Luther used the Catechism daily as the subject of meditation and conversation about God’s world. He preached on the Catechism, wrote hymns about the Catechism and had woodcuts made to illustrate the Catechism so that all might learn and love the core of God’s Word. He considered the Catechism as the foundation on which to build our faith.



For our retreat we will gather together for conversation and prayer using Luther’s “What does this mean?” to explore the Apostles Creed and the Lord’s Prayer. The words and phrases are so familiar that we may not really hear them.

THE PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear fellow servants:

What a joy it was, on the 25th of June, to gather for our 2016 Graduation Liturgy and Celebration of Holy Communion, as the first members of the newly established Diakonia site at Santa Isabel Lutheran Church in Elizabeth graduated! It reminded me of the oft quoted reformation mantra: “Reformed, and ever reforming!” In some ways this graduation looked very much like Diakonia graduations have looked for years. In other ways, it was reformed in significant and important ways.

We gathered for worship using a setting from ELW. Nothing new there! Only, this time, the setting we used was Setting 7 which is a Spanish language setting, translated into English. This reflected the fact that among the graduates were the first graduates from our first Spanish language site. As we worshipped, Spanish and English language texts and songs were used, and I was reminded that the Church is global.

It is far too easy for the majority white members of most of our Congregations to forget that God’s Spirit is at work in communities that are not majority white. It is also easy for some to find themselves threatened by that fact. In response, there are those who resist the changes that inevitably come when a group or organization, like Diakonia makes intentional strides toward greater inclusivity and multiculturalism. And so it is with great joy that I share with you that I have not heard,

and did not experience in our gathering on graduation day, a single hint of such resistance! Praise be to God!

Might we as an organization be changed – you might say, “reformed” – as we continue intentionally striving toward ever greater inclusivity? Absolutely! But that’s the point, is it not, of being both reformed and ever reforming? Are we not to seek God’s face, and the guidance of God’s Spirit, in sharing the blessing that is Diakonia, and the unique opportunity Diakonia offers individuals who seek to grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ and in service to the world in Jesus’ name with all of God’s people?

I cannot wait to see what God will do in and through us in the days, months and years to come, as we continue to gather God’s people for intentional study and discernment, challenging one another to grow in knowledge, love and service, together, learning from one another, being challenged and changed by God’s Word coming from all corners of the Church. My hope and prayer is that God will continue to bless our work, and that we will continue to reflect, more and more, the wonderful diversity of the Church, here and around the globe.

On My Shelf

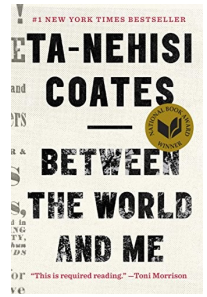
With all the chaos, conflict and confusion in the world, the most stable and calm place in my life is my bookshelf. Filled with words which I have chosen to reflect on, be led by and gain inspiration for my faith journey. I have chosen for you a book that caused me to change how I viewed the world and to wrestle with my church's position on diversity and inclusiveness. Ta-Nehsi Coates' National Book Award winning memoir, "Between the World and Me" was eye opening and disturbing. He is not afraid to tell of his experiences growing up in Baltimore and Howard University as a condemnation of racism in this country that defies our adulation of democracy.

Coates has written a series of essays and places them in a letter written to his teenage son to tell of the racial divide that still exists in this country, but has its roots in history and hierarchy. I began reading this book hoping for acknowledgment that things are better in America and that the nonviolent demonstrations of the sixties had made a significant change, but Coates

provides a litany of events and personal experiences that support the Black communities perception that the KKK has been supplanted by the police who act first and ask questions later.

I participated in an interfaith book discussion that opened my eyes and ears to my neighbors and my fellow parishioners in a way I had never anticipated. "I tell you now that the question of how one should live within a black body, within a country lost in the Dream, is the question of my life, and the pursuit of this question, I have found, ultimately answers itself." (Coates) I found consolation in the community acknowledgement that asking the questions and then really listening to each other is the beginning of grace and healing. I urge you to listen to his voice in the midst of the shouting and protests and to remember Jesus' command to love you neighbor.

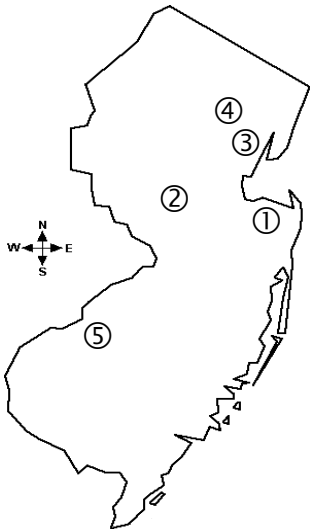
