, while replacing vinyl siding recoups 80.7 percent. Adding a wood deck will return 80.5 percent and replacing wood windows earns 78.8 percent. A minor kitchen remodel is a strong bet to add value to your home. An investment of \$19,226 can return 79.3 percent of its costs. A major kitchen remodel recoups 67.8 percent and a bathroom remodel returns 70 percent.
