## **Deed Restriction Enforcement – Plans to proceed in 2020**

Atascocita North is a deed restriction enforced community. If you do not have a copy of the

Association's CCR's (Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions) they can be found on the Association's website. Recently, when inspecting the Community, we have noticed the following: Fences are in very poor shape and/or are leaning and falling down. Driveways and the sides of your home have become areas to "store" items; there should be nothing in your driveway or beside your home, other than your operational vehicles or trash cans (which should be stored neatly). Trees have become overgrown on your property and into the streets (it is not the County's responsibility to trim your trees). Homeowners are performing modifications to the exterior of their property without submitting an architectural request form to the ACC (Architectural Control Committee) for approval. It is a requirement that you get approval to make any changes or modifications to the exterior of your property. This includes but is not limited to replacing your fence, painting your house, replacing your driveway, installing a storage shed, and replacing your roof. In addition, there are inoperable vehicles that do not run, but have not been inspected or moved in years. This is also a violation! Parking in the grass is NOT permitted and has become contagious in the community.

Recently the Board has decided that if the homeowners are not going to maintain their home in a neat, healthy, and sanitary condition, and continue to leave violations uncured that they would elect to send these repeat offenders over to the attorney and have them take action on such matters. Just so you all understand, any attorney fees that are paid out by the Association requesting your compliance regarding a specific violation(s) are billed to your individual account. The fees will increase with each letter sent and if the Board elects to proceed with a lawsuit, the fees you incur will be excessive.

## 15 Minute Prep Fall Chili Recipe

This is a great fall recipe that takes only 15 minutes to prepare. After that, let this simmering dish heat up your home with warm, hearty aromas.

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 2 bell peppers, diced
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 2 cups of vegetable broth
- 3 cloves of minced garlic
- 1 28-ounce can of diced tomatoes (fire-roasted are best)
- 1 tsp of paprika
- 1 tsp cumin
- Salt to taste

Black pepper to taste

- 1 12-ounce bottle of beer (recommended varieties include XX and Modelo)
- 1 15 ounce can of black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 15 ounce can of pinto beans, drained and rinsed

Lime wedges (to squeeze into the chili while eating)

Directions

- 1) In a large pot, heat the oil. Add peppers, onions and celery. Cook until softened. Add garlic, chili powder, paprika, cumin and sauté for 2 to 3 more minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 2) Add beer and cook until it has reduced by half, roughly 6 to 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add black beans, pinto beans, tomatoes and vegetable broth. Stir while bringing to a boil, and then reduce to a simmer. Cook until slightly reduced, about 20 to 25 minutes.
- 3) Serve with lime wedges, avocado, sour cream and cheese as topping choices.



## **ENERGY SAVING TIPS YOU CAN MAKE NOW**

Fall is an ideal time to make repairs that will make your home more energy efficient, both saving you money and keeping you warmer. Even if you can't afford major repairs, such as a new furnace or new windows, there are small things you can do to save big bucks on heating costs – and you can handle most of them yourself.

#### **Protect Your Pipes**

Cooler weather is coming, so you'll need to protect your pipes from bursting this winter.

**Caulk around windows.** Warm air can escape and cold air can enter your house if the area around your windows has cracks. Caulking needs to be replaced periodically, and you should check every fall for holes that need to be patched, as well as holes anywhere outside your house.

**Replace weather stripping around doors.** If you can see light around the edges of your doors, you need new weather stripping.

Close up your fireplace. Make sure your flue closes all the way, and check whether you can feel air coming in when it's closed. Glass doors around your fireplace opening are another way to keep warm air in and cold air out of your house.

**Put up storm windows and doors.** If you have older windows and doors, adding storm windows and doors can help considerably. Window insulation film is another option to provide a layer of protection.

**Improve your insulation.** Insulation deteriorates over time, so you may want to add more material in your attic. Other places to add insulation are in crawl spaces and exposed areas of decks. An insulating cover over your attic opening also helps trap in the heat.

**Cover and Flush the water heater.** You can buy a water heater blanket for around \$20 at the hardware store that will keep the tank from losing heat as quickly, saving you money on your heating bill. Particles and sediment can collect over time in the bottom of your water heater, hindering the unit's efficiency. Flush the water through the drain valve to clear out the material and keep your heater functioning at its best.

**Change filters.** If the filters are dirty, the device has to work harder. In most homes, filters should be changed monthly in the heating season. Regularly changing the filters in your central air and heating system can significantly improve its efficiency and longevity, while easing the pressure on your wallet.

**Get a programmable thermostat.** The newest thermostats can learn your family's habits and set themselves to keep the house cooler when no one is there and warmer when the home is occupied. Lower your water heater temperature. You can lower it from 140 degrees to 120 with no ill effect,

**Maintain your Outdoor Equipment.** Outdoor power equipment such as mowers and string trimmers need to be cleaned and maintained prior to storing them.

**Clean Gutters.** Make sure that water can flow freely through your gutters now will help prevent icicles and ice dams from forming later.

**Clockwise Ceiling Fans.** Ceiling fans are everyone's favorite summer budget-saver. But they can help out in the winter as well! Have your ceiling fans move in a clockwise direction so they push hot air along the ceiling towards the floor. If they're going counterclockwise, they won't be as effective.

**Check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.** Winter sees an uptick in the number of home fires and cases of carbon monoxide poisoning because people are running their furnaces/heaters in overtime in order to keep warm. To keep your family safe, check the batteries on your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and change them if needed.

## **Holiday Season Safety Tips**

The Holiday season is upon us and we are all going to be very busy through the New Year. We are all getting the food together and cooked for Thanksgiving and then there is all the shopping for Christmas gifts. With all that to take care of, it is hard to stop and think about safety while getting it all done. Here are a few tips to get you through this Holiday Season safely.

**Thanksgiving:** According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) food handling errors and inadequate cooking are the most common problems that lead to poultry associated food borne disease outbreaks in the United States. 2. Separate: Don't cross contaminate
