BIG DAY PLANNED FOR 7th ANNUAL DORVAL PARADE Fun Programme For All Ages

Massed military bands leading a colorful parade through the streets, and a stage show on the parking lot at Dorval Gardens Shopping Centre, promises to make Saturday's Dorval Day one of the most colorful ever held, since the parades started seven years ago.

The big day, sponsored by the city and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, begins at 12:30 p.m. with the parade of floats, bands and majorettes marching through the streets to the Shopping Centre, where it is expected to re-assemble by 2:30 p.m.

Entries of approximately 20 floats have been received so far from various companies and community organizations throughout the Dorval and Montreal areas.

Miss Barbados, who has been flown here expressly for the event, will be in the parade along with a genuine steel drum band sponsored by the Senior Chamber of Commerce. This band, incidentally, will be in attendance at the evening dance.

Following the end of the parade the stage show will be held, featuring dance groups from various countries such as Lithuania, China, Japan, Poland, Catalonia, Mexico, and a French Can-Can group.

Prizes will be awarded to the group judged best.

Preceding the big day there will be a 'teen hop' at Dorval Recreation Hall, when Miss Dorval will be chosen.

Gilles Dore To Fight For New School

Gilles Dore, a veteran of six years on City Council has declared his candidacy in the Dorval Catholic School Commission election. Nomination day is June 4 for the one seat vacant in the June 11 election, and for which Lorenzo Decary will be seeking reelection.

Mr. Dore has pledged himself "to prevent narrow special interests and petty politics from interfering with the education of Dorval's children."

"A new high school for Dorval is essential," declared Mr. Dore. "It has already been approved by the school commission by overwhelming vote of the ratepayers in an election devoted to the issue a year ago, and in principle by top Quebec education officials."

Judges Hard At Work Choosing Miss Dorval

Judges for the Miss Dorval contest will probably have a number of grey hairs before they come up with a winner this Friday at the Teen-Hop. The 10 contestants place Dorval well up on the list as a city of beautiful girls.

Ranging in age from 17 to 21 the attractive young entrants were presented to press and judges earlier this week and each girl had the opportunity to explain her reasons for entering the contest and to answer questions about herself.

The girls are being judged on dress, appearance and personality, with the later point carrying the most points. Officials explain that Miss Dorval will represent the city at official functions throughout the year and be associating with older people and she must have poise, self assurance and be able to converse naturally.

Three of the contestants are employed, Jacqueline Verrier and Elizabeth Black are secretaries, who do some modelling in spare time. Susan Grout is a physical education instructor, but plans to go back to college next fall to obtain a degree.

Louise Vinet attends Sir George Williams University and plans to major in mathematics. An able tennis player she is sponsored by the Dorval Tennis Club.

Jean Bowman is a secretarial student at Sir George Williams and is studying Spanish. She hopes for a career in public relations and believes the Miss Dorval contest is good experience for her.

Five of the girls are students at Lachine High School and two plan to make teaching a career. Dorothy Argue hopes to be a kindergarten teacher and will gain some experience this summer as a play leader in the parks program. A liking for children and travel make teaching an ideal profession according to Rhona Leslie Aide. Summer vacations will give

her time to travel and to try a little professional theatre work.

Donna Mae Cooper is a busy girl - she teaches Sunday School, will work in Red Feather summer school this year and sings, swims and sews. Her ambition is to train for nursing at the Montreal General Hospital.

STORE HOURS MAY BE AMENDED

Montreal Metropolitan Corporation has amended its store closing by-law to allow shopping until 7 p.m. instead of 6 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday Wednesday and Saturday, and until 10 p.m. the week preceding Easter Sunday and the day before the eve of certain Jewish holidays.

This means that Dorval, although not members of the MMC, must, in company with all other lakeshore municipalities, abide by the new rule and not remain open later than these hours.

The by-law, opposed by many member municipalities of the MMC, including Lachine, must await ratification by the Quebec Minister of Municipal Affairs.

When the earlier by-law was passed by the Corporation no objections were received by Dorval City Council and therefore no protests were made on behalf of stores. At a meeting earlier this year aldermen indicated that they had heard only favorable reports of the changes, which appeared to be welcomed by both storekeepers and their employees.

Until objections are received, therefore, it is unlikely that Dorval will make any formal protest.

DORVAL AVE. TENDERS LET Lighting Works Cost \$126,763

Two major steps in the plan to completely re-build Dorval avenue have been taken by City Council with the acceptance of tenders for underground work and lighting, and passage in third reading of a by-law authorizing installation of sidewalks, curbs and pavements.

Work on this major city project is expected to get under way when schools close at the end of June.

Bedard Girard Ltd., submitted the lowest tender for the lighting, underground work, installation of traffic lights and alterations to the present system for a total of \$126,763.

The amount to be spent on the street construction is not expected to exceed \$158,000, and a loan to pay for it will be sought.

Taxpayers objecting to the plan may register their objections at City Hall, June 1 between 7-9 p.m.

The city will charge to taxpayers the cost of a standard street, approximately \$60,000.

Four contractors bid for the lighting work. The second lowest was by Canadian Hoosier Engineering Co., (\$126,763), the third Les Developpements du Nord-Est Ltee (\$127,243), and the highest, E.R. Chagnon & Fils Ltee (\$128,334).

In other council news it was agreed to give taxi operators a week's notice before giving third reading to the by-law on taxis.

Building permits for last month totalled \$61,522.

Alderman J. Macdonald has given notice that at a future meeting a by-law will be submitted calling for repairs to sidewalks and curbs and the re-surfacing of certain streets.

JOHN PRATT REPORTS FROM OTTAWA

THE TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING ASSISTANCE ACT

Capital assistance for the construction of new training facilities provides the essential basis for the training programs coordinated by the Federal Department of Labour and covered by federal-provincial agreements implemented under the Technical and Vocational Training Assistance Act, which was passed in the Canadian Parliament in December, 1960.

New Facilities Approved

Up to March 1, 1962, approval had been given for new construction on more than 250 technical and vocational high schools, institutes of technology, and trade schools across Canada. These facilities will provide accommodation for more than 90,000 students.

The estimated cost of these projects, additions, alterations and equipment was in excess of \$275,000, of which the Federal Government contribution was over \$180,000,000.

Local Action

Requests for assistance under this program must be submitted by the provinces. Many local authorities have conducted detailed surveys of technical and vocational school needs and have taken the initiative in suggesting the construction of new facilities.

A multi-million dollar federal provincial program to build new technical and vocational schools and to expand present training facilities is underway in Canada.

The program is linked directly to nationwide efforts to meet Canadian manpower requirements by increasing the levels of education and training of Canada's labor force, both present and future.

The Federal Department of Labor, under the new Technical and Vocational Training Assistance Act, has increased its capital contribution to 75 per cent of provincial government costs of approved new school buildings, alterations, additions and equipment until March 31, 1963. The federal contribution will revert to 50 per cent thereafter for the life of the six-year agreement.

To Meet an Urgent Need

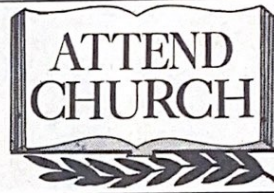
This massive building program has developed as a result of an urgent need in Canada for additional training facilities and broader training programs to meet changing industrial conditions. Recent advances in technology have brought a pressing demand for more workers with higher

levels of education and technical training.

Only about 30 per cent of employment in Canada today is in the semi-skilled and unskilled categories and there are indications that these categories of jobs may diminish even further in relative importance as technology advances. The fastest growing occupations are those which require high levels of education and training.

The training programs that have been offered in the past have not captured the interests or challenged the abilities of the majority of Canadian youth. About 70 per cent of our young people have been leaving the school system without completing any program of education or training. In view of the rapid increase in population in the age groups, 15-19, the num-

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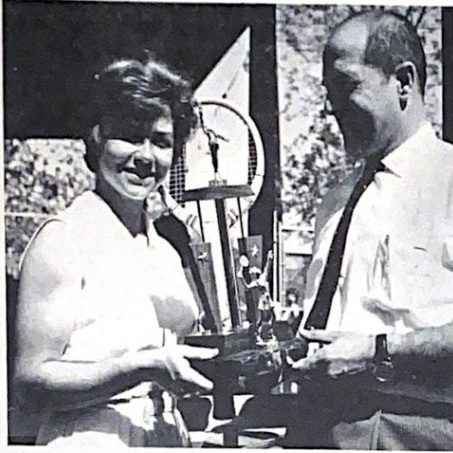

School Board Ready For June Election

An election for two seats on the board of the Protestant School Board of Lachine may be held this June for the first time in 15 years.

Nominations for the two vacancies will be accepted from Dorval, Lachine and LaSalle residents eligible.

Home and School officials in Dorval feel every effort should be made to fill one of these seats with a Dorval resident and efforts are being made to find a suitable one. They feel that, with the Lachine High School situation so acute, and current space insufficient for the growing needs of the area, more representation is necessary from western Lachine and Dorval if a new school is to be built in Dorval in the future.

The two seats falling vacant this month are held by John Pitcairn of Lachine and M.H. Moore of LaSalle.

Mrs. M.B. Caddell, secretary-treasurer, will be returning officer should an election be called.

Voters must be Canadian citizens over 21 and should have lived in the school municipality for at least six months. Proprietors of real estate, and their spouses, will both be eligible to vote. Parents and a guardian of a child under 18 by June 30, 1961, even though he or she does not own property, may also vote.

An exception to this rule concerns parents of Jewish children. Because taxes for Jewish residents are assigned to the neutral panel, they are not eligible to vote for the Protestant board.

If voting becomes necessary

Post Office Honors Courageous Effort

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KNOW YOUR CANDIDATES

N.D.P. Candidate Was Former Liberal Organizer

There are two Lachine residents entered for the Federal election June 18.

In addition to the Liberal candidate, Raymond Rock, the New Democratic Party (NDP) has nominated a former Liberal organizer, Jean Charles Tremblay, a Lachine resident for 13 years.

Married, with six children - four of them of school age - Mr. Tremblay is a tool-maker-machinist and active in union affairs. He is an executive of the Steelworkers Union, Local 5258, a member of its negotiating committee, and in charge of the local's social security programs.

In a biographical sketch issued to the Dorval Reporter, Mr. Tremblay is quoted as being an organizer of the Liberal Party which he "abandoned...because the Liberals, as well as the Conservatives, offered no solution to the grave problems which face us..."

Pratt Set Fast Pace In Active Campaign

John Pratt, Conservative standard bearer in Jacques-Cartier-LaSalle has kept up his busy schedule of activities in the riding this week.

Mr. Pratt is an active campaigner - up with the dawn and out to talk with the voters on the train platforms at the many commuter stations at Dorval, Roxboro, Ste. Anne's, Lachine and LaSalle. After a quick breakfast, it's off to coffee parties in all parts of the riding. In the past seven days, he attended 18 coffee parties in the mornings and afternoons. Then it's off to evening meetings with workers in the riding - and at many other informal gatherings throughout the county.

Squeezed into this busy schedule are radio and television appearances and appearances in nearby ridings in support of other Progressive Conservative Candidates in this area.

John Pratt's platform slogan is "Carry on with John" - an indication that he feels that, while much has been done in this riding in the past five years, much remains to be done.

Mr. Pratt proudly points to the rail crossing situation. Twenty level crossings in this riding have been eliminated or improved. Work is going on and plans are in the mill to eliminate several

more "death-trap" crossings in the near future.

"Postal service now is on a par with any area in Canada," said Mr. Pratt. "The entire riding now is in the city four cent zone. New or improved Post Offices have been built or are underway in Dorval, Roxboro, Ste. Anne de Belleme and LaSalle. Delivery is very improved too."

Mr. Pratt, addressing workers in Pointe Claire, said, "Airport noise suppression has been one of the great achievements in this riding - and we will continue to see that property and persons are protected from undue airport noise."

Referring to a remark from the opposition camp that nothing has been done here in five years by way of Government spending, Mr. Pratt said

"Frankly, the amount of money spent in this riding is astronomical. It amounts to well over 150 million dollars in four years - far above average Government spending in any riding in the country."

Next week Mr. Pratt has 18 more coffee parties, many more train platforms and 7 evening meetings scheduled, to say nothing of T.V. and Radio appearances and campaign meetings with workers in his own organization.

LACHINE GENERAL AWAITS APPROVAL FROM PROVINCE

Boring has begun at the Lachine General Hospital, preparatory to work on the extension and renovation to the present buildings.

This is the first stage in the extensive project to determine the hazards which may be found when excavation work starts.

All signs now point to an early July start, although this cannot be determined until the completed plans have been approved by the provincial authorities. When this has been received, tenders will be called.

Grover C. Furr Jr., president of the Lachine Hospital board of management, estimates that it will take up to 15 months to complete the work which will make the hospital one of the most modern in Canada.

To meet the increasing demands of the area it serves, the Lachine General is to be increased from 76 beds to 140 and from 20 bassinets to 33, in addition to enlargement and modernization of clinical and domestic facilities.

Meanwhile it was reported at the monthly meeting of the board, plans are well advanced for the deficit fund raising campaign which opens at the end of August.

TEACHER WINS ART CONTEST

A 23 year-old kindergarten teacher who uses her young pupils as impromptu sketching models, won top honours in the first Cote St. Luc Art Festival. For her paintings, "Children's Study Group", and "Respite", Mrs. Honey Fox Moscovitz, of St. Laurent, will receive a year's free tuition at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts under Arthur Lismer.

One of some 70 Quebec artists who entered the Festival's non-professional art contest, Mrs. Moscovitz paints for pleasure. This is her first success in major competition.

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POLLUTION PROBLEMS AIRED AT JAYCEE ANNUAL MEETING

Dorval Chamber of Commerce has passed a resolution urging City Council to "proceed with all possible despatch with the construction of a sewage disposal plant, in order to take advantage of the financial aid granted by the Federal and Provincial governments..."

The resolution, adopted on a majority vote, sparked some lively discussion, with some members expressing opposition to the site on Dixie Island.

Eric Fearn made a motion asking the Chamber to oppose the location. It was seconded by Bob Richer but defeated in a vote.

On water pollution Roy Amaron said the committee should be reconvened so that pressure could be maintained on Quebec Province to make positive action compulsory by legislation.

Discussion was also held on Dorval's zoning by-law. A study has been made and nothing "basically wrong" found. But it was felt that further clarification on some points was desirable.

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REGISTRATION OPENS FOR Y.M.C.A. DAY CAMPS

Many summers ago children of Lachine and Dorval spent active holidays romping in the fields, building tree-houses and swimming in the St. Lawrence. Those golden days have passed; large housing developments limit children's play areas to street corners, hot playgrounds or the local swimming pool. Parents reminisce on their youth today often wish for their children the summer adventures they experienced.

The YMCA of the Lachine-Dorval community presents an opportunity to the child of today to gain a unique and exciting summer holiday. Day Camp Meadowbrook offers programs for 8-12 olds that have the freedom of open fields, shady wood groves, swimming and boating in the tested clean-flowing river water, or sharing a laugh with his tent group.

Girls and boys become campers by day and city-dwellers by night when they are campers with the YMCA. Three days each week they travel to Ile Perrot by chartered bus, which picks them up in the morning and returns the campers each night, within walking distance of home.

Activities at camp each morning begin at flag-break, then back to the tents to change for swim instruction. The afternoon provides time for more swimming, this time

just for recreation. The remainder of the day is free for hikes, archery, boating, crafts, lunch and an important rest period.

The camper is an important member of a tent group of seven or eight youngsters, supervised by a counsellor who is concerned for each camper's happiness and safety. Five adult staff members are trained and prepared to assist the counsellor in giving the campers a diversified and active camp program. Day Camp Meadowbrook operates from July 2 to August 10th, which includes three two-week periods, providing campers, the children of Lachine and Dorval with an adventuresome and happy summer holiday.

Membership of the city's recreational department is open to all those between 5-17, and the adult section to all those .8 and over.

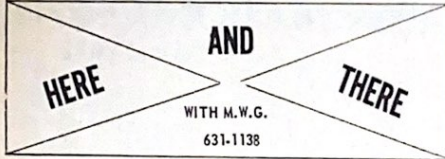

Unemployment Big Issue Claims Raymond Rock

Raymond Rock, Liberal candidate for Jacques Cartier LaSalle in the June 18 Federal election, told supporters at a meeting in Lachine Saturday that the prospects for Canada under the Diefenbaker rule are heavier unemployment.

Claiming that unemployment is higher now than it ever was under the Liberals, Mr. Rock quoted Mr. Diefenbaker as saying that the electorate would not suffer from unemployment while he was prime minister.

More recently, Mr. Diefenbaker had said the Conservative program would be a continuation of what had happened in the past five years.

During the Liberal regime of 1957, unemployment was only 177,000, Mr. Rock claimed. And unemployment was not an issue. "In the past five Diefen-years 415,000 Canadians on average were unemployed annually. This means," claimed the Liberal nominee, "nearly 300 per cent more unemployment. This, therefore, is an issue."

He said the Conservative government failed to initiate any new public works programs, and he cited Liberal achievements in this field as the Seaway, the pipeline, the CNR's Ville Marie project, Trans-Canada Highway, CNR humpyard, the International Airport, and other major projects.

Unemployment in the county was and still is serious, he added, and said in the Lakeshore area it even hit white collar workers.

Mr. Rock also spoke of the falling dollar value and the consequent rise in living costs. He forecast that in a few weeks price changes will be noticed in all stores because of the "Diefen-Dollar, the 92 1/2 cent dollar." He also forecast bigger unemployment than now under Tory rule. "The Liberal Party is pledged to initiate a program of full employment," he said enlarging on the Party program.

He concluded by saying: "The new Liberal Govern-

- ment will -
1. Reduce Trade Deficits through domestic production of many goods now imported.
 2. Greater specialization of possible tax incentives to eliminate inefficient production in Canadian industry.
 3. Vigorously promote trade with the common market and world trade.
 4. Reduce and eliminate budgetary deficits.
 5. Financial backing at moderate interest, for urban and redevelopment through municipal loan fund.
 6. Revise - without delay - the Tax System."

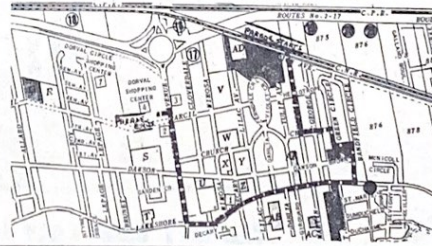

 alike, not been built?" he asked. "The reason involves a few people with narrow, obstructionist motives, who have been trying to convince others that the school is beyond our financial means".

"This claim is ridiculous," he said. "The School Commission has a healthy surplus, derived from new industries and federal grants related to the airport properties, so that there would be no need for an increase in taxes."

"Responsibility for the delay rests with a small group of people who have used legal subterfuges that have already delayed the school building program by many months," he claimed.

Mr. Dore, who has been given the full support of Les Parents Catholiques de Dorval and the Dorval Parents Association at meetings held during the week to discuss school problems, says he is entering the campaign to bolster the Commission in its efforts to get on with the job.

"Education is too important to be impeded by people whose real motives are outdated, politically oriented and disunifying," he declared.

"While His Holiness, Pope John XXIII, and His Eminence, Cardinal Leger, are working so hard to bring about greater unity in the Christian world, we cannot stand idly by in the face of efforts to disunite us in the fundamental matter of educational facilities for our young Catholics", said Mr. Dore.

 Mr. Rock claims that I have no time to be a Mayor and M.P. He seems to overlook the eminent Mr. Bourque, Liberal M.P. for Outremont - St. Jean, and closer to home, the Late Dr. Charles Kirkland, long a Liberal M.P.P. and Mayor of Ville St. Pierre, as well as a practicing physician.

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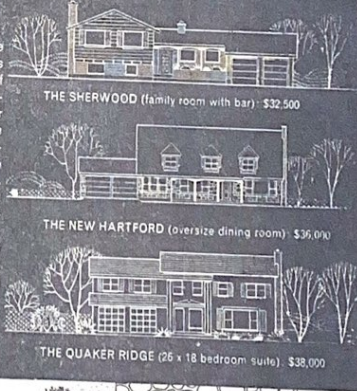

ber of drop-outs could rise sharply in the years ahead if programs are not broadened. In the next five years, half a million young people will be coming forward for education and training. In the last half of this decade, the numbers will be even greater.

The expansion of technical and vocational training facilities and programs will offer Canadian youth and adults increased opportunities to prepare for the jobs which are opening up in this age of technological change, and will enable them to keep abreast with the increasing complexity of industrial occupations.

The shortage of adequate facilities has been a serious drawback to the development of effective technical and vocational training programs in Canada.

Provincial officials have estimated that training facilities need to be expanded by 50 per cent to meet present requirements and those which will arise in the next few years. At the current rate of expansion, which has been sparked by the federal capital assistance program, it appears that this goal will be met in the next 2 1/2 years.
